Report of the Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2014

The Trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2014. The trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Structure, governance and management

The Charity is managed by trustees who are appointed by the church leadership. The board of trustees will consist of members equally representing the church leadership and church attendees.

Governing Document

The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association as a Company Limited by Guarantee.

Objectives and activities

The main purpose and objects of the charity are set out in the Memorandum of Association as follows:

- 1.1 to advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement of Belief in Carmarthenshire and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the Leadership Team may from time to time think fit and to fulfil such other purposes which are exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales and are connected with the charitable work of the Church;
- to relieve persons who are in conditions of need or hardship or who are aged or sick and to relieve the distress caused thereby in the said location and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the Leadership Team may from time to time think fit;
- to benefit the local community of Carmarthenshire and the neighbourhood by associating together with the said local community and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and/or to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for healthy recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving conditions of life for the residents.

Achievements and performance

2014 has been another year of hard work, but with excellent progress being made in a number of areas.

During 2014 our Sunday church meetings continued to be held in "the theatre" at Queen Elizabeth High School based in Johnstown, Carmarthen. The venue is easily accessible to the public with many families attending our Sunday morning meetings numbering around 150 people. We continue to run many children's clubs from nursery age to year 9 in High School. We have a vibrant youth group on a Friday evening which encourages many young people, and offers them the opportunity of attending various events. A few of the youngsters were given the opportunity to embark upon a recent trip to South Africa which involved helping to build an orphanage.

Whilst the pastoral staff in the church has remained consistent through the year, we employed an experienced administrator in November 2014 on a part time basis.

Xcel Project Overview.

The Xcel Project has continued to grow throughout 2014. This has included the opening of our new Community Shop which complements the existing furniture recycling centre. This is proving to be very successful and has recycled some 50 tonnes of furniture. The Foodbank continues to grow with 1413 people fed during the year these being 988 adults and 425 children.

Over 100,000 people have visited the bowling alley where customers continue to be impressed with the quality of the venue, food and service. Many local Community Groups and Organisations are benefitting from the centre these include Young Farmers Clubs, local Football and Rugby clubs, local Church Youth Groups, Primary and Secondary schools, Probus, Rotary Club, WI there are also a number of OAP groups from the locality (Brechfa, Llanstephan, Llanelli etc) attending.

Dec 2014 Xcel Big Christmas give away was again a great success with clients nominated by vouchers holders receiving an evening that many who attended could only dream of at the bowling alley. The evening included an opportunity for the children to meet Father Christmas, have a toy, the mums could have a nails done and have a hand massage and there was face painting and plenty of games all topped off with a warm buffet, dessert and Christmas hamper to go home with. This wrapped up a very successful year for the project.

As well as the paid staff, the work of volunteers in all areas of the organisation is once again noted and appreciated. Without their commitment and hard work, the organisation would not be able to function in the way that it does.

Financial review

Policy on reserves

The Charity's policy is to keep a minimum in general funds to run the organisation for 3 months.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Notes to the financial statements

for the year ended 31 December 2014

1. Basis of preparation

1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice' (SORP 2005), Financial Reporting Standards for Smaller Enterprises (FRSSE) and with the Charities Act.

1.2. Change in Basis of Accounting

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and methods of accounting) since last year.

1.3. Changes to previous Accounts

No changes have been made to accounts for the previous years.

2. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year.

2.1 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated assets are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Tax Reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Legacies are included when the charity is advised by the personal representative of an estate that payment will be made or property transferred and the amount involved can be quantified.

2.2 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Resources expended are recognised in the year in which they are incurred.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management.

2.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Expenditure is capitalised if the asset has a useful life of more than 1 year and it's cost exceeds £500.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, on a straight line basis as follows:

Equipment, Fittings and Furniture	25%
Bowling Lanes	25%
Buildings	2%

2.4 Stocks

These are valued at the lower of cost and market value.

3. Analysis of Incoming Resources

Donations income consists of regular giving by church members in tithes and offerings, plus "one off" gifts or donations. Where these gifts are given for a specific purpose they are held in a restricted fund. This includes gifts received under the gift aid scheme.
