#### Structure, Governance and Management

#### Governing document

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee with charitable status, having no share capital. It was incorporated on 18 November 1997 and registered with the Charity Commission on 17 February 1998.

A.B. Plus is a membership organisation and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association dated 18 November 1997 as amended by special resolutions dated 3 February 1998 and 3 June 2008.

#### Structure, Governance and Management - continued

#### Recruitment and appointment of directors

Directors, who are trustees for the purposes of charity law, are appointed and resign in accordance with the Articles of Association. In appointing directors, due regard is given to the skills mix and profile of the existing board.

The Board of Trustees consists of eight elected and up to four co-opted members. New trustees are elected by the members of A.B. Plus at its AGM; trustees serve for a term of two years. The elected trustees are able to co-opt up to four additional members.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for setting the organisation's strategy with day to day operational management delegated to the Centre Manager. Trustees then undertake various roles to provide scrutiny and to review risk, performance and implementation of the organisation's policies. The Centre Manager receives regular supervision from the Vice Chair of trustees and formally reports to the board at each meeting.

#### Organisational structure

The charitable company is governed by its Board of Directors which is responsible for formulating the strategies and policies of the charitable company including the approval of budgets and the annual accounts. The Board meets in formal session approximately eight times a year to determine overall strategy, oversee the furtherance of the charitable company's objectives and consider reports.

The charitable company also benefits from many voluntary hours and unclaimed out of pocket expenses contributed by its trustees and volunteer helpers.

#### Risk management

The consideration of risks is inherent in the charitable company's planning and decision making processes. The directors have identified major risks to which they consider the charitable company to be exposed and regularly review the actions considered necessary to mitigate those risks.

The trustees are aware that the charitable company has relied on Birmingham City Council, which is responsible for the public health budget, for the majority of its funding during the year. The trustees are constantly seeking ways to raise funds from other sources and have successfully submitted a bid to the Big Lottery jointly with Freshwinds, which has resulted in additional gross annual funding of £23,700.

## **Objectives and Activities**

The charitable company's objectives as set out in its governing document are:

To promote in Birmingham and the West Midlands the relief of sickness among persons affected by HIV/AIDS and the mental distress caused thereby in particular but not exclusively by a) the provision of an advice, information and counselling service, b) advancing the education of the public concerning all matters relating to HIV/AIDS and c) the provision of recreational facilities calculated to relieve the need of such persons. Considerable efforts need to be made to challenge the stigma that people living with HIV still face 30 years into the epidemic.

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charitable company's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives set.

#### Review of activities - continued

The principal activity of the charitable company in the year under review was to provide drop-in and support services to people living with HIV and AIDS in Birmingham and the West Midlands. The vast majority of the charitable company's expenditure is incurred in supporting this activity.

The charitable company refers members with specific issues to appropriate agencies, such as Terrance Higgins Trust, Freshwinds, Red Cross, Barnardo's and HGL, which provide support around benefits, housing, debt advice, immigration, children and families and counselling. In addition, it runs a men's and a women's group, in which activities relevant to those specific groups are undertaken. Residential weekends, organised by National Long-Term Survivors are offered to members who qualify as either long-term diagnosed, 5 years plus, or are newly diagnosed. Three day respite care breaks are also offered at Trebullom in Cornwall.

#### Achievements and performance

During 2013/14 the charitable company welcomed 352 services users to the drop-in centre, which is open on Mondays and Fridays, including 70 new members accessing services for the first time. Overall between April 2013 and March 2014 there were 2,731 individual visits by members which equates to approximately 72 member visits per week. A hot meal is provided each Monday and Friday when the drop-in is open and each member who is eligible gets a bag of food to take home. Alongside this, the charitable company provides events such as St Patrick's Day and Positive Health Choices sessions on topics such as living with HIV and alcohol and drugs. There is also information on treatment updates and activities such as fitness classes and theatre trips. Two peer groups operate, one for women and one for men, which meet separately once a month for activities and discussions of their own choosing. Members are encouraged to run the groups themselves with as little intervention as possible.

The charitable company engages in outreach events within the different communities that are represented within the membership so that there is a presence in the wider community and so that people know about its work and are able to refer those in need of its services. The charitable company works closely with the local HIV clinics and the Birmingham HIV Partnership in order to ensure clear pathways for referral to it and also between agencies in order to provide the best possible support for members who are willing and ready to engage in their own support and wellbeing. The drop-in is an open and inclusive environment for all people who are living with HIV and as such is of great value to new members who are coming to terms with their diagnosis as it allows them to engage with others who are moving forward in their lives with the help of the services provided.

A successful joint bid to the Big Lottery with Freshwinds resulted in the appointment of a new support worker in October 2013, who will focus on helping HIV positive people with complex needs to improve their management of their own condition and reduce their vulnerability to health crises. The project will run until October 2015.

## **Financial Review**

The result for the year and financial position of the charitable company are as shown in the attached financial statements.

Total income has increased from £98,350 in 2013 to £104,018 in 2014 due to the Big Lottery project mentioned above and a full year's funding from the HIV Partnership. Donations from other charities and trusts, including Gentlemen's Night Out, were lower than in 2013, and income from room hire fell, following the departure of the tenant.

Expenditure increased from £100,095 in 2013 to £110,058 in 2014 mainly as a result of increases in staff costs due to the appointment of a support worker funded by the Big Lottery bid and a rise in professional fees for specialist advice. Overall the charitable company recorded a net deficit of £6,040 for the year (2013 – deficit £1,745).

#### Reserves policy

The General Unrestricted Fund balance at 31 March 2014 was £13,841 (2013 - £19,881). The trustees consider that, ideally, unrestricted reserves should equate to approximately six months' running costs, budgeted to be £50,000. The available unrestricted reserves are therefore below target by £36,159. It is the trustees' intention to use any surplus funds generated in 2015 to improve this position.

## Investment policy

The trustees invest surplus funds in interest bearing bank accounts with instant access to ensure that the funds are readily available as and when required.

## Plans for future periods

A.B. Plus Limited will continue to provide drop-in and support service to people living with HIV and AIDS in Birmingham and the West Midlands. It will work with other members of the HIV Partnership to secure funding from Birmingham City Council and others for 2014/2015 and beyond.

## Responsibilities of the Director and Trustees

The director and the trustees are responsible for preparing the Director's and Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

#### Responsibilities of the Director and Trustees - continued

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- · make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## Small company provisions

I report on the accounts of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2014, which are set out on pages 6 to 12.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

#### 1 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

## 1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 and in compliance with the historical cost accounting rules, on an accruals basis and in compliance with applicable Accounting Standards, the Financial Reporting Standards for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

In preparing the financial statements the trustees have adopted the provisions of the revised Statement of Recommended Practice - "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005). The trustees have made use of the concession available for smaller charities within the SORP and have chosen to use resource classifications appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances and activities.

## 1.2.1 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charitable company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Incoming resources which are related to performance and specific deliverables are accounted for as the charitable company earns the right to consideration by its performance. Where income is received in advance for performance of duties contracted to take place in a later period, it is treated as deferred income and included within creditors. Incoming resources without such specifications are recognised in the period in which they are received.

## 1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Support costs incurred which cannot be directly attributed to particular cost categories, are allocated on a basis of time spent.

## 1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of those assets, less their estimated residual value, over their useful lives on the following basis:
