Report of the Directors

The Directors (also known as Trustees of the Charity) have pleasure in presenting their fourth annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2002.

Principal Activity

The principal objects of the Charity have been the advancement of the Christian faith and the relief of persons experiencing poverty and homelessness. This is in accordance with the Memorandum of Association dated 5 February 1998.

Significant Developments and Achievements

The Directors refer the reader to the Chairman's report which contain details about the development of the charity and forthcoming new projects.

It is encouraging to note that still a significant number continue to support the Charity through the Gift Aid scheme – mostly by Bankers Order donations which average about £270 each month. Our thanks and appreciation goes to all our supporters and to Beryl Watkinson and Jim Gilbert who have administered this item of our finances in the year under review.

We have received a further £10,000 from The Tudor Trust during this financial year (which completes the £25,000 of the original grant allocated over 3 years). The Charity has been invited to apply for further funding in the future. The grant received from the Tudor Trust has been a very significant part of providing financial stability for the charity.

In April 2001 we have also received a grant of £20,000 from the Colyer-Fergusson Charitable Trust. This has strengthened the financial position and secured funding for the shortfall of income over expenditure for Portland House for the current financial year and the next. In September 2001 the sum of £3,000 was received from The Chase Charity.

Various fundraising events have been held over the past year. We wish to highlight the fantastic success of the Charity stall in the Catholic Church Car Park organised by Ken Snare and his team of very willing helpers. The Directors extend their thanks to all individuals, groups and Committees who have tirelessly worked to make the numerous events a success.

In October 2001 we were able to celebrate the opening of the Charity Shop and it is a good opportunity to raise funds for the charity, but also to have an interface with the public and to promote the wider aims of Newmarket Open Door.

Financial Position

It is very pleasing to report the continued strength of our financial position. This has been mainly due to the continuance of gifts, grants from Charitable Trusts, donations and covenanted funds together with an increased level of Housing Benefits (Rents and Services). The full occupancy of Portland House and the more efficient management of Rent and Housing Benefit income have greatly reduced the pressure on Cash Flow.

It should be noted that the funding from The Tudor Trust, The Chase Charity and Colyer-Fergusson Charitable Trust are designated funds for the running and development of Portland House.

Our total income for all Charity activities at £121,923 has exceeded our total expenditure at £109,799. This has produced a surplus for the period under review of £12,124 and therefore increases our accumulated funds to £54,881.

Bank Interest amounted to £1,044 (£820 for 2000-2001). We would like to express our thanks to Lloyds TSB Mildenhall branch for their help and support.

The Charity has been able to support the Charity Shop with a loan of £5,025 to fund the start up costs. A payment of £2,000 has been made to repay part of the loan leaving the remainder of £3,025 still outstanding.

The Charity Shop, which is selling goods that have been donated to the Charity, has not been able to produce an operating profit for the first 6 months from October 2001 – March 2002. The loss for the period is £1,577. A review of all aspects of the shop management has taken place and improved procedures have been implemented. The Directors are confident that the next twelve months will produce the desired profits to safeguard continued financial stability.

We continue to support the Meal Voucher Scheme with an annual budget of £300.

Constitution

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NEWMARKET OPEN DOOR CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT 2001-2002

I am pleased to report that the year 2001-2002 has been a year of considerable consolidation and strengthening for Newmarket Open Door. It is wonderful to be in a position to celebrate 5 years Newmarket Open Door from a position of strength, although it should not be one of complacency.

Many of you will recall that this time last year we were in the middle of implementing an Action Plan designed to help us overcome some of the problems confronting the charity, which had arisen from historical and for structural reasons.

Our financial stability, built up over the years through the hard work and support of so many6 people has enabled us to tackle the issues confidently.

Since last July, Portland House, our major project, has enjoyed an almost continual full-occupancy and there is clear evidence of a real benefit to residents. We now also have an almost full complement of permanent staff.

As many will be aware, we are only able to provide the residents at Portland House with such a favourable staffing level, because Newmarket Open Door, as a charity, regularly funds the deficit between expenditure and income in the running costs of Portland House. We have been helped in this by significant grants from the Tudor Trust and from the Colyer-Fergusson Charitable Trust.

As it would be unwise to rely permanently on such grants, Newmarket Open Door is concerned to ensure that our own fundraising makes us, as a charity, as self-reliant as possible. For this reason in October 2001, we opened a charity shop in Old Station Road. Our shop is still developing in its work. There are still a few teething problems, especially those relating to the preparation and management of stock. We are keen to recruit volunteers to help in this work. Charity shops usually take a little time to establish themselves and we are confident that with the correct strategies our charity shop will soon form a solid base for Newmarket Open Door's finances, so that we are not only able to face the Portland House deficits with confidence, but also have a basis for funding the administration of the charity as well as a basis from which we can expand our work.

Newmarket Open Door is seriously looking at three areas of expansion. The first is to increase the number of rooms at Portland House from 7 to 8. The second is to develop a Training Centre, specialising in Woodwork, for our residents and also for other young people. This should be up and running within the next 6 months. The third is, in due course, to open a 'Move-on' house, so that our residents can move into affordable flats, where they will have a greater level of independence, but also a sufficient level of support still offered by Newmarket Open Door.

Newmarket Open Door has been able to flourish during the past year because of the support and advice of many people. We are grateful to Suffolk Housing and Forest Heath District Council, our partners in the project, for their continued support, confidence and advice. We are also grateful to Cambridge Emmaus for much advice, and particularly for the loan of their van and donations of household items. Without funding grants from charitable trusts, we would not have been viable. Without the enthusiastic support of volunteers, all our staff, residents, company members, my fellow Trustees, local Church congregations and the people of Newmarket, Newmarket Open Door would quite simply not exist. Thank you for your help.

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective March 2000).

Gross Income

Gross income represents donations, grants, housing benefits and rents received, and income received from fund-raising events. All income is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is receivable.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

General Household Equipment	20% Straight line
Office Equipment	20% Straight line
Shop Fixtures and Fittings	20% Straight line

Allocation of Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred and is allocated as follows:

Charitable Expenditure

All direct expenditure in respect of the provision of accommodation for the homeless.

Fundraising and publicity

All direct expenditure on advertising and promotion, including the cost of literature.

Charity Shop

All direct and indirect expenditure incurred in the running of the shop.

Administration

All other expenditure not directly allocated above, including financial expenses and professional fees.
