Structure, Governance and Management

Status

North Somerset Play Forum was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 16 August 2004 and received registration as a charity on 6 May 2005. The company registration number is 5206650 and the charity registration number is 1109353

Method for Appointment of Trustees

We would advertise for new management committee members in our newsletter and also ask people known to us who had particular skills that might be of use to the charity (a playworker, a community artist, someone who might be good at fundraising etc.) Initially potential trustees would be invited to come along to our management committee meetings to see if the Play Forum was of interest to them and vice versa. In this way we would ensure that prospective trustees understood and supported the Play Forum's ethos and working methods. Potential trustees must be local, community-minded people.

Objectives of Charity

Our aims are

- To enhance the development and education of the children of North Somerset (the area of benefit) through play including promoting multicultural experiences and the use of parks, woodlands, open spaces and beaches by children and young people
- . To advance the education of the public regarding the importance of children's play
- To advance the education and training of persons in the provision of play care, education and recreational facilities

Public Benefit

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities

Financial Controls

The trustees believe that existing controls are adequate to safeguard the assets of the charity

Investment Powers

@ PLAY has seen yet another busy, fun-filled year rush past – where has it gone? Our thanks go to North Somerset Council for their continued funding of our popular events in the current financial climate, also, thank you to their Ranger Service for supporting our Family Play Days in local parks

The Play Forum is seeking ways to become more sustainable in the longer term. We are currently looking for additional funding from other sources to support our services, including: tendering for local community based projects, developing themed parties/ arts & crafts sessions/ workshops (e.g. Pirate, Princess, Mosaic, CSI) with the support of the Toy Library; and looking at means of fundraising. We have built up such a multi-talented and enthusiastic team of playworkers and entertainers over the past 12 years that it would be a shame for us not to continue to provide free play activities in some form for local children and their families. We look forward to consolidating our links with the local Children's Centres, as well as developing new initiatives with other local organisations.

My thanks also go to Quita, who keeps it all going, to Ed, who is a complete star, and to my supportive Management Committee for their ongoing interest and enthusiasm for @ PLAY and its beliefs. Here's to 2012¹

Review of Activities and Future Developments

With continued funding from North Somerset Council and the Town Councils, we have been able to run all our usual free outdoor activities again this year and more families than ever have come along to enjoy them. It is impossible to give exact numbers, but we have had three different staff members counting at each event and, once again, we estimate that a total of well over 19,000 people have attended throughout the year, which shows what a demand there is for such activities

Family Fun Days

We ran our fun days at Easter and for six days a week during the summer holidays. On these Family Fun Days, we take a transit van full of toys and play equipment to the parks and we also have music, arts and crafts, games and sports and different entertainment each day (such as a puppet show, storytelling, or a dance, drumming or circus skills workshop).

Family Fun Days provide a rich, vibrant play environment which encourages children to pursue their own play agendas and they spread out all over the parks, playing with bricks, riding trikes, dressing up, climbing trees, bug hunting, joining in the scavenger hunt, or singing on the World's Smallest Stage Children are offered opportunities for creative and imaginative play, social interaction - and lots of exercise!

We've been running Family Fun Days now for twelve years and they have become lovely community events, which are intergenerational and intercultural. There are babies, toddlers, school children, parents, grandparents and carers and, although we don't do formal ethnic monitoring, more people from different countries and cultures are now coming along as well (which is probably a reflection of the gradually changing population of Weston)

Woodland Fair

We held our well-attended, annual fair in Worlebury Woods in June, where families were able to have a go at all sorts of traditional country crafts, as well as arts and crafts activities, den-building and generally discovering Nature

Music and Dance from Around the World

On 10 and 11 July, thousands of people came to Grove Park in Weston-super-Mare for our twelfth multicultural festival, which was a happy, friendly, exciting weekend, with loads to do and see. A big thank you to everyone who helps each year to make this such a special event — a real melting pot of children and adults of all ages, backgrounds, cultures and abilities!

Halloween Party in the Park

This was the last outdoor event of the year, with fire spinners, music, dancing, games, a Haunted House, and a firework display Children and adults came in a variety of amazing and wonderful costumes, carrying lantems and torches and, as usual, the park was brimming with people. An exciting and scary time was had by all!

Other Activities

We have also run arts and crafts sessions for children during the holidays at North Somerset Museum and at various events organised by North Somerset Council throughout the year

The North Somerset Toy Library

The toy library has settled into its new home in Locking Road and membership is up. It now has much more space to display and store play equipment and parking is so much easier there than at the old premises. Some new toys and equipment have been bought with the funding from the Quality Access funds and more families than ever are benefitting from these, as Ed also takes them out to different children's centres in North Somerset every week. We are very grateful to North Somerset Council for continuing to fund the toy library.

Financial Review

Unrestricted income received was £64,574 and restricted £54,101 during the year. Unrestricted expenditure amounted to £63,424 and restricted expenditure £54,995. The net result of this was a increase in total funds of £256

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately three months unrestricted expenditure or £29,000. This provides sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs in the event of a significant drop in funding. At eh year end frees reserves were £10,575, this is currently below the target level and the trustees are looking at ways to increase their free reserves.

Risk Review

A strategic review will be carried out in the forthcoming year to identify the major risks to which the organisation is exposed. The review will result in systems being put in place to manage those risks in future the Trustees will carry out an annual review of the risks faced and the procedures established to manage those risks. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of effective internal control procedures which ensure both appropriate authorisation of all transactions and consistent quality delivery for all operational aspects of the charity. These procedures will be periodically reviewed for their effectiveness.

Investment Policy

As income from funders is utilised within a short time after receipt, the trustees consider that the most appropriate policy for investing funds is to place them on short-term deposit

1 Accounting policies

a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005

During the year a review of the restricted funds have been carried out, this has resulted in the opening balances being restated

- b) Income from donations is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows
 - When donors specify that donations given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods,
 - When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred until the pre-conditions have been met
- Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- d) Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful life of that asset as follows

Office equipment - 33 3% p a straight line

All assets over £500 are capitalised

- e) Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees
- f) Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
- g) Rentals applicable to operating lease agreements where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease
