Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, on third of trustees who have been in office the longest retire at each Annual General Meeting but shall be eligible for re-election

Skills represented amongst the Trustee body include community media. mainstream media, voluntary sector management, financial management and charity trusteeship

Governing Document

The company was established under a Memorandum and Articles of Association which established the objects and aims of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10

Induction and Training of Management Committee

Prospective new Trustees are introduced to the work of Radio Regen by attending meetings with the Chair of the Trustees and with the Director and Deputy Director These briefings also cover the legal obligations and responsibilities of Trustees New Trustees are provided with an information pack which include the Charity Commission's "The Essential Trustee What you need to know" booklet the Charity's Memorandum and Articles and the latest published accounts. Training sessions are periodically organised for all Trustees to refresh them on the roles and responsibilities of the trustee body, and to discuss strategies for improvement as appropriate

TRUSTEES REPORT (cont)

Risk Management

The Management Committee has conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, young people, other service users and visitors. A major external risk that the charity faces is funding. In order to address this, the charity's strategy is to diversify its funding sources and to reduce reliance on grants by generating more income through the delivery of services. Internally, financial risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for the authorisation of all transactions, and systems are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety legislation. Radio Regen delivers its accredited training courses in partnership with The Manchester. College and course delivery is subject to The College's quality control systems. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they meet the needs of the charity.

Organisational Structure

Radio Regen's members are individuals and incorporated organisations with an interest in the work of the charity

The charity trustees are elected by the members and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. The Trustee body meets approximately every six weeks to agree the charity's programme of activity. The number of trustees is not subject to any maximum and at the end of the current period, 7 trustees from a variety of backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity were in post. The company secretary also attends trustee meetings but has no voting rights. Subcommittees are convened on an ad hoc basis to address specific issues (e.g. finance, examining new strategic directions for the organisation).

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibilities for the activities of Radio Regen rest with the Director and Deputy Director. The Director is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the specified activities, that key performance indicators are met, and that future strategic areas of need are identified and acted upon. The Deputy Director is responsible for financial management and day to day operational issues.

Related Parties

In pursuit of its aims and objectives, Radio Regen maintains partnerships with two core organisations - Manchester City Council and The Manchester College Manchester City Council and its partner body the Local Strategic Partnership (LSP) have supported Radio Regen in its mission to enable communities to use radio to tackle disadvantage since the charity's inception. The Manchester College has also worked in partnership with Radio Regen since it was set up in 1999.

Radio Regen is also recognised at a national level. The Department of Culture Media and Sport (DCMS) consults with Radio Regen on policy matters.

Radio Regen has retained a supportive role with ALL FM in South Manchester since they became independent from the charity in 2006 and 2010 respectively, with the Director sitting on the board of both organisations

Aims and Objectives

Purposes and Aims

The stated object of the charity is to advance education for the public benefit in the North West Region of England, in particular for those persons who are unemployed or otherwise disadvantaged, by providing training in the skills required for radio broadcasting and media communication which will assist such persons to become self-supporting or gain full employment

Aims and Objectives (cont)

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

Radio Regen's trustees meet every six weeks and in the course of these meetings they look at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those people that the charity aims to help. This enables Radio Regen to ensure that its aims, objectives and activities remain focused on its stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set

The focus of our work

During the year, the main objectives continued to be focused on the provision of a range of radio training volunteering opportunities, particularly for individuals in deprived urban areas. The strategies employed by the charity to help it meet these objectives included

- ~ Providing a range of accredited and non-accredited radio training courses at its city centre training base and at the ALL FM, Wythenshawe FM community stations,
- ~ Assisting organisations in other areas in the North West region to set up community radio projects through the vehicle of the Community Radio Toolkit website,
- \sim Developing collaborative strategic projects to enhance the effectiveness of the community media sector

Achievements and Performance and Financial Review

Accredited training

Radio Regen continued to run accredited radio production courses at its Hilton Street premises and at the Wythenshawe FM and ALL FM community stations. Several courses were delivered in the period, and learner recruitment, retention and achievement were high

Delivery of a two year Foundation Degree course continued and was well attended with many of the graduating students going on to attend a third year at Salford University to convert their Foundation degree into an Honours degree. A further intake of students started the course in September 2011. In addition to the Foundation degree, short further education courses were run at Hilton Street, ALL FM and Wythenshawe FM.

Wythenshawe FM

The beginning of the period marked the end of Radio Regen's on-going work with Wythenshawe FM (WFM), with senior staff working under WFM's direction to develop management systems and revenue opportunities for the station. This was supported by a grant from Manchester City Council and involved extensive outreach to local schools and other agencies. Radio Regen's Director also took up a place on the WFM Board.

Other Radio Regen projects based at WFM concluded in this period

- ~ Scott Trust this project ran until April 2011 and left a legacy of a volunteer team of new journalists producing regular reports for the station
- ~ Children in Need ended November 2010 Radio Regen submitted a grant application for WFM Children in Need to continue this youth work project, but this was not successful
- \sim Faiths in Action ran until March with more programming involving various members of faith communities explaining their festivals and beliefs

Other station activity is not reported here as it no longer falls under the remit of Radio Regen

Achievements and Performance and Financial Review (cont)

The Community Radio Toolkit and "Prove It"

The Toolkit site - www communityradiotoolkit net - continued to thrive. At the time of writing (June 2012) there are over 2,300 subscribers to the site and this steady rise continued in this period. Of comfunded development of the site successfully continued until December 2010.

With the Charity no longer involved in the direct management of community radio stations, it has been necessary to explore new areas of activity. One such area is that of innovative strategic projects - often achieved through collaboration - and an opportunity was identified from the persistent demand from community radio stations for audience research data. As a result, Radio Regen worked in partnership with ALL FM and secured an Ofcom Community Radio Fund grant to explore this area through the "Prove It" project which aims to enable stations to work together to conduct authoritative research in this field. Project work in the current period included adapting existing methodology to the UK sector and canvassing potential partners partners for inclusion in the project. The public benefit of this activity is to ensure the long-term sustainability of the stations so that they may continue to engage beneficiaries in learning and volunteering opportunities.

May 2011 saw the start of a project funded by the Association of Greater Manchester Authorities (AGMA) to explore the potential for radio training to deliver employability skills. This project involves research into the range of funding for employability training, canvassing needs from Greater Manchester community radio stations and running a pilot project. The project will culminate in a report fort AGMA that will be used to advocate greater funding for this sort of work - in the current period, research was underway and project partners were being recruited.

Principal Funding Sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are currently by way of grant income, contracts and fees. The single largest source of income was funding provided by The Manchester College to support Radio Regen's accredited training activities. The College also contributed by directly employing Radio Regen's course tutors. Grants accounted for approximately 30% of the charity's income in the period. Overall, total incoming resources were around 50% of the level in the previous year, due to the independence of Wythenshawe FM.

How Our Activities Deliver Public Benefit

Radio Regen's main activities are laid out above. All of our activities are based on the provision of education for the public benefit - whether to enable people to participate in community radio, to help them set up community radio stations, or simply to better their quality of life or chances of gainful employment.

Who used and benefited from our services?

Radio Regen's activities benefit people living in the North West of England, particularly the Greater Manchester area. These beneficiaries are divided into two main categories.

- 1 Trainees who attend our city centre training facility and the community radio stations where we deliver accredited training
- 2 Other community media organisations, which benefit from Radio Regen's shared knowledge capital, mainly via the Community Radio Toolkit website, the Prove It project, and the AGMA employability project. These organisations in turn offer public benefit to individuals in their areas.

Investment Policy

The negligible level of unrestricted reserves held by the charity means that there are currently no funds available for long term investment. The low level of bank interest rates in the period meant that it was not profitable to transfer grant funds received in advance to a deposit account.

Reserves Policy

The reserves policy of Radio Regen is that in the event of cessation of the charity's major sources of funding, the charity should have unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets sufficient to cover core staff and premises costs for a period of three months. The charity's strategy is to continue to build reserves through planned operating surpluses, but the Trustees are aware that there has been no year-on-year increase in the charity's free unrestricted reserves in the ten years of operation of the charity.

TRUSTEES REPORT (cont. .)

Plans for Future Periods

The charity plans continuing the activities outlined above in the forthcoming years subject to satisfactory funding arrangements. Priorities include

- ~ Continuing to deliver high quality radio training at the charity's city centre training facility,
- ~ Mapping the strategic needs of the community radio sector and creating new initiatives to address those needs. A grant bid has been made to Ofcom to enlarge on the AGMA employability project,
- ~ Exploring international demand for the process represented by the Community Radio Toolkit. Should this proves fruitful, the Charity Commission will be approached to broaden the charity's permitted area of operation. Further international work may be pursued to explore the application of Radio Regen's knowledge to refugee camps,
- ~ Further refining a forward strategy to best facilitate the future for the company now that it no longer holds a broadcast licence. This strategy will build upon the significant bank of knowledge and brand profile attached to Radio Regen taking a higher profile as a sector development agency (e.g. the Prove It project above), identifying needs in the sector, and procuring resources to address them

Directors Responsibilities

The directors are responsible for preparing the annual report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and regulations

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2011

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and with the Charities Act 1993

Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- Grants and investment income are reflected in the accounts when receivable
- Grants which relate to a specified future period are deferred
- Donations, gifts and other income are reflected in the accounts when received

Resources Expended

All expenditure other than that capitalised has been reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis

Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Charitable expenditure includes those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them. Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are included in the accounts at net book value. Additions of a single item or a group of similar assets exceeding £500, are capitalised at cost

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows

Leasehold Improvements 25% Studio/Technical Equipment 25%

Operating Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remains with the lessor, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they fall due
