Governing document

The charity is controlled by its memorandum and articles of association and constitutes a limited company by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Board of Trustees is ethically and financially responsible for the charity. The position of Trustee is voluntary, and one for which none of the Trustees or those closely related to them may receive financial remuneration. Trustees are recruited and appointed on the basis of necessary skills sets at board level and their under-representation. Candidates are sought through pertinent networks decided up on the Trustees. Appointments are made by proposal to the board which are considered and voted upon by all board members.

The one third of the trustees are required to retire each year and maybe re-elected by the board

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Dance Art Foundation is an independent national charity inspiring recognition of the cultural significance of dance, and advancing public and individual engagement, understanding and appreciation of dance as a contemporary art form

The objectives of Dance Art Foundation are

- a to advance education for the public benefit by the promotion of the arts, in particular, but not exclusively the art of dance
- b to relieve individuals who are suffering from physical or psychological illness or disability by the provision of facilities for them to participate in dance and the arts for therapeutic purposes

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Dance Art Foundation activity during the past year focused on its celebrated Breathing Space dance-in-health programme, as well as the growing choreographic work of Artistic Director, Joe Moran

Dance Art Foundation's nationally recognised work in the area of dance and health continued to be one of the charity's central activities. With the generous support of BBC Children in Need, True Colours Trust and Wallace & Gromit's Children's Foundation, Dance Art Foundation's Breathing Space dance-in-health programme grew with a new two-year strategic initiative comprising children's dance and health projects in hospices and hospitals across the UK. Delivered by an established team of leading artists, Breathing Space utilises dance as a unique tool to nurture physical, emotional and mental health, and has proved to make distinct contributions to participants' wellbeing. One of our hospice partners reflects.

'The children benefited immensely from the dance workshop [engaging] with a professional outside the medical profession who is there to promote a positive experience which can be shared with siblings—these can be few and far between'

Breathing Space projects in community settings also grew with a new partnership with Portsmouth City Council that supported healthy living for those experiencing obesity and for those with complex needs. The partnership will continue in 2011-12 with specialist training in inclusive dance practice for local Portsmouth dance artists. In addition, Dance Art Foundation continued its annual residency at Chelsea & Westminster Hospital presenting Breathing Space Dances, a series of adventurous contemporary dance performances taking place each quarter in hospital atrium spaces and on wards, often supported by participatory workshops

To increase understanding of the important role of dance in health, Dance Art Foundation collaborated with Guy & St Thomas' Charity to commission research on its long-term Breathing Space dance provision at Snowsfields Adolescent Psychiatric Unit Research has tackled the challenge of developing bridges in mutual understanding between the disciplines of participatory dance and medicine Dance Art Foundation looks forward to publishing the findings of this pioneering research in 2012

Dance Connections, Dance Art Foundation's professional development project providing specialist dance and health training for dance artists, has been developed over the past year through a new partnership with Chisenhale Dance Space in London Dance Connections London focuses on children and young people and will be delivered from September 2011 with support from the Kirby Laing Foundation, Hackney Council and Capital FM's Help a Capital Child It builds on the first Dance Connections project focused on dance and older people, which was successfully piloted last year in the West Midlands at Age Concern and residential settings in and around Coventry, in partnership with Coventry University

In the area of dance production, Dance Art Foundation was delighted to support the presentation of Artistic Director Joe Moran's 2010 production, Unsignal, at The Place in London Unsignal, is a complex and compelling new quartet choreographed by Moran for the celebrated British dancers Marina Collard, Annie Lok, Sasha Roubicek and Lauren Potter Dance Art Foundation also developed Differ & Repeat, a choreographic collection of live performance, film and installation curated by Moran in multiple spaces across The Place Differ & Repeat will be presented in June 2011

The Trustees of Dance Art Foundation have identified the charity's presentation of dance performances, and in particular the choreographic work of Artistic Director Joe Moran, to be a strategic priority. The Trustees recognise the importance of performance in its portfolio of activities and its invaluable role in maintaining the charity's profile.

Once again this year, the Trustees express their sincere thanks to chartered accountants, Chariot House, who kindly prepare the charity's annual accounts and to all Dance Art Foundation's partners, funders and financial supporters, artists, participants and audiences who make its work possible and meaningful

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease
