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#### CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

#### YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2015

The Sub-Sahara Advisory Panel (SSAP) has grown from strength to strength since its inception in 2009, and over the last three years in particular. We started out as a loose network of Welsh African-Welsh Diasporas individuals, and have evolved into to a sizable membership organisation, which works collaboratively with numerous local and international organisations. Panel members have played a major role in shaping the development sector in Wales, whilst also contributing to development initiatives in Africa.

A huge thanks goes to our funders, The Welsh Government's Wales-Africa Programme and The Waterloo Foundation, who granted SSAP funding for one year (April 2014 - April 2015), to provide continued support to Welsh African diaspora groups and individuals. Their support has enabled us to build our capacity and infrastructure, whilst increasing SSAP's reach and support for African diaspora groups in Wales. As well as our funders, organisations that we have developed links and connections with, such as AFFORD, BOND and NIDOS, also deserve a big thanks. I would also like to thank Fadhili Maghiya, who has been with SSAP for nearly three years and has overseen all of SSAP's activities and diligently worked hard to drive the organisation forward.

This financial year (2014-15) has had a major impact on SSAP's future, not only have we become a major player within the development sector in Wales, but we have also been able to successfully acquire grant funding for the next three years. The funding follows a successful partnership bid with 4 other organisations to run an initiative called Cymru-Africa Hub. Additionally, these past 12 months have also seen SSAP formally registered as a charity, as we were previously a limited company by guarantee.

As we look forward to our next financial year, we hope to continue to grow, recruit and retain panel experts and demonstrate the impact and value of skills found within the African diaspora. We also look forward to expanding our network, partnership and collaborations with organisation and groups of similar values and ethos.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Sub-Saharan Advisory Panel was formed in 2009, when a number of Diaspora groups in Wales met to consider how they might collectively advance their common interest in international development. Its initial ethos was to harness the knowledge, experience and skills of panel members and diaspora individuals from across Africa, to advise on how to deliver effective international development interventions, vis-à-vis, contributing sound understanding of the cultural, social and economic realities of everyday life in sub-Saharan African countries. The ethos of the organisation has since expanded to create a structured network of African diaspora organisations in Wales that carry out development projects in Sub-Saharan Africa.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Increased numbers of diaspora groups participating and contributing to the sector

SSAP are very proud of the fact that more diaspora individuals are now engaged in the development sector in Wales. By working collaboratively with other members in the Cymru-Africa Hub and sharing their extensive contact list, SSAP were able to increase the number of diaspora individuals and groups attending the Hub's training sessions, which have more than doubled since 2014. Furthermore, SSAP have also increased opportunities for these diaspora groups to connect with others across the UK. As well as the Hub training, SSAP has shared information, and facilitated events and with diaspora groups on issues such as remittances, FGM, disability and women empowerment issues throughout 2014 - 15.

Organised events to raise awareness of diaspora participation in development

As a result of this increase in participants, there are now more diaspora groups recognised through the UN Gold Star Award. The ceremony, which SSAP helped to organise, was awarded to 8 SSAP members at a ceremony that took place on 4th December 2014 at the Senedd. SSAP members delivered a 'How to act Inclusive' workshop at the recent Wales for Africa Health Link Conference in July 2015 whilst also helping to organise the launch of Hub Cymru Africa in 2015 at the Millenium Stadium. The event successfully fostered collaboration and seven learning links, two partnership links and one development link were also established.

#### Fostering Collaboration

SSAP fostered collaborations between diaspora and non-diaspora groups. For instance, the organisation assisted with the organisation and delivery of a conference on climate change, organised by the Mid-Wales Network. Also, their work with Disability Wales Africa (DWA) allowed diaspora groups, already carrying out disability projects in Africa, to gain advise and support from disability campaigners in Wales. This partnership enabled SSAP to organise their own networking event for diaspora groups, which was held at the Temple of Peace in Cardiff on the 18th August 2014. Here, members of DWA were able to share their expertise and knowledge to support these diaspora groups.

Furthermore, SSAP has worked with their partners to develop tools and resources used to support the sector in Wales. These resources include 'Developing mini-modules; the effectiveness framework with Wales Africa team and country profiles with IHCC'. More of SSAP's successful partnerships are in the table below.

Organising Development Training Events

On the 22nd February 2015, SSAP hosted a training session for diaspora groups in collaboration with the Wales Audit Office, about governance and grants management.

On the 3rd February 2015, SSAP delivered a roundtable discussion on two issues that SSAP members are very passionate about advocating for, and are also very topical in development at the moment: female genital mutilation (FGM) and women empowerment. The event was hosted in collaboration with BAWSO and it was attended by Baroness Northover, Baroness Randerson and Lynne Featherstone, then Home Office Minister.

The roundtable discussion on women empowerment was attended by African diaspora groups based throughout the Wales, where representatives from the UK Department for International Development (DFID) and Comic Relief, who fund many development programmes throughout Africa. The roundtable discussion was aimed at finding ways for diaspora groups can actively contribute to existing FGM and women empowerment programmes in Africa.

#### **Sharing Information:**

SSAP has worked closely with a number of key development actors in Wales, both within their partnership with Cymru-Africa Hub and as an individual organisation. As a result of being a part of the Hub's Steering Committee, they have had the opportunity to work with community and health groups, and to assist the Hub in delivering training sessions. As an individual organisation SSAP has hosted networking events in Cardiff and promoted development issues in the sector through their quarterly newsletter. They have also worked with partnership organisations outside of the Hub in order to deliver events, such as the international development summit and the UN Gold Star Award.

#### Organised consultation meetings and informal events

SSAP consultation meetings and events with Comic Relief, on issues such as remittances and diaspora engagement.

SSAP also organised events that encouraged discussion about development in a more relaxed and creative way, such as via film screenings.

#### **Consultations**:

- SSAP organised an event on how diaspora can contribute to women empowerment
- Co-hosted an FGM event with Bawso. There were 40 participants and panel members included three UK ministers, including Lynne Featherstone, Minister of State for Crime Prevention. A £10,000 grant for diaspora groups fighting FGM was announced following this consultation
- 30 participants also attended a Women
   Empowerment discussion between DFID, Comic
   Relief and Welsh African diasporas, which SSAP organised
- 30 participants attended the 'Scramble for Africa' event. Increased understanding of current discussions and developments in Africa and the sector as a whole

Evaluating Effectiveness - Training and events

Participation of African diaspora individuals at Cymru-Africa Hub training

The total number of diaspora individuals that attended the Hub's training sessions, between as of April 2014 and March 2015, was 33. Within this project SSAP has managed to engage more diaspora individuals and groups with the Hub's training in less than a year, compared to the total attendees during the 2013 - 2014.

Further to training sessions, the Hub also hosted a number of networking events and below is a breakdown of diaspora attendance:

In comparison to 2013-14, the total number of diaspora attending the Hub's training sessions as of April 2014 to March 2015 is 33. This is a 67% increase. As a result of this project, SSAP has managed to engage more diaspora individuals and groups with the Hub's training, compared to the whole of 2013 - 14. This number does not include those participating in SSAP's tailored training sessions, nor those who chose not to answer the question on ethnicity, or are of mixed origin. SSAP's grant management session had 10 diaspora individuals attending the event and 5 non-diasporas, whilst the governance session held at the Wales Audit Office had 7.

SSAP, along with community and health link, developed a log-frame to capture data. These development log-frames have enabled SSAP to understand trends and patterns, as well as progress made by diaspora groups. Feedback and advice given by the development support officers are collected in every meeting and training session captured.

Demonstrating Impact of the Effectiveness Framework Project

SSAP worked with Wales for Africa Community Links and the International Development Hub to design and implement the effectiveness framework to its network and the sector at large. So far, SSAP and other members of the Cymru-Africa Hub have tested the online framework tool through one or two members in their networks. Below is a response from one diaspora group, on the evaluation form distributed at the end of the project:

"Good job. I think the effectiveness is easy to use and very clear. It covers almost everything that you need to know when running an organisation and it helps small groups understand the importance of monitoring and evaluation and getting your house in order." (Anonymous).

This online tool generates a series of scores in different categories of organisational development, such as number of staff, amount of current funding and number of training sessions attended etc. The user will then add up their overall score, which will reveal where they are at in organisational development terms and suggest some advice. The scorecard, which will hopefully be beneficial to development groups in Wales.

As well as the Effectiveness Framework, SSAP have also been working with WACL/HUB and WAHL to create mini-modules, which are small, niche areas that are currently not covered by the Hub, and are complementary to their current training sessions.

Throughout this project, members of the African diaspora in Wales have been able to engage with other UK-wide developments movements that have been useful for diaspora communities in Wales, by creating partnerships and networks. For instance, SSAP mobilised members of the Welsh Africa diaspora to attend events outside of Wales, such as Comic Relief's 'Africa In Action' event in London. Seven SSAP members attended this monumental event, which was aimed at bringing African diaspora groups and individuals together to discuss issues related to the continent.

Since this Africa in Action event, SSAP have also noted a significant increase in successful funding applications from diaspora groups. Since the start of this project, a number of organisations such as African Mothers International, Mama Telema, Hayaat Women, Hope for Grace and Sight2020, have managed to secure funding from a wide range of large funders, such as Children In Need, Wales Africa Community and Health Links, Big Lottery and the Soulter Foundation.

These developments have not gone unnoticed, as the Wales Africa's programme was formally recognised these organisations through the UN Gold Star Award. The major difference on diaspora winning awards this year was the progression made by most of them from learning and partnership links, to development links.

#### Sustainability of the Project

SSAP has been working closely with a number of organisations including the Wales Africa programme, to ensure that this project is sustainable. This includes AFFORD in England and African Council in Scotland to share experiences of supporting diaspora communities in on the ground. SSAP have also taken part in roundtable discussions with other diaspora organisations and mainstream organisations such as Oxfam and Christian Aid, to discuss and ensure that the African diaspora in the UK are seen as active development actors in the sector. Furthermore, SSAP are also part of an EU-Africa Diaspora Platform, which is aimed at supporting diaspora groups and networks across Europe.

On a modest, local capacity, SSAP have ensured that diaspora communities are fully aware of opportunities to engage with the development sector in Wales. For instance, they have encouraged diaspora organisations to register on the Hub's mailing list, in order to get updates on resources, training sessions and networking events provided by the Hub.

This included publicising events through the network, arranging transport as well as supporting in delivering training sessions.

Partnerships with funders and mainstream organisations, such as Progressio and Comic Relief, have also vastly increased the contribution that the Welsh African diaspora make to the national and global conversation about development issues in Africa. Comic Relief have held two sessions on how they can engage and gain support from diaspora communities on issues such as FGM, women empowerment and remittances.

SSAP has also secured funding to continue with this work as well as covering other elements of 'inclusion'. Working under the Wales Africa Partnership, SSAP will steer the inclusion agenda and ensure that all parties involved, namely funded organisations and their partners in Sub-Saharan Africa, are aware and active in promoting inclusion in their projects.

#### Data Storage of Lessons Learnt

#### **Development Tracking Log frames**

SSAP has worked with the community and health link to develop a log-frame that will capture the number of meetings, advice given and any other developments. These log-frames allow for a better understanding of progress made by different links, obstacles and challenges, as well as a method for keeping track of the support from different organisations and partners.

#### **Sharing Information**

SSAP representative and other development officers within the Wales for Africa initiative have held numerous meetings throughout the year to plan and manage systems that could be supportive of the links. For instance, they have developed the effectiveness framework to allow links to evaluate themselves, which works in conjunction with the mini-modules they developed, which are short sessions tailored for specific organisations needing support. These modules are not currently covered by the Hub training, and will allow organisations to deepen their understanding of the development climate.
