Annual Report

The Trustees submit their annual report and the financial statements of SADS UK, the Ashley Jolly SAD Trust, for the year ended 31st December 2014. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statement of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and statement of recommended practice (SORP) accounting and reporting by charities issued in 2005 and under section 162 of the 2011 Charities Act.

Status

The Charitable organisation was registered in March 2000. On the 19th January 2006 the Registrar of Companies for England and Wales certified that SADS UK was incorporated under the Companies Act 1985 as a private company and that the company was limited. The company was Registered in England and Wales No. 5679989. Registered Office: 22 Rowhedge, Brentwood, Essex CM13 2TS. It retained charitable status and the Charities Commission granted a new registered charity no. 1113681.

Charity Overview

SADS UK is a cardiac charity working to prevent Sudden Arrhythmic Death due to abnormalities of the heart, which may affect a person at any age, even children. Conditions covered are those such as, Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy, Long QT Syndrome, Short QT, Wolff-Parkinson-White Syndrome, Brugada Syndrome, Catecholaminergic Polymorphic Ventricular Tachycardia, Cardiomyopathy and Arrhythmogenic Right Ventricular Dysplasia/Cardiomyopathy.

The Charity's Mission Statement is:

To save lives and support individuals and families who are predisposed to sudden death due to heart rhythm abnormalities (cardiac arrhythmia).

The Charity's Vision Statement is:

General Practitioners, primary care personnel and the general public all understand symptoms (and possible genetic implications) of cardiac abnormalities enabling them to gain early diagnosis and treatment. Defibrillators will be widely placed in the community and all schools and youth establishments will have defibrillators on site to use in the case of a cardiac arrest emergency.

Objects registered with Charities Commission

To relieve the distress of persons who have suffered from sudden bereavement or who are aware that they or a family member are susceptible to potentially sudden death through certain medical conditions, particularly, but not exclusively, by the provision of support and information and the provision of funds to supply appropriate preventative equipment (not normally met from statutory funds) to assist in diminishing the risk of sudden death. The objects comply with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission with respect to public benefit.

Trustees

All new trustees are appointed by the existing committee members after consultation and deliberation. New trustees undergo an induction session. During the session existing trustees brief them on responsibilities of Trustees and aims and objectives of the charity.

The charity has four main objectives:

- 1. To provide support to families who have suffered a sudden and unexpected cardiac death within their family and to individuals and families who are living with conditions that cause abnormality of the heart rhythm.
- To raise awareness and educate the general public and healthcare professionals regarding cardiac conditions affecting the heart, in order that those at risk of Sudden Arrhythmic Death (SAD) may be referred for specialist cardiac treatment.
- 3. To keep up to date with medical technology and new research advances, providing equipment to organisations and health care professionals to assist with the prevention of Sudden Arrhythmic Death and supporting research.
- 4. To guide government legislation and policy to safeguard people who may be at risk from Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome if not treated. To assist with their objectives SADS UK works with other organisations.

Meetings

SADS UK personnel took part in meetings to discuss the needs of people who'd experienced a sudden death and families living with inherited cardiac conditions.

AED (Automated External Defibrillator) Campaign

Some people will not show symptoms prior to suffering cardiac arrest. It is for this reason that the charity donates defibrillators in the community to help save lives. 136 Automated External Defibrillators have been donated to schools and 45 to sports clubs and other organisations during the financial year.

The SADS UK Big Shock AED Campaign made more schools aware of the capability of AEDs and the charity worked with interested schools to place these, together with training on the premises. SADS UK continued the Big Shock Campaign lobbying Government to legislate to make defibrillators mandatory in all schools. Letters containing facts and figures were sent to Government Ministers, as well as MPs to demonstrate the need for defibrillators to be on school premises in order to save young lives. The charity also donates defibrillators to other organizations such as sports and leisure clubs. During the year SADS UK has organized the training of over 1,500 people in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of the defibrillator.

In February 2014 SADS UK was invited to meet with Department for Health Policymakers and provided evidence in favour of putting defibrillators in all schools. In April 2014 the Department of Health suggested that schools included in their guidance that they may like to consider putting a defibrillator in place as part of their first aid equipment.

Dr Hilary Jones, TVs Good Morning Britain became Patron after presenting Lifesaver Awards at the SADS UK Lifesaver Awards at the Royal College of Nursing in London. Two teenage children were saved by a defibrillator being available at their schools and the lifesaving action taken by teachers when they went into cardiac arrest.

Dame Helen Mirren continued to support the SADS UK Big Shock Campaign, saying, 'I support the SADS UK Big Shock Campaign to make defibrillators mandatory in schools. It is particularly tragic to hear of young people dying of cardiac arrest. I understand how important it is to defibrillate a person in cardiac arrest as quickly as possible to give them the best chance of survival. It makes sense that all schools should have this lifesaving equipment in place.' Dame Helen Mirren was pleased to head the SADS UK Automated External Defibrillator leaflets that are disseminated widely in the community by SADS UK, charity members and ambulance services around the country.

Support

SADS UK continued to support people living with cardiac conditions or who'd been bereaved through SADS, providing an annual Retreat and putting families in contact with each other to provide mutual support.

Patient Support

Cardiac nurses signposted patients to the charity for assistance. A Patient Support Co-ordinator volunteer assisted the charity with supporting families living with cardiac conditions. By mutual consent the charity put families who were living with the same/similar condition in contact with each other.

Bereavement Support

The annual Retreat for the bereaved was held in Limpley Stoke, nr Bath. Qualified counsellors assisted people who contacted the charity. Counsellor Angela Morris continued with the SADS UK bereavement support service in the North West, both visiting people on a one to one basis and facilitating the bereavement support group.

Retreat

The Retreat was held at Limpley Stoke, nr Bath and proved very popular. The programme included visiting churches, candle lighting, a memorial address and a balloon release.

Newsletter

SADS UK kept its membership and supporters up to date with developments in cardiac care and activities of the charity, seeking opinions and sharing articles through the SADS UK Newsletter, 'Sensitive Hearts'.

Patient Support for young people

Facebook became a popular way for people living with conditions to contact the charity and the SADS UK Administrator, Patient Support Co-ordinator and teenage volunteer responded to questions and concerns via email. The recruitment of a Social Media Manager increased the reach of the charity on Facebook and Twitter.

Information about SADS Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome

The Warning Signs' leaflets were distributed widely to first aid trainers, health professionals and youth establishments, with more training organizations incorporating the Warning Signs into their training.

The stories of SADS UK members were featured in newspapers, magazines, TV and radio.

In Parliament

The Big Shock Campaign making defibrillators mandatory in schools

The Big Shock Campaign, highlighted that the Department of Health provided defibrillators to places in the community, however this did not include schools. The charity continued with their campaign to show how shocking it is that not all schools have this easy to use lifesaving equipment on their premises.

SADS UK continues to provide press releases when they have worked with a school to put a defibrillator in place. Over 100 newspaper articles were published during the year showing defibrillators put in place in schools by SADS UK, together with training of the equipment.

SADS UK National Conference, Heart to Heart and the National Defibrillator Lifesaver Awards - The Royal College of Nursing, Cavendish Square, London, Saturday October 18th

Over 100 people attended the SADS UK national conference, including nurses, doctors, first aid trainers, ambulance service personnel and charity members. The conference debated SADS (Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome) and how to prevent it. SADS UK's approach to help save lives in the community was discussed and the SADS UK Big Shock Campaign to make defibrillators mandatory in schools was presented. Saving Londoners Lives spoke about the work they were doing with SADS UK to encourage schools in London to learn CPR and put a defibrillator in place. Dr Juan Kaski, Consultant Paediatric Cardiologist spoke about Arrhythmic Conditions, identification, management and treatment. Dr Andrew Grace spoke about Research and targeted protection from sudden death. Retired Squadron Leader Alan Clark spoke about Air Training Corps and youth organisations understanding cardiac conditions in the young. Chris Goldsworthy, Phd Researcher supported by SADS UK gave an update regarding the work he is doing researching into the medico-legal aspects of SADS. Dr Victoria Jowett, Queen Charlotte's hospital spoke about foetal testing for cardiovascular abnormalities. SADS UK were pleased that the Chair of the UK Cardiac Pathology Network presented his perspective with regard to looking into tragic premature cardiac death.

People living with cardiac conditions and with conditions in the family told their very poignant stories. The mother of a cardiac arrest survivor spoke of when her 7 year old daughter suffered a cardiac arrest. A teenager who was resuscitated at school spoke of his thanks to the teachers and support of the SADS UK Big Shock Campaign for all schools to have defibrillators in place.

SADS UK Annual National Community Defibrillator Awards Dinner

SADS UK held their annual national Community Defibrillator Awards Dinner in May 2014, following on from the SADS UK First Responding Conference held at the Lifeconnections Congress in Kettering, Northamptonshire. The Annual National Community Defibrillator Awards Dinner honours people in the community who have done outstanding work placing defibrillators to safeguard their community. Four people were presented with awards for their work in the community.

SADS UK National Lifesaver Defibrillator Awards Dinner

The SADS UK National Lifesaver Defibrillator Awards Dinner 2014 was held at the Royal College of Nursing after the SADS UK National Heart to Heart Conference. Dr Hilary Jones, Good Morning Britain, presented the awards at the annual award dinner was held to recognize life-saving action taken in the community.

Dr Carl Gwinnutt, Vice Chair of the Resuscitation Council UK supported the evening. Dr Gwinnutt is a Consultant Anesthetist at Hope Hospital in Salford. He has been involved in all aspects of resuscitation for over 30 years and has 30 book chapters covering pre-hospital care, in-hospital resuscitation, cardiac arrest management, emergency airway management and anaesthesia, and authored five medical textbooks.

Research

The charity supported work looking into the basic mechanisms that cause sudden cardiac death at Papworth Heart Hospital. The charity funded the University Hospital of Wales, Medical Institute supporting a PhD student examining the intersection of medical and medico-legal knowledge, looking at the movement of genetic testing practice around SADS into the coronial system, exploring impediments to the uptake of genetic testing on the part of coroners.

Raising Awareness and Fundraising

SADS UK held the Heart to Heart Conference to provide information and medical updates. The charity attended the British Cardiovascular Society annual scientific meeting in June at the GMex in Manchester, exhibiting the work of the charity to over 2,500 health professionals who attended over the 3 days. Information leaflets about conditions that can affect people of all ages, even children were disseminated widely in the community; as was The Warning Sign leaflet that prompts people showing symptoms to seek medical advice. There were many reports about Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome (SADS) in the media, brought about by the charity and its membership. Many newspaper articles were published showing defibrillators placed by SADS UK in the community.

Highlights of the Year

In February 2014 the charity provided evidence to the Department for Education in favour of all schools putting a defibrillator on their premises to save lives. In April 2014 the DforE sent out guidance advising schools to consider putting a defibrillator in place as part of their first aid equipment.

Financial Review

The total income for the year amounted to £344,501 (£276,220), an increase of £68,281 (24.6%) upon last year. The Trustees are pleased with the increase in income which, after expenses resulted in a net surplus of £30,337.

This surplus will be used to finance additional defibrillators for use in the community and to fund research.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that reserves should be maintained at a level which is sufficient to cover not less than one year's expenditure.
