Exemptions

The directors have taken advantage of the exemptions available to small companies, including the audit exemption (see statement on balance sheet).

Aims and objectives

UKfAR is a member led charity ensuring that research is guided by those living with HIV/ AIDS

The objects of the charity are

"the advancement of education, for the public benefit, through supporting and funding research into preserving the health and improving the quality of life of people living with HIV/AIDS, and to publish and disseminate the useful results thereof"

The aims of the charity are

Engage people living with HIV with research that will be a direct benefit to them

International evidence shows best outcomes are achieved when people are engaged in their own care and when healthcare professionals and people with long-term conditions work in partnership UKfAR will involve people living with HIV with investigators and health care professionals in research that they have suggested and feel that is important to them. Studies have found that over 50 % of people living with HIV use alternative therapies to help alleviate side-effects of HIV treatment, they found that a greater desire for medical information and involvement in medical decision making predicted such use. However over 50% of patients who used alternative and complementary therapies had not discussed their use with their doctor.

Fund research that would not otherwise take place

UKfAR's activities do not duplicate those of existing research programs, organisations or agencies UKfAR augments and complements existing research programs, providing additional funding to sustain or complete on-going efforts UKfAR also funds research in areas that have not received necessary funding or require seed funding

Publically disseminate research findings

All research will follow best practice guidelines, research aims and methods will be published on the UKfAR website prior to the research taking place and all the results will be made publically available

Review / discover inexpensive interventions that complement existing therapy

UKfAR will primarily fund research into inexpensive, already licensed interventions that complement existing ARV therapies in the UK. Despite the success of ARV many people with HIV still suffer from side effects, poor quality of life and shorter life expectancy. Furthermore people living with HIV age quicker, suffering poor bone density, dementia, fatigue and nerve damage.

Publish articles based on systematic reviews of existing trials

Although other HIV organisations are excellent sources of news or information their remit is to report on published research or to answer specific questions based on existing research. UKfAR will employ a dedicated scientific officer who will undertake systematic reviews of randomized controlled trials within existing HIV research, analysing the research and publishing the findings in association with the SAC Research priorities will again be set by the Members and people living with HIV

Establish a network of researchers

UKfAR will provide a forum for researchers to share or collaborate on research, this will enhance collaborations between the principal investigators and their teams. This will also allow investigators to explore potential new areas of research and produce high-quality research on HIV within a long-term research strategy on aging with HIV. Where appropriate the UKfAR will provide training and support for Master's and PhD students.

In shaping our objectives and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commissions guidance on public benefit

Activities

To achieve these objectives the charity undertakes the following activities

- Raises funds for HIV / AIDS research Research includes both biomedical research and social research
- Produces reviews on existing research that can improve the quality of life of people living with HIV Research includes both biomedical research and social research
- Produces a website (<u>www ukfar org</u>) with information and support for people living with HIV / AIDS and allows patients to become members in order that they can discuss issues and obtain peer support through online forums and discussion boards
- Undertakes a survey on issues facing patients living with HIV / AIDS in order to identify quality of life issues and research priorities of patients living with HIV / AIDS
- Works with community groups, HIV organisations and biomedical researchers to identify quality of life issues and possible research projects.

In addition we also have links with similar organisations and attend community advisory boards with the objective that the needs of HIV positive people are represented in planning research and clinical trials

Grants

UKfAR will provide finance and support for individual investigators to undertake research, which will be guided by those living with HIV. The research will be independent and the results publicly available. The support is in the form of grants / scholarships that are awarded by a competitive, peer reviewed process for a defined programme of work. UKfAR will also provide support to investigators with many of the operational activities, freeing the researchers to focus on patient recruitment and retention and adherence to the protocol.

Any researchers / doctors who have a project that they believe would improve the lives of people living with HIV/ AIDS may submit a proposal for consideration. Eligibility criteria will be drawn up by the Scientific Advisory Committee. In general projects likely to be funded are small scale, scientifically rigorous and complement existing drug treatments (rather than as an alternative). They must also have as their aim the improvement of health for those living with HIV.

Summary of the main achievements during the period

The main achievements in this period were to set up the charitable company, building the website, registering as a charity and recruiting Trustees

A marketing campaign was launched on Google for World AIDS Day (01/12/2010) which attracted 441 people to the site over the three days the campaign ran

We also launched an online research survey in December 2010 to identify issues and research priorities of people living with HIV / AIDS. The survey is an extensive piece of research and has so far attracted 400 participants. The results will be disseminated on our website and at community meetings and conferences when fully analysed and complete.

In February 2011 we received a grant of £8448 from the Awards for All (National Lottery) in order to undertake outreach to people living with HIV. The outreach programme started in March which engaged 1000 people during the month, of which over 100 became members of the charity (membership is free). Further community outreach is planned during 20011/12 and the grant will be used to produce a leaflet providing information to people living with HIV, which will be distributed via HIV centres, community groups and advocates.

Constitution

The company is limited by guarantee and as such has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of a winding up of the company is limited to £10. The company's governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Organisation

The trustees who have served during the year are set out on page one. The trustees are appointed in accordance with the Memorandum and Articles of Association. At each subsequent annual general meeting one-third of the trustees or if their number is not three or a multiple of three, the number nearest to one third must retire from office. The trustees to retire by rotation shall be those who have been longest in office since their last appointment. Trustees are elected by the Group Members and trustees can be reappointed.

Future developments

The charity will continue to engage with people living with HIV / AIDS in order to better understand the quality of life issues and research needs of these people, especially as the age. In 2011/12 the charity aims to raise funds to employ someone who can manage the charity and fundraise for research. The charity also hopes to appoint a research director who can undertake systematic reviews of existing research and publish the results in an accessible format for our members and people living with HIV/ AIDS who use our website. Members of the charity will continue to prioritise research and the charity will raise funds in order to provide grants to biomedical researchers via an open competitive tender process.

Staffing

The charity currently employs no staff and relies entirely on volunteers and trustees

The company's policy on reserves

The company has no specific policy with regard to the level of reserves

Responsibilities of the directors

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company at the end of the year and of the surplus or deficiency for the year then ended

In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to select suitable accounting policies and then apply them on a consistent basis, making judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable. The members of the Committee must also prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the company, and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.
