The Trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and financial statements for the 12-month period ended 31st July 2019.

Structure, Governance and Management

Sheffield Association for the Voluntary Teaching of English (company number 3856216) was incorporated on 26 October 1999 and its Memorandum and Articles of Association govern it. Its legal status is that of a company limited by guarantee. It has no share capital and the liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £1. It became a registered charity on 17 July 2000 (Charity number 1081597).

The Board is made up of elected members, who are elected at the Association's Annual General Meeting. The Board meets on a bi-monthly basis. Two subgroups to the board were formed this year, Finance and Human Resources and Community Learning and Teaching which meet quarterly. Day to day project activity is carried out by paid staff and volunteers.

Charitable Objects

The objects of the charity are to advance the education and social well-being of people whose relationships are restricted through language difficulties or some degree of illiteracy, in Sheffield and district, without distinction of race, or of sex, or of political, religious or other opinions, by associating with the local authorities and voluntary organisations in the provision of facilities for the teaching of English. The Association shall be non-party in politics and non-sectarian in operation.

Public Benefit Statement

The Trustees of Sheffield Association for the Voluntary Teaching of English (SAVTE) take their responsibilities seriously and are confident that the organisation's activities meet the public benefit guidance for the Charity Commission.

SAVTE's activities this year continue to meet the aim of promoting the education, wellbeing, progression and integration of our learners, particularly those who cannot access mainstream English for speakers of other languages (ESOL) provision. SAVTE aims to help develop learners' competence in functional English language skills in order to become more active and empowered citizens in their communities.

SAVTE's main activities are:

- 1. Recruit and train volunteers to teach English for speakers of other languages.
- Support volunteers to work with learners who are unable to access mainstream education
 provision. The volunteers support learners to develop Functional Language skills in a range of
 settings. These are in the home, on a one-to-one basis, whether supporting learners in
 classroom, or conversation and activity groups.
- 3. Developing activities that support community development and community cohesion through working in Sheffield communities in partnership with local organisations to widen the opportunities that learners have to come together to practice English as well as meet with other people and engage with local organisations and services. Through this participation, learners develop skills and confidence and progress onto new activities or volunteering.

- 4. Delivering English learning activities at the Sanctuary Hub as a partner of the Sheffield Project for Refugee Integration and Growth (SPRING).
- 5. Developing and managing accredited and non-accredited ESOL classes on behalf of Sheffield City Council.
- 6. Developing and sharing ESOL resources that support living in Sheffield. Maintaining an open access to an ESOL resource and learning centre

The beneficiaries are adults from BME communities, a significant number are refugees and asylum seekers. They face a range of different barriers to accessing mainstream education provision, e.g. they may be full time carers, have a disability, live with a health condition, have no experience of formal education or lack the confidence and self-esteem needed to attend mainstream ESOL provision.

Through providing opportunities to learn English, SAVTE aims to reduce the isolation of the most excluded members of the Sheffield community. It encourages their participation in local activities to break down barriers and generate relationships of mutual exchange through learning.

The Trustees annually review benefits to service users to ensure that any such benefits are essential to SAVTE service provision.

Activities and Achievements

Following an organisational review last year we have worked to increase capacity to be able to support more learners in Sheffield, which meant recruiting, supporting and retaining more volunteers. Our approach this year has involved raising our profile to attract new volunteers, developing new volunteer roles to respond to the diversity of learner needs, developing new training courses, setting up volunteer support groups, developing online resources, and having more learner centred assessments.

We have diversified our offer to include a wider range of learning activities in local communities. We support groups in community centres, faith organisations, schools and libraries. Our new learner assessments help us to co-identify specific goals which provide a clear structure for our volunteers to support their learners. These new assessment tools also enable us to track and report on learner progress and outcomes more accurately. We continue to raise SAVTE's profile through networking, outreach and promotion through social media. We are a member of the SPRING partnership that provides an integrated approach for refugees in Sheffield.

However, whilst we have undertaken wholescale organisational transformation this year, we have still continued to deliver high quality English language support to many people who are disadvantaged by their personal circumstances and we are pleased to report growth in all areas of our operations. The tables below show that we have recruited more volunteers, established new conversation and activity groups, supported more learners and demonstrated positive outcomes as a result of our provision.

Future Plans

This year will be about evaluation and consolidation of our core activities - we want to be confident that our activites meet need, that our provision is making a measurable impact and that we have a clear forward strategy that ensures our sustainability.

Future Plans continued

Measuring Impact - we want to be certain about the impact we have and that our new learner assessment tools are person centred, and enable learners to identify their own goals including wellbeing, motivation, confidence, community connectedness as well as English language ability. Progress against these goals will be regularly reviewed and assessed at end of placement.

Exploring the role of volunteering in supporting family learning with ESOL - Many of our learners want to learn English so that they can support their children. We hope to work in partnership with Sheffield Council to explore how SAVTE volunteers can make a valuable contribution to **family learning** provision in the city.

Working with new communities - We are aware of the communities where we are not working, but where this is a need, such as Tinsley and the Manor. We would also like to develop our provision to enable us to meet the needs of the Sheffield Roma community, very new arrivals, destitute asylum seekers and groups of men who have not traditionally accessed ESOL provision and have "survived" within their own monolingual communities.

New "Welcome to Sheffield" resources - We will produce new ESOL materials which will be freely available and will include subjects specific to living in Sheffield, such as using the tram, going to the train station, waste and recycling and opening a bank account.

We are committed to **supporting community development** in the city and will continue to work in local communities and be open, flexible and responsive to community needs. We will continue to resource our community development and outreach activities to ensure we stay in touch with local communities so that we gradually become a household name in Sheffield.

We are extremely grateful for the support of Sheffield Council as well as the National Lotteries Community Fund and to all our volunteers for their time, commitment and enthusiasm to enable us to continue to provide such an essential service for many ESOL learners in the city of Sheffield.

Reserves Policy

We will hold reserves to a value of between 3 and 5 months budgeted expenditure. For 2019/20 monthly budgeted expenditure is £22,360 so we aim to hold reserves between £67,080 and £111,800. Our reserves currently stand at £85,163.

The reserves target will increase over the next few years as potential redundancy costs increase

1 Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities - Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective from 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have also adopted Charities SORP (FRS102) Bulletin 1 and have taken the exemption not to prepare a cash flow statement.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value.

b) Going concern

After reviewing the charity's forecasts and projections, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the group has adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. The charity therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

c) Incoming Resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Contract income is included in the year in which the service took place. The restricted grant and contract income to be spent on administrative costs is treated as unrestricted contract income.

d) Resources Expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

e) Tangible Fixed Assets

All items of capital expenditure below £1,000 are written off as incurred.

Depreciation has been calculated to write down the cost of all tangible fixed assets over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

Computer equipment

33.33% straight line

f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

g) Trade Debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

h) Trade Creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of the business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classed as current liabilities if the charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

I) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income receivable or generated for the objects of the organisation without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

j) Pension Costs and Other Post-retirement Benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Other income includes £6,076 which is a transfer from a separate bank account which was held on behalf of the Women's Health Project - an organisation which used to be part of SAVTE and secured this funding. It then became independent of SAVTE but closed before spending all the grant income. SAVTE contacted the funders to inform them of this closure however no funder contacted SAVTE regarding this. The Trustees of SAVTE have closed the bank account and treated the balance as unrestricted income, as it has been 13 years since the closure of the Women's Health Project.
