Report of CEO for the year ended 31 March 2020

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable Activities during the year 2019 to 2020

Over the past 12 months, Street Teams has provided: practical grass roots support to 195 people, this includes children/young people affected by abuse/vulnerable to exploitation and their families. There were 80 new referrals into the service, 32 female and 48 male. In total there were 107 young people (60 female and 47 male) worked with over a continued period of time, which includes support provided to 55 young people affected by child sexual exploitation, 27 young people affected by Criminal exploitation, 18 service users in transition (working with exploited young people up to the age of 25), 14 young people affected by gangs and 3 young people displaying inappropriate sexualised behaviour. Additionally there were 10 young people (all male) who were on the waiting list for support. We also supported 21 families (78 individuals including parents and siblings) affected by CSE.

The team provided 126 education and prevention programmes to over 7,000 school children / pupil referral units to raise awareness of the risks of exploitation and delivered 55 training sessions to 2,128 professionals, parents and volunteers.

Through the use of a bespoke CSE Outcome Star, during the past 12 months the following outcomes were achieved for CSE service users:

71%	Improved their choices and behaviour
61%	Improved their Safety and Security
46%	Reduced their drugs and alcohol use
56%	Improved their health and well-being (including sexual health)
66%	Improved their safety online
62%	Improved their safe relationships
56%	Improved their relationships with their family and other adults
60%	Improved their education/learning attendance

The outcome star facilitates discussion around each of the areas and is assessed in conjunction with the young person. This is used so that young people can see their transition and distance travelled and is held on our bespoke monitoring system.

Quotes from service users and their families:

I have worked alongside Walsall Street-teams for many years. I worked as a Police Public Protection Detective Inspector in Walsall prior to my retirement from West Midlands Police in 2018 and the Impact Street-teams had on the Walsall community was immeasurable. Street-teams were and still are the 'glue' that holds the heart of Walsall together.

There were many issues overlooked by statutory and partner agencies whilst I worked in Walsall, which Street teams quietly and diligently addressed, such as exploitation concerns, not solely Child Sexual Exploitation issues, which all agencies were focussed on. Street teams worked alongside exploitation victims and provided them with a worker who provided a long standing and constant relationship. As we know now relationships for victims of exploitation are essential and the key driver for empowering victims to disclose.

Report of CEO for the year ended 31 March 2020

Now I have retired from the police, I work at The National Working Group (The NWG) and Street- teams nationally are considered experts in terms of their knowledge and operational experience of working with exploitation victims and their families. Street-teams are a nationally recognised and a sought after charity for their training and insight into managing and working in the exploitation arena.

There are a handful of charities I have worked with who I would say have had a significant impact on their community and on victims and families, Street-teams are in my experience one of the most impactive and influential organisations, who really do make a difference for the community in which they work.

REVIEW 2019/2020

Writing a reflection piece is very difficult in light of the current circumstances but also a wonderful time of remembering another 12 months journey for Street Teams.

At the time of writing my report last year, so much amazing work had happened and we had so much that we planned to do and I am extremely pleased to report that all of our plans for this year have been achieved or are nearing completion, even in light of Covid-19.

Street Teams is proud to work in partnership with Walsall Council and this year I can certainly feel the "shift" from the local authority in terms of how the voluntary sector are represented as a partner. Our position within Walsall grows daily and this is also reflected with the strategic meetings and boards that we continue to sit on, but also help develop. To be involved with work streams such as developing new policies and procedures for the Walsall partnership, being part of the VRU (Violence Reduction Unit), Sexual Violence Strategy, Exploitation Hub and many more just solidifies our current presence within this field and this continues to develop.

We are very proud of not just our strategic influence but also our operational influence and once again, we have had so much positive feedback from professionals about the life changing services we provide, that these will continue to develop and flex to meet the ever changing landscape of Child Exploitation.

Our Child Exploitation team have continued to respond to all referrals of Child Sexual Exploitation and also Child Criminal Exploitation, the latter being a high percentage of our referrals this last 12 months, which has also had an impact on our capacity. For the first time ever, we have had to introduce a waiting list, something that we do not like to do. In an effort to combat this, we are in the process of applying for funding to increase the team's capacity, by fundraising for another post. In this current climate, this is also a worrying time, but we feel that the rise in referrals will only increase after lockdown and we want to be prepared to offer the best service to any child that has been groomed.

Our Adult's team is in its final year of "New Beginnings" and have achieved many successes with their client group that is just so unheard of. This is down to a team staff who work relentlessly to achieve the best outcomes for their clients, with a definite attitude of never giving up. When the funding for this ceases in March, we have decided not to continue with this service as the local authority will provide this service which will free up our team to concentrate on our core ethos, child exploitation.

One of our major successes this year has been securing a 5 year grant from the National Lottery Community Fund, which has enabled us to start our dream of our contextual approach and our early intervention in communities. The recruitment for this new project, "Community Futures" happened just before we went into lockdown, which hasn't been easy, but our three staff members have risen to every challenge and have utilised social media platforms to start to have key conversations with our local communities regarding exploitation and how they can play a part in preventing this. Not only will this team be trying to prevent exploitation, respond to exploitation, work with local businesses and community members to spot and report exploitation with our new campaign, they will also be actively recruiting volunteers to support the project. This is the very first time in our history that we have run a volunteering scheme, hoping to leave a lasting legacy with highly motivated and skilled volunteers for when Community Futures targets another area. We will be covering five areas in total across Walsall. This project is receiving a lot of national interest as we are being brave enough to focus on early intervention and Adverse Childhood Experiences in an attempt to prevent exploitation happening.

We have also been successful in securing further funding from Lloyds to develop our Transition project and now respond to any adults who have experienced exploitation as a child. We have found due to the ever-growing media portrayal of celebrities grooming children, this has opened up a platform locally with survivors feeling empowered to ask for support. We are hoping as this project grows we can support adults to bring to justice their abusers.

Our education programme continues to develop and this year we have looked at a spiral curriculum programme. Our approach to education is changing as we feel we need a more targeted geographical and community approach moving forward. This means we are aiming to educate children within educational settings, the wider community, their teachers and their parents at one time. We feel that we have a better chance of preventing exploitation if we have a whole area approach, rather than just educating children. I am excited to see how this new way of educating develops.

Report of CEO for the year ended 31 March 2020

In light of Covid, I want to mention how truly amazing my team have been during this horrifically difficult time. We decided at the start of the pandemic, that we were frontline workers. All of my team were more than happy to develop new and creative ways of working with their clients, but also to be out and about (with PPE) to carry out socially distanced one to ones, crisis food parcels, social media home schooling sessions, telephone support 24/7 to struggling parents and children, virtual education sessions and many more. In fact, the NWG actually used Street Teams as a best practice example of how to creatively work with vulnerable service users during lockdown.

Lockdown came just as we had settled into a new premises, after only being in the new building for a few weeks, but from our initial thoughts, this was a very positive move for the team and in a safer location.

We are preparing for the fallout after Covid and we are mindful that there will be a huge increase in demand for our service; this will form a lot of our direction for the next 6 months at least. We know that there will be an increase in grooming due to increased internet use, an increase in children being in vulnerable situations at home and more parents needing support to due to their other support services being stripped. Our plan is to navigate a safe and risk assessed move back to our office to tackle whatever this new world will look like, but in the meantime our team continue to receive referrals and respond to them in our normal way, with dedication and determination.

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

- a) To provide education and assistance to children and young people at risk of, or affected by, sexual exploitation and to relieve the distress caused thereby in Walsall and the surrounding area and in such other parts of the United Kingdom as the directors of the Charity may from time to time think fit.
- b) To relieve persons who are in conditions of need or hardship or who are aged or sick, including by the provision of residential accommodation for the relief of such persons, and to relieve the distress caused thereby.
- c) To advance education by such means as the trustees may consider appropriate.
- d) To provide facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation in the interest of social welfare for persons who have need of such facilities by reason of their age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances with the object of improving the conditions of life for such persons.
- e) To relieve unemployment for the public benefit, including by means of providing training and the development of workplace skills, among persons seeking employment but who are unable to obtain work by reason of of (i) their lack of opportunities or (ii) their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances with the object of improving the conditions of life for such persons.
- f) To promote the rehabilitation of persons affected by drugs, alcohol or other substance addiction or abuse.
- g) To relieve persons who are experiencing mental or emotional suffering and to relieve the distress associated therewith, including by means of providing advice, counsel, assistance and support to such.
- h) To promote and fulfill such other charitable purposes beneficial to the community.

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the guidance given by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Recognition, Appreciation, In Kind and Volunteers

The trustees are indebted to the various funding organisations, statutory bodies and various supporters for the many ways they make this essential work a possibility. Without their vision many lives would be faced with a different and more difficult future.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Total income for the year was £443,526 which is a decrease from the previous year (2019: £451,592) and total expenditure was £418,211 which is a decrease from the previous year (2019: £425,574), resulting in a surplus of £25,315 (2019: £26,018).

Reserves policy

Street Teams aims to have reserves in the band of 15% - 25% of current total expenditure. Total funds at 31 March 2020 were £239,664. Of this £63,529 was restricted, and £5,815 was the carrying value of unrestricted fixed assets. So the reserves available to Street Teams at the year end were £170,320, 40% of current total expenditure. Reserves would be used to cover any unforeseen financial difficulties that might otherwise impact adversely on the organization's charitable activities. The high level of reserves is not a concern to the trustees in view of the pressures likely to be imposed by the covid crisis, and it is expected that the excess may be absorbed in the near future. The reserves policy will be reviewed by the trustees in due course.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, its memorandum and articles of association, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

New trustees are recruited through informal advertising and are voted for at the AGM. An induction programme for policies and procedures is given upon appointment to the position of trustee. Further training is given as and when required.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

25% on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
