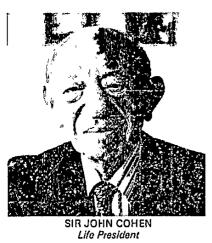

Chairman's Statement

To Her Majesty The Queen

Lam sure all our staff and shareholders will join me in gengratulating: Her Majesty on the occasion of Her Silver Jubilee.

25 giorious years.

I am pleased to be able to report that turnover for the period under review increased from £634,831,000 (53 waeks) to £721,303,000 (52 weeks), an increase of £86,472,000. Profit before tax increased from £25,052,000 (53 weeks) to £30,187,000 (52 weeks), an increase of £5,135,000. Adjusting the previous year's figures to a 52 week basis shows a turnover increase of 15.81% and set profit increase of 22.82%. The improvement in gross margins which we achieved in the first half of the year was maintained throughout the second half. At the same time we were successful in limiting the increase in expenses, and particularly wage costs, in relation to turnover, so that there was an improvement in net margins, I am pleased also to report that our earnings per share increased from 3.68p to 4,49p.

The most important recent action your company has taken was the decision not to renew the contract with Green Shield Stamps when it ended on the 7th June 1977.

I would like to take the opportunity of expressing my thanks to the directors on arriving at this decision and successfully effecting its implementation.

It had become quite clear to us that, with inflation, more and more of our customers preferred instant lower prices to deferred and devalued savings in the future.

So now our trading policy is for products sold in our stores to reflect in their immediate price the biggest possible discount and so help our customers to keep the cost of living in check.

The first weeks have been very successful and sales exceeded budget forecasts.

The increase in sales area from new store openings, extensions and refits during the 1976/77 financial year totalled 230,000 sq. ft.

Apart from the conversions of some smaller units for other uses by the group, we closed 18 branches during the year which had become uneconomical or redundant through our opening a larger store in the locality.

At the beginning of this year there appeared, initially, to be signs of a change in attitude by the Department of the Environment towards superstore and hypermarket development, but recent events indicate that this attitude has changed dramatically. We would be delighted to have the opportunity to continue to work with all local authorities in furthering shopping needs.

It is perfectly natural that Councils and their planners should wish to safeguard heavy investment in town centres and their local shopkeeper element. But there is now a volume of independently sponsored research that indicates that community shopping is left relatively undisturbed by superstores. Our belief, often stated by officials of this company, that there will always be room for the efficient small independent retailer, is borne out in practice: the small shopkeeper in the catchment area of a superstore is affected least by its presence, and indeed is frequently assisted by the overspill of new business brought to the area by the attractions of a large store.

Our aim is to co-operate with and not confront, local authorities in the development of retail units designed individually for their area and in this respect we believe we can offer the greatest degree of versatility in types of stores than any other operator in this field.

The Maidstone branch featured the company's first Merculator system among its customer facilities. This is an ingenious means of transporting shopping trolleys between floors and an important step in overcoming an inhibition on first-floor sales of heavy merchandise.

Five in-store bakeries were added in the year, bringing the total number of branches enjoying this exceptionally popular feature to twenty-five. We are now introducing a special oven to produce French bread and rolls. This operates within our bakeries to great effect.

Our development, in the larger stores, of frozen food departments catering for the still growing home freezer market keeps us abreast of other groups in this profitable sector.

Our ranges in all departments are attracting an increasing number of customers. We have improved our merchandising methods, widened our range of goods and used extremely effective advertising.

The total sales area of the group is now over 5.25 million sq. ft. of which a growing proportion relates to larger, more cost effective branches in which the resultant efficiency of operation benefits shopper, shareholder and employee alike. It will be seen from the table on page 20 that whilst five years ago there were no stores with over 30,000 sq. ft. sales area, this type of store now accounts for 18% of the company's total sales area.

Qur current development programme is most encouraging. For the next two year period it provides for twenty-eight new stores plus extensions to existing stores which will increase the total net sales area by over one million sq. ft.

We have invested £75 m. in new stores and warehouses over the last five years and plan to spend a further £45 m. over the next two years. This massive investment of £120 m. is placing your company in a very strong position to go forward into the 1980s.

Whilst our company is, and always will be a forward looking one, I thought that in this year of the Queen's Silver Jubilee it would be interesting to reflect on how the group has progressed over the period of Her Majesty's reign. I hope that you too may find interest in the enclosed facsimile of our Annual Report and Accounts from 25 years ago.

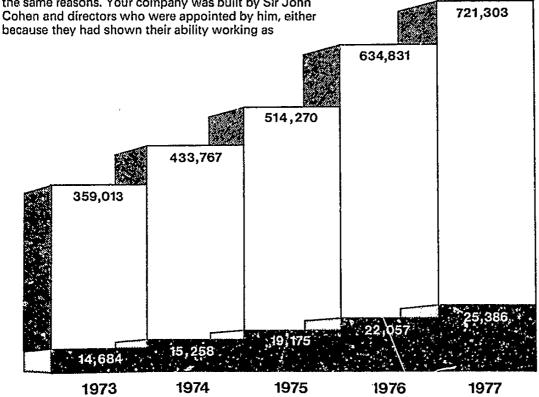

I am pleased to report that your company has been honoured by my being appointed President of the Institute of Grocery Distribution as successor to Lord Trenchard.

All have been bedevilled with rising costs in every sector of their businesses, particularly of raw materials and commodities but we have continued to enjoy their full co-operation throughout the year which helped to alleviate the full brunt of the price increases at retail level.

Our many and various suppliers have tried at all times to meet our very demanding requirements, and our relationships remain as friendly and as firm as ever. I would like to express my appreciation to them all for their efforts on our behalf and in particular for being extremely helpful over 'Operation Checkout' in delivering supplies at all hours because of the increased demand.

Directors' Report

To be presented at the twenty-ninth Annual General Meeting to be held at Great Eastern Hotel, Liverpool Street, London EC2P 2AN, on Friday 29th July, 1977 at 12 noon. The directors submit their annual report together with the audited accounts of the company for the 52 weeks ended 26th February, 1977.

Profits

The group profit and loss account on page 10 shows the profit for the period.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the company and its subsidiaries during the period was multiple retailing within the United Kingdom.

Dividends

An interim dividend of 0.6325p (gross equivalent 0.9730p) per share on account of the 52 week period ended 26th February, 1977 was paid on 2nd March, 1977 on the ordinary shares and the directors recommend the payment of a final dividend of 0.8267p (gross equivalent 1.2719p) per share.

Directors

A list of directors is given on page 1. Mr. D. Behar, Mr. R. Temple and Mr. G. R. Wood retire from the board by rotation in accordance with Article 85 and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

Executive share scheme

There is presently subsisting an executive share scheme adopted by the company in extraordinary general meeting on 31st July, 1970. Details of the scheme were supplied to members by circular dated 8th July, 1970. By the terms of the scheme certain executives of the group were given the right to subscribe for 'A' ordinary shares of 5p each in your company. Such shares were allotted on the basis of a subscription price which exceeded by 5 per cent the average of the middle market quotations on The Stock Exchange of the fully-paid ordinary shares of the company for the period of 30 days immediately preceding the atte of issue of the scheme shares. This subscription price was 61p per share, subsequently adjusted to 48.2p to take into account bonus issues. 1p was payable on subscription and the balance payable in certain events. Following payment of the subscription monies in full in accordance with the terms of the scheme the 'A' ordinary shares are automatically converted into ordinary shares for which an application for listing will be sought. The directors of your company and the number of 'A' ordinary shares that they presently hold are indicated under the heading Directors' shareholdings and interests.

Charitable and political contributions

Charitable contributions totalled £7,000 (1976 -- £8,000) but no political contributions were made.

Market value of land held as fixed assets

A revaluation of the group properties was carried out by Messrs, Healey and Baker as at 30th November, 1972 and disclosed a surplus of approximately £37,400,000 over book value which has not been reflected in the balance sheet.

Employees and their remuneration

The average number of employees per week during the period was 37,480 (1976 —38,783) —full time equivalent 28,413 (1976 —28,782). The aggregate remuneration paid to employees for the period was £65,047,000 (1976 —£57,013,000)

Exports

Exports from the United Kingdom amounted to £53,000 (1976 £3,900)

Number of shareholders

The number of shareholders of the company at 26th February, 1977 was 73,293 (1976---76,481).

Capital gains tax

The market value of the shares in the company on the 6th April, 1965 was 16.932p per share after adjustment for subsequent capitalisation issues, but excluding scrip dividend elections where applicable, and assuming the one for twenty rights issue was taken up in full.

Taxation status

The company is not a close company under the terms of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act, 1970.

Auditors

The auditors, Messrs. Hogg Bullimore & Co., have expressed their willingness to continue in office. In accordance with Section 14 of the Companies Act 1976 a resolution proposing their reappointment as auditors of the company will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

Accounting Policies

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated profit and loss account and balance sheet consist of the accounts of the parent company and its subsidiaries all of which are wholly owned.

Associated companies

Associated companies are not subsidiaries but are companies in which members of the group hold not less than 20% of the equity voting rights. Particulars of these companies are provided in Note 12 to the accounts.

The attributable results of the associated companies are omitted from the accounts since the directors consider that the inclusion of such results would be misleading.

Stocks

Stocks are valued on a consistent basis at the lower of cost or net realisable value at the beginning and end of the period of the accounts.

Depreciation

Depreciation of plant, equipment, fixtures and fittings and vehicles is provided on an equal annual instalment basis over the anticipated useful working lives of the assets.

Leasehold properties are amortised on the unexpired portions of the leases by equal annual instalments on the following basis:

Term of lease

Up to 21 years —over period of the lease

22 to 42 years —over 21 years

43 to 150 years —over period of the lease

In excess of 150 years -nil

No depreciation is provided on freehold properties.

Deferred taxation

Deferred taxation represents corporation tex at current rates on the amounts:

- (a) by which the accumulated taxation allowances on fixed assets exceed provisions for depreciation to date,
- (b) of relief in respect of increases in the value of stocks,
- (c) of other timing differences in corporation tax payable arising on income and expenditure.

Advance corporation tax on dividends paid and proposed, which is expected to be recoverable, is deducted from deferred taxation.
