# The Anna Freud Centre – reason for being

2012 marked the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the Centre's clinic by Anna Freud. Our founder had a twofold aim to help children in emotional distress and to train child experts and research the best ways to help children suffering mental ill-health. Today the Centre continues this work and is dedicated to addressing the biggest health challenge of our age – that of mental ill-health. The World Health Organisation estimates by 2020 depression will be the second most frequent cause of death and disability in industrialised nations. Every year 1.7 billion people experience a mental health problem – that is one in four adults.

Most adults with mental health problems had some form of mental health difficulty as a child. One in ten of our children has an emotional or mental health problem which is causing them misery and distress. The Centre improves the lives of thousands of children and young people with mental health problems every year. It provides a vital lifeline for families under pressure and it is the UK's only children's mental health organisation to combine practice, training and world-class research, with a focus on family well-being

# The Centre's impact

The Centre is addressing the problem of mental ill-health in four main ways, by

- Bringing together world class academics and clinicians to develop innovative treatments and breakthrough discoveries
- Piloting innovative models to prove the impact of our breakthrough treatments. Our practice provides specialist help for children, young people and their families, helping to put them back on track for a brighter future.
- Giving a voice to those suffering from mental health challenges. The lived experience and insights of children and young people help us transform the approach and impact on our own and mainstream services.
- Building a global network of clinicians and a research and training Centre to ensure our break-through
  models are scaled around the world. Our research and training improves the understanding of
  children's emotional problems through the training of health professionals, conducting empirical
  research and advising practitioners, universities and governments around the world. Our clinical
  evaluations achieve transformative service development.

The Centre is affiliated to two world class universities - UCL and Yale University It offers four masters degree programmes with UCL, one of which is also offered with Yale, and undertakes collaborative research projects with both universities AFC and Yale deliver a range of shared clinical, training and research activities through the AFC Yale Bridge Programme

The Centre relies on voluntary donations from the public, trusts and companies, together with fees from training activities and the provision of services to fund its work

### STRATEGIC DIRECTION

The Centre has developed a strategy to ensure that its work is focused in areas where we will be able to make the greatest impact, whether this is through developing and delivering innovative services, training allied professionals and postgraduate students or undertaking empirical research. - Establishing partnerships and collaborations to ensure the most effective delivery of our strategy
- Integrating and disseminating information about the latest research relating to children and young people with emotional and behavioural difficulties
- Promoting outcomes-based and evidence-informed practice

### **OBJECTIVES**

Over the 12 month period (1<sup>st</sup> September 2011 to 31<sup>st</sup> August 2012), the Centre offered a range of clinical services and preventive projects, training activities and research initiatives. Specific objectives and achievements for the year included -

- Continuing to improve the effectiveness of all our interventions offered to children, young people and their families with a full review of clinical governance and a growing focus on developing innovative support for families where parents are experiencing mental ill-health
- In the context of the new commissioning environment, considering if AFC's clinical services could most effectively be offered through more formal partnership/s with other service providers
- Further developing the involvement of service users and key stakeholders through the appointment of a dedicated Participation Officer and developing a full participation strategy
- Refining our postgraduate courses to ensure continued quality and successful student recruitment
- Continuing to develop the work of the Developmental Neuroscience Unit, the Evidence Based Practice
  Unit and other research activities through the submission of several major grant applications and
  publication of a number of articles in high impact journals
- Maintaining diverse sources of income from fundraising and fees for services and training
- Developing our individual donor base, particularly through the development of our Major Donor Group and Events Committee

# PRACTICE - Highlights

# Innovation award

In June the Centre's AMBIT (Adolescent Mentalization-based Integrative Treatment) project won the Guardian / Virgin Media Innovation Nation award under the category of Collaboration This rewards the most innovative use of technology in the UK public and private sector

Developed by the Centre and its collaborators AMBIT is a team approach to work with adolescents which enables the multi-agency partnerships around young people to work together when helping young people who find it difficult to access mainstream services. Using innovative technology the project developed an interactive web based manual which trains and supports a network of field workers to offer immediate and accessible support to young people in crisis. The project's use of open source technology gives teams a digital advantage, as it enables a network of field workers to locally customize the online manual, and share and compare content, ensuring that troubled and excluded young people have access to the best possible practice.

# **Borderline Personality Disorder - Supporting Families**

A central theme within our Practice continues to be supporting people with a diagnosis of Personality Disorder and our developing model of 'Vertical Integration'. The latter seeks wherever possible to treat parents and children as one family unit and to go beyond separate care and intervention which is often the model in mainstream services.

# Families and Carers Treatment and Support Programme (FACTS)

During the period AFC developed and secured funding for phase one of its FACTS project. Families and Carers Treatment and Support Programme. Families of patients with Borderline Personality Disorder (BPD) can struggle to cope with their own feelings, leaving them traumatized, disempowered and unsure how best to help their relative. Yet, support and advice for these families is rarely available and, when it is, is often misleading, sometimes offensive, frequently confusing and generally unhelpful.

FACTS will develop and evaluate a support programme for families, friends, partners and others who are involved with people with borderline personality disorder with the aim of improving family wellbeing and reducing usage of crisis services. At the end of the programme, a few of the family members will be offered additional training in the delivery of the support programme to others and a final manual will be agreed based on the experience of the participants. In the coming year preliminary work will be undertaken on developing phase two of the project, whether the effectiveness of the dissemination of the FACTS project in reducing family crises related to problems associated with BPD can be investigated in a randomised controlled trial

# **Families with Complex Needs**

The Centre continued its two-year Early Years Parenting Unit which pilots an innovative intervention for families with children under five before they reach a crisis such as the children being removed from their parents' care or Social Services making a referral for assessment to the family courts. Based in Holloway, North London, the Unit works collaboratively with Social Care and Health, offering a day unit programme where the parents have an actual or potential diagnosis of Personality Disorder. In addition to refining the intervention, the programme focussed on preparing a manual of the intervention, ready to roll out as a national training programme at the end of the pilot project so that the benefits for parents and children can be replicated nationally. There is also extensive work being undertaken to secure future commissioning to ensure the continuation of the Unit beyond its initial Department of Education two-year grant funded pilot phase.

# Collaborative working

During the period the Board and Executive have focussed on the future of the Centre's clinical services, against the background of funding cuts and a transformed landscape for commissioned services. Our aim is to strengthen and build the capacity of our clinical work to ensure it continues to develop and thrive in the new operating environment. We are exploring whether the Centre might enter into a formal partnership with Marlborough Family Service (MFS), an NHS clinic with which the Centre has collaborated over many years. To date one outcome of this exploration is a joint bid with Marlborough colleagues to the Department of Education for an Alternative Provision Free School for children who are psychologically unwell and cannot attend mainstream school. The Centre continues to work with Central North West London Trust to consider the feasibility of formal partnership with MFS, with a decision deadline of end of July 2013.

# Participation and Shared Decision Making

The Centre appointed its first dedicated Participation Officer to support its commitment to involving stakeholders throughout the organisation's range of activities. In its practice the Centre has a commitment to service user involvement, hearing the voices of all family members including young people, parents, carers and other service users. We have identified a model of collaboration and shared decision making between service users (in particular young people who are all too often disempowered by current processes) and service providers in relevant aspects of clinical intervention as being the core approach that the Centre would like to develop During the period a Participation Strategy was developed and embedded within the organisation

# Evaluating all that we do

The Centre's Service Development and Evaluation Programme is able to offer ongoing evaluation of its services by an in-house team of experts. Amongst several strands of evaluation work, the Programme developed and launched an evaluation plan for the Hearing Voices. This project offers group work for young people who hear voices, but may or may not have mental health issues.

In a second strand of evaluation work, and building on its previous evaluation of AFC's Kidstime project, the Programme is now developing a bid for a randomised controlled trial of Kidstime. This project supports families where at least one of the parents has a mental illness. It is a social-educational intervention and is the only service that offers a mixed element for the parent and the child(ren) to attend together. Its focus is on the children and aims to support them in living with parents with mental illness.

# **LEARNING** - highlights

# **Postgraduate Studies**

The postgraduate market is increasingly competitive nationally and internationally. The Centre has continued to respond by broadening its portfolio of courses and ensuring excellence in the quality of its programmes. Applications for the new, two-year MSc in Developmental Psychology and Clinical Practice were heavily oversubscribed last year and the maximum number of 12 students were accepted for September 2012 entry. The course is aimed at students who wish to develop core clinical competencies in working with children and families with the aim of pursuing further clinical training (clinical psychology or psychotherapy)

In Autumn 2011 the Diploma in Child IAPT (Improving Access to Psychological Therapies) was launched and teaching began at the Centre It is part of a major Government NHS initiative to train staff in England and Wales to help improve access to psychotherapies. UCL with King's College London (KCL) won the tender in a joint bid to deliver this training in collaboration with the Anna Freud Centre. The aim of Child IAPT is to train a wide range of existing CAMHS (Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services) workers, from a variety of clinical backgrounds on evidence-based approaches to parent intervention, anxiety and depression

During the year there was a broad review of modules delivered across the Centre's Postgraduate Studies Programme to achieve efficiencies. There was a particular focus on ensuring that our longstanding MSc in Psychoanalytic Developmental Psychology remained attractive and appealing by both reviewing its syllabus and offering to facilitate clinical placements for students who wish to increase their clinical experience Applications for this course continued to be oversubscribed. Further work was undertaken to develop the new MSc in Developmental Psychology and Clinical Practice, specifically through setting up a mechanism for clinical placements in NHS services.

# Training to support Infancy and Early Years

In January the newly launched International Training School in Infancy and Early began to deliver its first training modules. The School is a collaboration of the Anna Freud Centre and the Yale University

Child Study Center with the Tavistock and Portman NHS Foundation Trust which aims to set evidenced, expert agreed standards of knowledge and skills that a broad range of practitioners need to work effectively with infants, young children and their families. Its curriculum encompasses cutting edge research and clinical developments within a multidisciplinary context.

# Outcomes-based and evidence-informed practice

The Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services Evidence Based Practice Unit (CAMHS EBPU) is an academic Unit which is part of the Anna Freud Centre and UCL. It bridges the worlds of academic research and mental health practice, whether in clinics, schools or elsewhere. The Unit brings together researchers, clinicians, statisticians, graphic designers and trainers and works with front line practitioners, service users, service managers, commissioners, policy makers and others to improve service provision by shining a light on current practice. The EBPU draws on and contributes to the latest research, and develops practical tools, training and information.

Despite the increasingly competitive environment, EBPU has been pleased to be involved in or lead a number of successful bids during the year. Joint with the CAMHS Outcomes Research Consortium (CORC), the central team of which learning collaboration is based at the EBPU, the Unit won a European tender for collation and analysis of all data arising from the national CYP Improving Access to Psychological Therapies project. The Unit also won a Department of Health bid to develop further its work in shared decision making and continues to work with colleagues across physical health as part of the Department of Health funded Child Health Policy Research Unit, and with colleagues across the voluntary sector as part of the Department of Education funded Better Outcomes New Delivery (BOND) project. The Unit has also developed a number of specific trainings for clinicians and others including in use of routine outcome measures and data in clinical practice.

# Research

# The Developmental Neuroscience Unit (DNU)

The DNU is a collaboration between The Anna Freud Centre, UCL and the Yale Child Study Center—It undertakes cutting-edge research in developmental psychology, combining the latest techniques and methods from social science, combined with neuroscience—Highlights for the Unit in the period have included AFC becoming a site for a major research initiative in collaboration with UCL and the University of Cambridge—This new study will examine the longitudinal development of a large cohort of young people to track the relationship between emotional and behavioural development and underlying brain function and structure

Ethical approval was gained for a new study to examine changes in brain functioning achieved by Multi-systemic therapy in adolescent boys with severe conduct disorder problems. Finding effective treatments for conduct disorder is a pressing health priority. Conduct disorder is the most common childhood psychiatric disorder, which in over 50% of cases leads to anti-social personality in adulthood — a huge social and economic burden on society.

# Research on the impact of abuse

During the period, the Anna Freud Centre in collaboration with UCL, published the first ever fMRI brain scan study to investigate the impact of physical abuse and domestic violence on children. This study, which was widely reported in the media, demonstrated that children exposed to family violence show a similar pattern of activity in their brains as soldiers exposed to combat. Scientists leading the study suggest that both maltreated children and soldiers may have adapted to be 'hyper-aware' of danger in their environment. Such findings may help explain why children exposed to family violence are at greater risk of developing anxiety problems later in life. This groundbreaking research is an important step towards better understanding the devastation which exposing children to violence can leave in its wake. The study outcomes will help support clinicians and social workers in understanding the way in which abuse can impact children, and contribute to the development of more effective prevention and treatment strategies to protect children from the consequences of maltreatment.

# The Anna Freud Centre - Yale Child Study Center Bridge Programme

This Bridge programme continues to have an active exchange of clinical knowledge, learning and experience across the Yale Child Study Center and AFC. A particular feature of the past year has been the continued growing collaborations between the Developmental Neuroscience Units at the two sites.

# 2012/13 PLANS

During the coming year we will continue to build on progress made in 2011/12 Specific targets include

- A business planning review and the development of a new, five year business plan
- Continuing to improve the effectiveness of all our interventions offered to children, young people and their families
- The finalising of AFC's clinical strategy, including the launch and development of a best in class full
  fee service to inform best practice and to provide income to help underwrite the costs of the Centre's
  community clinical services
- To complete clinical partnership and collaboration arrangements
- In the light of the reduction of services in the NHS for severe disturbances in children and young people to find resources to increase our clinical services to this group by 50% at least
- To partner with NHS provider organizations in improving the cost-effectiveness of our service delivery
- To remodel our relationship with the NHS in line with the reorganisation of the NHS as a commissioning organisation and the recognition of the key role that the voluntary sector plays in service provision to the NHS as a qualified provider
- The consolidation of our Mentalization Based Treatment (MBT) training and dissemination activities, through the development of a more formalised MBT Network
- To continue to refine our postgraduate courses to ensure continued quality and successful student recruitment
- Continuing to develop the work of the Developmental Neuroscience and Evidence Based Practice Units
- · Increasing the profile of the Centre and to refine its communications strategy
- Maintaining diverse sources of income from fundraising and fees for services and training
- Developing our individual donor base, particularly through the development of our Major Donor Group and Events Committee.

# **PUBLIC BENEFIT**

The principal charitable objective of the Centre, as set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association, is the promotion for the public benefit of the relief of mental illness or disorder and the protection and preservation of mental and emotional health. In setting plans and priorities for all the Anna Freud Centre's activities, the Trustees have had regard to the guidance from the Charity Commission on the provision of public benefit. The Board of Trustees consider how the Centre's activities contribute to meeting the objectives set out in the Business Plan. The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission in determining the activities undertaken by the charity

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Anna Freud Centre is a registered charity (number 1077106). It is set up under its Memorandum and Articles of Association, as a company limited by guarantee (registration number 3819888).

The Board of Trustees are the charity's trustees and the legal directors of the company. They serve a four-year term, after which they are eligible for reappointment. New trustees are selected through open recruitment. Emphasis is placed on ensuring representation from key stakeholders and any identified skills gap within the Board at the time of recruiting. The Chair identifies Trustees' training needs with the Board.

The Board of Trustees meet three times a year. The Board set and review strategy and monitor operational matters. The Finance Committee is a sub-committee of the Board of Trustees and its membership includes the Chair and Treasurer. Before submission to the full Board, the Finance Committee review the annual accounts, issues relating to internal or external audits, investment and reserves' policies and the remuneration of senior staff. Matters not reserved for decision by the Board of Trustees are delegated to the Centre's Executive its Directorial Team and the General Manager. The Directorial Team comprises the Chair of the Team who is also a Trustee, the Chief Executive and the Professional Director.

# Internal control and risk management

The Board of Trustees has responsibility for ensuring the Centre has in place an appropriate system of financial controls to provide assurance that the charity is operating efficiently and effectively, its assets are safeguarded and that proper records are maintained. Also that financial information used within the Centre for publication is reliable and that the charity complies with relevant laws and regulations. The Finance Committee examines the effectiveness of internal systems of financial control on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

The Centre's systems of financial control include

- a business plan and annual budget approved by the Board
- · regular review by the Board of actual results compared to budget and plan
- · delegation of authority to spend within defined limits
- · Identification and management of risk by the Board, Directorial Team and General Manager

The Trustees continue to review the register of risks, which identifies the types of risk and assesses their likelihood of occurrence, potential impact and means of mitigation




# **Key Financial Statistics**

The year to 31<sup>st</sup> August 2012 has been one of growth which has characterised the Anna Freud Centre for the last few years However the deficit has continued as in previous years. This has been funded by the Anna Freud Centre's reserves to continue and develop services. The objective is to reach a breakeven financial basis for the overall organisation.






Expenditure reflects our activities and is made up of 79% personnel costs

The Statement of Financial Activities shows that gross income has increased from £4.2m to £5.3m an increase of 25% and gross expenditure increased by 21% to £5.3m. This reflects the continued growth of the Anna Freud Centre during the year with a measured increase in activity. There was a net inflow for the year of £350k which is due to the sale of the Marilyn Monroe rights of publicity and gains made in investments, so the free reserves of the Centre stood at £5m at 31<sup>st</sup> August 2012.

# **Reserves Policy**

The trustees have reviewed the reserves' policy and concluded that it should remain unchanged, i.e. that the Centre needs to maintain the current level of general reserve to provide essential investment income and a buffer against the variability of its major sources of income

Free reserves available for use by the Charity are deemed to be those that are readily realisable, less those funds whose uses are restricted or else designated for particular purposes. This therefore excludes the Restricted Funds, which are earmarked for a particular purpose by those who provide them, central government, local authorities and grant making bodies and the Designated Funds, which have been set aside by the trustees as funds for future development.

The remaining funds are the Base Fund, which the trustees consider essential for the Anna Freud Centre to build up as a fund which will ensure that the charity has security to maintain its administrative resources and the General funds, which represents the balance of the Centre's funds. With the current economic climate and continued budget deficit projection for the year, it is a key objective to ensure that the base fund remains intact and that it grows in line with service delivery to ensure that working capital levels are retained

# **Investment Policy and Performance**

In accordance with the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the trustees have the power to invest in such stocks, shares, investments and property in the UK as they see fit. The policy is to maintain a balanced approach, maximising the long-term capital return after providing a target total return of £250,000. (The management of the Centre's investment funds was reallocated equally between BlackRock and Ruffer LLP)

# TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also directors of the Anna Freud Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to

- · Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- · Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- State whether applicable UK Accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time of the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2012

# 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### a) Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2005)

# b) Depreciation

Freehold properties are included in the financial statements at valuation. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a straight line basis over its expected useful life, as follows

Freehold properties

2% per annum

Furnishings and equipment

25% per annum

### c) Investments

Investments are included in the balance sheet at market value. It is the charity's policy to keep valuations up to date such that when investments are sold there is no gain or loss arising relating to previous years. As a result the statement of financial activities does not distinguish between the valuation adjustments relating to sales and those relating to continued holdings as they are together treated as changes in the value of the investment portfolio throughout the year

# d) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are accounted for as they become available to the charity

# e) Translation of Foreign Currencies

Bank balances in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the year end and any exchange differences together with exchange differences arising from the conversion of grants received in foreign currencies into sterling during the year are included in the statement of financial activities

# f) VAT

Where appropriate, expenditure includes irrecoverable value added tax

# g) Resources Expended

Direct costs have been charged to the relevant cost category, and shared costs have been allocated on a basis consistent with the budgeted use of resources. Governance costs include costs incurred in meeting constitutional and statutory requirements.

# h) Pension Costs

For defined contribution schemes the amount charged to the profit and loss account in respect of pension costs is the contributions payable in the year. Differences between contributions payable in the year and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments in the balance sheet.

# i) Fund Accounting

General funds consist of amounts available to the trustees to be applied at their discretion within the objects of the charity. Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds which have been set aside at the discretion of the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds consist of amounts subject to special trusts within the objects of the charity either imposed by the donor or by the terms of the appeal

# What Happened Next

What Happened Next investigates outcomes for children in care proceedings and shares the findings with agencies and professionals in order to inform policy and practice and improve children's lives. The study is examining the impact of recommendations made by the Anna Freud Centre and NHS Islington Primary Care Trust's Family Assessment Service in order to assess how the placement and treatment recommendations have contributed to positive change in the children's development

# The Early Years Parenting Unit (EYPU)

The Early Years Parenting Unit works with parents with personality difficulties/disorders and their children under five who are subject to a Child in Need or Child Protection plan, or who are on the edge of care. The Unit offers ongoing liaison, consultation and support to social work teams, while parents are helped to become more aware of and responsive to their children's needs which leads to a deepening of the attachment relationship and an associated decrease in social worker's level of concern for children. The Unit promotes cohesive working, leading to enhanced safeguarding and fewer delays in decision making.

# **IMPACT-ME**

IMPACT-ME is a qualitative research project seeking to explore the experience of young people suffering from depression and the recovery process out of depression. Young people and families who are receiving treatment for depression are interviewed before starting treatment, after finishing treatment and at one-year follow up. In addition, the therapists of young people are also interviewed at the post-therapy stage. The interviews explore young people's experiences of depression and receiving therapy. By including the voices of young people, parents and therapists, we can better understand how we can best support young people suffering from depression.

# The Primary Schools Project

The Primary Schools Project is an outreach project based in primary schools to help children at risk of exclusion and suspension maximise their educational potential. The Project provides therapeutic interventions in schools to these vulnerable children, aged between five and eleven, who present with behavioural and/or emotional difficulties and are at risk of being excluded from school. It aims to provide essential support within the school framework to enable these children to reach their educational potential, avoiding referrals to outside agencies and the resulting mental health stigma.

# **Evidence Based Practice Unit (EBPU)**

The unit aims to undertake, develop and disseminate the latest research relating to helping children and young people with emotional and behavioural difficulties, and their families. This involves undertaking major international and national data collection both as part of research projects and practitioner learning collaborations.

### Closing the Gap

Closing the Gap seeks to transform the relationship between clinicians and the young people and families they are working with by enabling children, young people and their families to make informed choices and become active partners in their treatment. It seeks to help them, and those working with them, find ways to agree goals and review outcomes in ways that are supportive, collaborative and respect the individual's choice.

# **Shared Decision Making**

This project is developing and disseminating a range of free resources and training to child mental health professionals to help them adopt 'Shared Decision Making' (SDM). These resources are being developed with central input from service users. This project aims to empower children and young people, and their families, to play an active part in decisions about their care. It draws on evidence from published research, and has been refined in five Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) across England. Resources developed will include a training manual, skills-based training events and other information materials.

# **Developmental Neuroscience Unit (DNU)**

The Anna Freud Centre-UCL Developmental Neuroscience Unit conducts cutting-edge research in developmental psychology, combining methods derived from social science with the latest technologies and methodologies from neuroscience. The Lab represents a scientific collaboration between AFC-UCL and Yale University's Child Study Center, which is home to a sister laboratory equipped with identical facilities. The lab is led by Professor Pasco Fearon (AFC-UCL), Professor Peter Fonagy (AFC-UCL) and Professor Linda Mayes (AFC-Yale).

# **Emotional Finance**

The Emotional Finance research project aims to develop a more compelling case for "emotional finance" in economic & finance theory and to explore, starting with selected UK regulators, pension funds & asset management groups, ways to influence policy by testing the feasibility of "emotional finance" solutions to the prevention of future financial crises

# **Building development fund**

The organisation has grown over the past years which has necessitated building developments. We have received funding to allow us to do this which included funding for an EEG laboratory to be built and equipped. Due to the nature of the funding cause which is to be spent over a long period of time, this fund is restricted to what it is meant for, the building development and laboratory, and so depreciation is being charged to it over a 25 year period for the actual building works and 4 years for the laboratory equipment
