#### Report of the Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2018

The Trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018. The trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

#### Structure, governance and management

The Charity is managed by trustees who are appointed by the church leadership. The board of trustees will consist of members equally representing the church leadership and church attendees.

#### **Governing Document**

The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association as a Company Limited by Guarantee.

#### Objectives and activities / Public Benefit

The main purpose and objects of the charity are set out in the Memorandum of Association as follows:

- 1.1 to advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement of Belief in Carmarthenshire and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the Leadership Team may from time to time think fit and to fulfil such other purposes which are exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales and are connected with the charitable work of the Church;
- 1.2 to relieve persons who are in conditions of need or hardship or who are aged or sick and to relieve the distress caused thereby in the said location and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the Leadership Team may from time to time think fit;
- 1.3 to benefit the local community of Carmarthenshire and the neighbourhood by associating together with the said local community and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and/or to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for healthy recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving conditions of life for the residents.

#### Achievements and performance

#### Church

This has been a very eventful year for the church with the change of Senior Leadership to Paul Griffiths. This gave the church the opportunity to thank Mark and Nicola Bennett for 17 years of faithful service, leaving a lasting and purposeful legacy to the church and community of Carmarthen.

Our Sunday morning meetings continue to be held at Queen Elizabeth High School. The venue is very accessible to the public with many families attending our Sunday morning meetings numbering around 150 people. We also continue to run various children's clubs from nursery age to year 9 in High School. Our older young people meet midweek, and our young people "Tribe" group meet at Xcel for fun games and great bible teaching on life situations.

In February, our women held their annual conference "Called to be Bold" and had an amazing time with many encouraging stories and visiting speakers. The senior leadership also attended a conference at Kingsgate church Peterborough where they had the opportunity to have a tour of their conferencing facility and see best practice. Many of the youth also attended an annual event called "Soul Survivor" at Peterborough.

Once again, this year, a group was able to go and support some oversees missions this time in Malawi. Helping a local ministry called "Fisherman's Rest" in a food program and schools work in Blantyre. A team from the church also helped travelled to Tanzania to help build an Education Centre in Keko, Dar Es Salaam.

In May we entered a large team of runners into the Mayor's Race, which was a lot of fun and had some refugee training to help us better serve the many Syrian refugee's that have been placed in Carmarthenshire.

In June, we held a baptismal service. It was a joy to see three being baptized and two babies being dedicated. There was also an abseil event to raise money for "Tribe" youth and a BBQ for all of the Xcel Project staff and volunteers. This was our opportunity to thank everyone for the amazing job they do serving and meeting the needs of our community. We also had a few picnic lunches down at Pembrey enjoying the lovely warm weather together.

In July, we took part in our weeklong church mission with other churches in Carmarthen with the great life-changing message that "God loves us and has a plan for our lives". The week was very successful ending with a Fun day attended by hundreds who also joined us for services held in a large tent on Carmarthen Park. This successful event was in partnership with Bethel Church and was a great expression of unity for the churches in Carmarthen.

In September, we launched Alpha and were encouraged to see over 14 coming to explore and ask questions about

the Christian faith. Such was the success that it was repeated again in December.

Our annual Harvest Service took place in October where we encouraged everyone to bring items for Carmarthen Foodbank. This was a great success. Our men's group also had a weekend away which was very well attended.

This year we had two Carol Services one at Xcel Bowl led by the band of the Carmarthenshire music service and also a more traditional service at QE High with the theme of "Jesus Hope of the World". Alongside the Carol services there was also the Carmarthen Foodbank Christmas event at Xcel Bowl where many who are in need in our community were able to come and enjoy a fun filled evening. There, they were able to meet Father Christmas, bowl and receive a Christmas hamper, perhaps one of the most emotional evenings of the year.

#### **Xcel Bowl**

Throughout the year the bowling alley has helped many local, national and international organisations through events and fundraising, engaging with Carmarthen Town council, Social Business Wales, Trinity St. David's University, Kingdom Business Conference Europe and hosting the Carmarthenshire Social Business Breakfast, as well as our continued support of Young Dragons QE High. Xcel Bowl has been shortlisted for a number of awards in 2018. We were finalists at the 2018 Carmarthen Tourism Awards, 2018 Community Awards in which we had the Gold Award, together with a bronze award for sustainable tourism, in addition to which we were 2018/2019 winners of Charity of the year with Carmarthen Town Business Awards.

Xcel Bowl have also been able to support a number of local charities by offering free or concessionary rates on bowling. Additionally, we hosted an initiative for local youth to meet and challenge their PCSO's to a game of bowling. Over the Summer, Xcel supported various community events taking along our portable bowling alley for people to play on. Xcel Bowl continues to see an increased number of local groups using the venue and facilities throughout 2018 as well as a number of local businesses have been using the venue for team building events.

Representatives of the project were invited to speak at a number of events throughout the year as well as a number of tours of the project site were carried out for different organisations including Welsh Assembly members, business leaders from Holland, USA and Poland, Trinity St.David's University students as well as schools from Cardigan, Carmarthen and the Vale of Glamorgan. We also hosted a day's filming for the Autism society.

It's been wonderful to have the support of Mencap again this year, expanding the opportunities to include furniture upcycling. Together with our relationship with Remploy which has seen us employ 4 disabled persons, we are now recognised as a 'Disability Confident' Company and are seen as an exemplar in Carmarthenshire. We regularly have volunteers on placement to help and gain experience. As mentioned, we have welcomed volunteers from Mencap, and pupils from schools either completing their Duke of Edinburgh Awards or here just to expand their skills. Once again, this year we hosted a brilliant evening of 'Carols at the Bowl' where we had a fabulous performance from the Queen Elizabeth High School Band. This year saw a tangible growth in the 'community hub' role of Xcel Bowl with over 55,000 people attending and using this great facility.

#### **Foodbank**

This year, we have worked with 61 active referral agencies in and around Carmarthen to identify those in need of the support of Carmarthen Foodbank. As a result, 2,537 three day emergency food supplies were given out, of which 900 went to children. This is slightly less overall than last year. The community has been very generous donating a total of 31,955.41Kg to the foodbank over the year, which is an increase over the year before by almost 5,000Kg. The main donation periods in the year continue to be Easter, Harvest and Christmas, as well as two collections in the local Tesco Store during June and November/December. We have continued to build stronger links into our community through sharing information and talks with our support agencies, particularly with Jobcentre Plus, who are our main referring partner, NACRO and the Salvation Army.

There have been opportunities and invitations to talk about the work of the Foodbank in local schools, through being invited to speak to the children and parents and also to carry out assemblies. We continue to host group talks in the foodbank for local clubs and organisations. We had the opportunity to take part in roundtable discussions with Joyce Watson AM for Mid and West Wales, looking at the issues of poverty and poverty of opportunity in our local community.

The foodbank has had frequent coverage in the local newspapers for the work that we do which has helped to raise awareness. Radio Carmarthenshire also recorded interviews for broadcast on Radio Carmarthenshire, when, as a recipient of the Big Toy Drop in December, we were invited to collect donations of toys from Dominos in Ammanford.

This year again the foodbank supported the annual Christmas Family Event held in Xcel Bowl. Over 30 families, were invited to an evening to celebrate Christmas. There was free bowling, food and drink, a Santa's grotto, face painting, free children's clothes and beauty treatments on offer. All children went away with a gift from Santa and

each family received a Christmas Day food hamper.

The foodbank was honoured to receive a Community Service Award from the Rotary Club of Carmarthen in recognition of special service to the community.

#### **Xcel Recycled Furniture**

2018 has seen continued growth for the recycled furniture project. Our free collection service has meant that throughout the year the project has collected 5651 items, (tonnage 120), recycled 3690 pieces of furniture, including 262 large electrical items. That's 79 tonnes of unwanted furniture and white goods which would have otherwise gone to landfill. As well as selling low cost furniture we have also donated to local people in crisis through organisations such as Women's Aid, Hafod Care and Carmarthen Social Services, giving away over 10 tonnes of goods, being 396 items to a bottom book value of £7626, helping 110 individuals and families. We have also partnered with Mencap, to skill some of their clients in paint techniques for upcycling. Our increased activity allowed us to create another full-time driver position.

#### **Xcel Community Shop**

The Xcel Community shop gave away over 250 items, including clothing, bedding, china and cutlery, toys and kitchenware, to local people experiencing some form of crisis in their lives, often working in tandem with the foodbank to provide a holistic solution. We also provide for people who visit the Foodbank on a regular basis, where they have a voucher and come and choose what they need. We continue to work with Social Services helping young people and mums who are finding life difficult. Importantly, the shop and warehouse which houses our sorting, cleaning and ironing, offers volunteering opportunities for many local people. We support a village in Africa by supplying football kits for the children.

#### **OVERALL**

The Xcel Project continues to grow from strength to strength, helping the church serve Carmarthen in practical ways. Helping us show God's love to our community and serving our vision of "Reaching people and Changing lives".

#### Financial review

#### Policy on reserves

The Charity's policy is to keep a minimum in general funds to run the organisation for 3 months.

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

#### Notes to the financial statements

for the year ended 31 December 2018

#### 1. Basis of preparation

#### 1.1. Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;

- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26, 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirement of Section 33 Related Party Disclosure paragraph 33.7.

#### 1.2. Change in Basis of Accounting

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and methods of accounting) since last year.

#### 1.3. Changes to previous Accounts

No changes have been made to accounts for the previous years.

#### 2. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year.

#### 2.1 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated assets are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Tax Reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Legacies are included when the charity is advised by the personal representative of an estate that payment will be made or property transferred and the amount involved can be quantified.

#### 2.2 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which

cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Resources expended are recognised in the year in which they are incurred. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management.

#### 2.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Expenditure is capitalised if the asset has a useful life of more than 1 year and its cost exceeds £500.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, on a straight line basis as follows:

Office Furniture and equipment	25%
Equipment, Fittings	10% (changed from 25% effective 1.1.16)

#### 2.4 Stocks

These are valued at the lower of cost and market value.

#### 3. Analysis of Incoming Resources

Donations income consists of regular giving by church members in tithes and offerings, plus "one off" gifts or donations. Where these gifts are given for a specific purpose they are held in a restricted fund. This includes gifts received under the gift aid scheme.

#### 4. Analysis of Resources Expended

Grants awarded – Grants are given in accordance with the objectives of the charity. All decisions on grant awards are considered and decided upon by the trustees.
