Co-ordinators' Report

VIEW (DOVE) Ltd aims to provide a diverse programme of education and training within the communities of the Dulais Valley in partnership with a wide range of providers. To support the learners the company provides high quality childcare facilities for children aged 0-5 years of age. There is also a branch of the South Wales Miners' Library on site offering learners the opportunity to access the University of Wales Swansea's Library Facilities.

The past year has brought many challenges for the organisation, its staff and the learners, and it is with great pleasure that I report that those challenges have been met and the organisation can look forward to an exciting future with a number of new developments to challenge us even further.

I would like to thank the Trustees, Steering Group Members, Staff, Volunteers and all our funders for their continued commitment and support to the organisation. I would also like to thank the many partners we work with for their contribution to the development of VIEW (DOVE) Ltd.

Key Achievements 2004/2005

- ❖ 540 Learners enrolled on courses, of this 487 learners achieved qualifications ranging from Level 1 to Level 4 NVQ equivalent.
- ❖ £43,935 funding was secured from Neath Port Talbot County Borough Council's Community Regeneration Fund to support the core activities of the organisation.
- ❖ £53,689 has been secured for projects within the centre, including the café, nursery and community garden.
- ❖ 16 posts have been sustained within the organisation.
- ❖ DOVE Workshop has been instrumental in setting up a new community organisation to manage the Seven Sisters Community Hall. DOVE will have a representative on the committee to support the community hall developments.
- ❖ The Dulais Valley Curriculum Development Group that was established last year has proved to be very successful, this group has now been incorporated into the Dulais Valley Partnership's Lifelong Learning Forum, which is chaired by DOVE Workshop.
- ❖ Building on the siting of the St Patrick's Stone to mark his birthplace, DOVE Workshop held an event on St Patrick's Day which included a tour of local sites of interest and provided a 'Taste of Ireland'. This provided to be a immensely popular event and will be repeated.
- ❖ DOVE Workshop has worked in partnership with Cwmdulais Uchaf Communities First to provide education and training opportunities to residents of the upper Dulais valley, including a newly developed course "Fact, Fiction or Both", which links with the Dulais Valley Tourism Initiatives.

Fact, Fiction or Both: A Very Local History Course.

As a result of the growing interest in the history of the Dulais Valley, the work of the Dulais Valley Environment and Tourism Forum and building on events such as the Local Myths and Legends Storytelling evening, DOVE Workshop developed the above course with funding provided by Cwmdulais Uchaf Communities First.

A local historian Mr Robert King was employed to construct a curriculum that included 'stories' as well as facts and incorporate the tourism initiatives such as St Patrick's Stone, the Roman Road Waymarkers and the Roman Fort at Coelbren.

The course was piloted in March 2005 and had 20 participants attending, with another 20 on the waiting list. As a result of the pilot this course has been adopted by Neath Port Talbot's Lifelong Learning Service and will run again in September 2005.

The course is a significant development in gaining local people's support and appreciation of where they live, and enabling them to have the knowledge to share with visitors to the Dulais Valley, and most importantly everyone who participated really enjoyed it!

The Sarn Helen Community Garden Project was established in 2004 to:

- create a learning garden on the land surrounding DOVE Workshop, which will be used for horticulture classes, environmental awareness raising, and link with local schools and colleges.
- renovate disused allotments with the long-term aim to create a community market garden that will ensure fresh seasonal fruit and vegetables for the local community.
- encourage members of the community to participate in healthy activity, help improve their diet and offer skills that may lead to future employment.
- to build workshops in partnership with the Dulais Valley Partnership to house the Countryside Warden Scheme and create a shop front to sell produce from the market garden.

In 2004/2005:

During this year close links have been made with a number of voluntary organisations, which have contributed to the establishment of the learning garden. A gardening club, "Flowerpots" has been established for local youth to learn about propagation and planting techniques etc. Over 50 members of the community have volunteered or contributed to the design and development of the learning garden.

During the year:

- ❖ 54 people have volunteered their time to the project. 33 of these were youth working through Neath Port Talbot CBC's Youth Service's Flexible Learning Programme, members of the "Flowerpots" Gardening Club and local youth.
- ❖ 11 people gained horticultural qualifications.

The Dulais Valley Sure Start Project was established in 1999 to:

instil confidence in parents and to ensure that they have the skills to give their children a good start in life. By organising groups for parents of young children we hope to achieve these aims.

In 2004/2005:

- ❖ 12 Parents attended groups for parents
- ❖ 19 Parents attended a healthy eating event
- 27 children attended the Day Nursery
- ❖ 20 story bags borrowed by 50 children from the crèche.

Progression

The parent group has been developed into an OCN accredited course and adopted by Neath Port Talbot's Lifelong Learning Service, this is an excellent development which gives parents the opportunity to use the qualification to progress to further study.

After receiving a number of enquiries over the past few years about running an NVQ Level 2/3 in Childcare we are pleased to say that as a progression from the Parenting Skills Course we are going to be running this course in January in partnership with Neath Port Talbot College.

Basic cookery classes have been held to encourage young parents to use fresh produce in their families' diets, this will be developed and offered throughout the Dulais Valley.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2005

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in October 2000 and applicable accounting standards.

(b) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund.

(c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received.

(d) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

(e) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:-

Freehold land - nil

Freehold buildings - 2% per annum of cost
Fixtures and Fittings - 33 1/3 % per annum of cost
Plant and Equipment - 25% per annum of cost

Software packages purchased separately from computers are written off in the year of purchase.

(c) Government Grants

Government Grants in respect of unrestricted funds are accounted for in the year to which they relate.

9. LIMITED BY GUARANTEE

The company is limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. Under the terms of the Memorandum of Association the liability of each member is limited to a maximum of one pound.

If in the event of the winding up or dissolution of the company there remains, after the satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities, any property whatsoever this shall not be distributed to the members but shall be transferred to some other charitable institution or institutions having objects similar to the object of View (Dove) Limited and which shall prohibit the distribution of its or their income or property to an extent at least as great as is imposed on View (Dove) Limited. If effect cannot be given to this provision the transfer shall be made to some other charitable object with the consent of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales.

10. SUBSIDIARY COMPANY
