The Board of Trustees presents its report and consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2009

Reference and administrative structure

The company is a registered charity and exists to provide a heritage and visual arts service for the people of Woking and the wider region. Day to day management of the organisation is charged to the Director, Mrs Marilyn Scott and her Deputy the Commercial Director Mr Anthony Pooley. This senior management team reports monthly to the Operations Committee, which comprises of five members of the board of trustees who provide both general and functional expertise. The five are, Dr Patricia Wilkie (Friends), Mrs Gill Washington (Arts & Crafts), Mr Martin Bowman (Personnel), Mrs Carmel Dennis (Destination attractions and Marketing) and Mr Jamie Sharpley (Finance and Volunteers). The organisation also has a Remuneration and Appointments Committee which is chaired by the Chairman of the Board and comprises Mr Martin Bowman and Mrs Gill Washington. There is also a Finance and Audit Committee which is also chaired by Roger Umney and includes Mr Keith Smith and Mr Roger Hawksworth and Executive Directors. There are also other specific activity sub committees.

Structure, governance & management.

All Trustees are recruited with specific skills or experience in order to support the executive and assist in furthering the operational activities of the organisation. Potential Trustees are interviewed by the Chairman of the Board to identify the appropriateness of their experience and the role they might play. During the year Mr Roger Hawkesworth and Mr Jamie Sharpley were appointed to the Board of Trustees, they have very relevant skills and interests and are contributing significantly to the activities of The Lightbox. Each new Board member receives an induction pack containing information about the organisation and attends a one day training course on Board duties and responsibilities run by an independent third party organisation. The Board has an annual away day in February each year when governance issues are discussed and forward planning takes place. During the year under review several members of the Board attended conferences and training on the subject of corporate governance and a review of corporate structure resulted in some changes to the size, composition and terms of reference of key committees.

Objectives and activities

The aim of The Lightbox is to provide a friendly and lively venue that is a dynamic and inspiring place to spend time, think, discover and have fun

This year the organisation had four principal activities

The first was to manage and deliver a changing exhibition programme to attract both repeat and new visitors to the venue and to generate revenue via these activities. During the year under review the exhibition programme has included at the beginning of the year Optical Odyssey, an exhibition focussing on light, colour and optics. This was followed by our first Surrey Open Art competition with over 200 entries. In August we launched another science based exhibition Garden Giants which attracted a large family audience. In January 2009 we again presented a sculpture exhibition this time featuring the work of Caro and Paolozzi two significant figures in Modern British sculpture. Our smaller gallery featured a number of varied shows including the Miller Brands photographic competition, shows featuring The Ingram Collection, a Cartoon exhibition featuring the work of Steve Bell and a painting exhibition of the work of Bob Dylan and a ceramic exhibition of the work of Felicity Aylieff

The second activity is to manage an exciting programme of events and education related programmes from the Education Studio

The third activity is to continue to provide and manage outreach projects that give access to learning, the visual arts and heritage for the local community

The aims for these projects in the year under review were -

- To work with partner organisations to encourage participation in cultural events
- To continue our oral history work with the community
- To manage and increase our museum collection and access to our heritage collection
- To work with local arts organisations and individual artists to promote access and skills development for arts practice

The fourth activity is to generate income through retail, corporate membership and corporate hire and fundraising activities. This is carried out through the charity's subsidiary company, WMACC Trading Limited, which began trading on 1 April 2008.

The Trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set

Achievements and performance

In May The Lightbox was awarded the important Art Fund Prize, the largest art prize in the country. This was a wonderful achievement for such a relatively small gallery and enhances the reputation and standing of The Lightbox, this in turn will influence the type of exhibitions we are able to attract in the future.

Our fundraising activities have continued under the guidance of the Director

The staff team under the Director is now divided into an operations team and a curatorial and exhibitions team. We have also introduced an internship programme allowing training and development opportunities for young people wanting to enter the gallery and museum profession. These internships are offered for between three months and one year and consistently lead to employment for the interns in other organisations.

Collection

The Lightbox looks after a historic collection tracing the History of the Borough of Woking. The collection is catalogued, researched and conserved. Visitors gain access to the collection by appointment.

Finance Review

Consolidated incoming resources for the year totalled £1,583,194. This represents a considerable reduction on the previous year due to the funding for the development of the building ceasing following the completion and opening of The Lightbox in September 2007. 2008/09 reflects the first full year of operational activity. The net consolidated surplus for the year was £765,747 which includes £785,955 of voluntary income in respect of the final capital costs and the running costs of the building.

Aside from the net book value of tangible fixed assets, the consolidated balance sheet shows that the net current assets at 31 March 2009 were £988,463 but with long-term liabilities of £1,420,146, the trustees are conscious of the need for the organisation to increase its operating surplus in the future

Reserves Policy

The Board has instituted a policy whereby the unrestricted funds, not designated for any other purpose should cover between 6 and 9 months of the operating costs of the organisation. At present the free reserves carried forward do not meet this level and therefore the reserves will have to continue to be built up from income in the coming years.

Risk Management

The board Executive has conducted a review of major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and the quality of project work is monitored and evaluated for all projects.

Future Strategy

The organisation will deliver a three year rolling programme of exhibitions and events which will support the Business Plan approved by the Board of Trustees at the beginning of 2007. The annual budget was approved by the Executive Committee in April 2009 for year commencing 1st April 2009.

We have agreed a list of KPI's which will establish targets for the management team of the organisation

Results against the KPI targets are presented to the Executive on a monthly basis and selected KPI's will be reported back to Woking Borough Council under the terms of our Service Contract

We will also be looking to continue to work with partner organisations in the region to provide an inclusive facility and range of services and exhibitions. Our overall aim will be to continue to work to deliver our brand values of excellence, creativity and acting as a people centred organisation.

We will also work to achieve financial sustainability by controlling costs and generating income from our activities in the shop, café and corporate hire income facilities to compliment the financial provision from our service contract with Woking Borough Council

Disclosure of information to auditors

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

Auditors

Kingston Smith LLP have expressed their willingness to continue in office and in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act it is proposed they be re-appointed auditors to the company for the ensuing year

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charitable company's state of affairs at the end of the year and of its income and expenditure for that period

- Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregulanties.

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1. Accounting Policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005 and accounting standards
- b) Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the results, assets and liabilities of Woking Museum and Arts & Crafts Centre and its subsidiary, WMACC Trading Limited, for the year As this is the first time consolidated accounts have been presented, there are no comparative figures for the group. The results of the subsidiary are disclosed in note 4. A separate Statement of Financial Activities for the charity itself is not presented because the charity has taken advantage of the exemption afforded by the Companies Act 1985 and paragraph 304 of SORP 2005.

- c) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included
- d) Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable
- e) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include any attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- f) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity However, the cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity in the year

- g) Governance costs include those incurred in the Governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements
- h) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, which in all cases is estimated at 4 years, except certain computer equipment where the estimated useful life is 3 years. Depreciation is charged on assets from the date they come into use.

- Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the
 objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds
- j) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets this criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.
- k) The stock in the Balance Sheet is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value

Wates, Young Curators a programme for 13-19 year olds interested in learning how museums work

Wates, Family Learning is a three year project providing access to hands on activities for new and non-traditional museum-goers

HLF, Ways of Seeing is a project through which people with mental health problems learn about curating and about producing their own artworks

HLF, Frames of Refuge is a collaboration between Winston Churchill School and the Lightbox, to produce a touring exhibition focusing on the experiences of refugees

SEWS, is funding a project to the museum collection onto a proprietary computer database. The deficit on this fund is due to the timing of the funds being received in 2009-10.

17 Capital Commitments

The final settlement with Durtnell & Sons Limited for the construction of the new museum premises has not yet been concluded. There is an outstanding retention yet to be settled, this will be paid when a completion statement is issued by Marks Barfield. This will be issued when all snagging items have been completed, the amount of this contingent liability amounts to £65,593.
