Directors'/Trustees Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2005

The Directors who are also the trustees of the charity present their annual report together with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2005.

Principal Activity/Objects of the charity

The principal activity of the company throughout the year continued to be that of a Charity established to help those people who misuse alcohol and drugs and the friends, relatives and partners of people with alcohol and drug related difficulties, by providing advice, information, individual and group support services and to improve public education by encouraging early recognition and prevention of alcohol and drug related harm.

Organisational structure

A Board of four unpaid directors administers the company. The directors may from time to time appoint any member of the company as a director either to fill a casual vacancy or by way of addition to their number. Appointments to the Board are also invited by advertisement in the local press. The Board is supported by a paid executive director, company secretary and support staff. The executive director controls projects on a day-to-day basis and reports to the Board on a regular basis.

Directors' Responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company as at the end of the financial year and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure for that period. make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue its activities.

The directors are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Review of Activities

The year 2004/05 has been an important and a successful year for ASCA. The service has spent dedicated time to consolidating and developing services. All projects have seen an increase in the number of referrals and clients with more complex needs. The staff have responded by being flexible and ensuring that all clients receive a good quality service. Through the year ASCA continued to strengthen its partnership with the statutory and voluntary sector agencies across boroughs of Kingston and Richmond.

Kingston launched its Alcohol Strategy, ASCA was involved with the consultation process and the launch event. In Richmond the Council for Voluntary Services appointed ASCA as the designate Key Strategic Organisation for alcohol. This at least brings alcohol back onto the agenda locally. Towards the end of 2004/05 the organisation was awarded the Investors In People award.

The Future

The Directors remain optimistic that ASCA will continue to grow and develop steadily in all its activities. We will seek to continue to increase the number of Directors on the Board by advertising through local and national voluntary sector organisations.

Risk Management

The directors have examined the principal areas of the company's operations and considered the major risks, which may arise in each of these areas. In the opinion of the directors the company has established review systems, which, under normal conditions, should allow the risks identified to be mitigated to an acceptable level in its day-to-day operations.

Reserves and Funding

The unrestricted fund balance at 31 March 2005 amounted to £92,522. The Directors consider that reserves need rebuilding to allow us to implement a long term strategy. The Board is continuing to actively seek further funding from local and national public bodies and corporate sponsorships.

The Board would like to take this opportunity of thanking the Agency funders and many partners involved with the wide range of client services that we provide.

A full list of the Agency's funders is on page 8 of this report.

The Board would like to acknowledge the financial support from the Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames for the provision of counselling and office premises at 96 Ditton Road, Surbiton. This provision is provided as part of the ongoing 'in-kind' contribution towards the overall delivery of services.

1 MEMBERS LIABILITY

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required (but not exceeding £10) to the assets of the company if it should be wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the company contracted before he or she ceased to be a member, and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors among themselves.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies, which are adopted in the preparation of the financial statements, are set out below:

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2000.

Grants Receivable are accounted for in the period in which they are receivable.

Charitable expenditure includes all expenditure related to the objects of the charity. Expenditure analysed under management and administration sub heading represents expenditure incurred in management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Tangible Fixed Assets: Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off each asset over its anticipated useful life. The principal annual rates in use are:

Office equipment equally over 3 years

Leasehold buildings equally over the term of the lease

Pension Costs: Contributions in respect of the defined contribution pension schemes are charged to the Income and Expenditure account in the year in which they are payable to the schemes.

3 FUND ACCOUNTING

The charity maintains the following funds:

Unrestricted funds:

Funds that is expendable at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both the working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds:

Funds representing grants or donations that are allocated by the donor for specific purposes.
