TRUSTEES' REPORT

The trustees have pleasure in presenting their report together with the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2018. These are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and financial statements for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective January 2015).

Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit 'Charities and Public Benefit'. This Trustee's report clearly sets out our charitable objects, current activities and how they benefit the public.

Objectives and activities

The charity was formed under the Companies Act on 06 August 2012 with the primary object of working with families and professionals to improve the lives of children on the Autism Spectrum. Activities commenced on 01 January 2014. Registration under the Charites Act was obtained on 02 February 2015.

The purposes of the charity continue to be:

For the public benefit, the relief of those in need by reason of autism, other disabilities and trauma, in particular but not exclusively by

- Advancement of education through training programmes and development activities to improve their skills, capacities and capabilities.
- Advancement of education through training and development programmes for the families, carers and
 professionals who have a role in supporting the individuals with autism, additional needs including social and
 emotional.
- Advancement of health, wellbeing and mental health in particular but not exclusively, by providing a nurturing supportive and challenging environment to raise awareness, remove limiting beliefs by using the benefits of the natural environment and working with animals.
- Advancement of education through training programmes for volunteers, who's role is then to support the children and families on various activities.

In shaping our objectives, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance on public benefit and fee charging. The charity relies on income from fees and charges to cover its operating costs. In setting the level of fees, charges and concessions, the trustees give careful consideration to the accessibility of the activities to those on low incomes.

The strategies employed to achieve the charity's aims and objectives are:

- Ungoing development of services to support the education and wellbeing of families and professionals, working with children on the autism spectrum and with additional needs including social, emotional and behavioural
- Extend the reach of the organisation through social media, attending events, promoting our activities.
- Within these aims, the charity, endeavours to generate funds which can be used to extend its activities.

Achievements and performance

2017-2018 has been our greatest year to date. We have delivered new services successfully, engaged new families and had our regulars repeat custom. We have had fewer accident rates both for families and horses. Strata was a great success and raised a lot of hope for our families and awareness for the charity overall. We felt very included with fundraising activities and our families had a lot of fun away from our usual services. Our families felt very supported and were able to attend events including Strata's Charity Ball. Our volunteer retention rate was good and feedback was excellent both from the parents and the volunteer training programme. We have been very happy with this years performance and are very much looking forward to our next year.

There was a split between fees and donations during 2017-2018 financial period. As a registered charity, income is derived from trusts and grant providers, fees and donations.

Autism Angels - Southern Centre

The Southern centre is now established at its new home on the Bowes-Lyons estate in Hertfordshire. The exceptional rural environment with its own 15 acres, but access to lots of riding/walking tracks throughout the estate is proving to be a wonderful asset for our families. The herd of horses has grown to 7 and the indoor barn has been perfect to be able to year-round training.

The relationship with JCOSS continued successfully with a new 10 mentoring programme and also 7 enrichment days booked for this year.

There are conversations with St Luke who are a special school provision in Redbourne. We have secured funding for them for 1 pupil for a 6-week mentoring programme and hope to build on the relationship.

Governing Documents

The charity is governed by its articles of association, which are based on the model articles for a charitable company. These were initially approved on 06 August 2012 and subsequently amended 10 October 2014.

Appointment of trustees

Trustees are appointed by the members in accordance with the provisions contained in the Articles of Association.

Trustee training and induction

New trustees are briefed on their obligations under charity law, the constitution of the charity and on the Charity Commission Guidance on public benefit. Trustees attend external training events to facilitate the undertaking of their role, where appropriate.

Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees administers the charity and appointed Sarah Kekoa (Shearman) (a Trustee) to act as Chair on 13 February 2015. She also deals with the day to day operational matters and manages the Northern Centre. Joanne Richardson has been appointed as secretary in August 2017 and is responsible for the day to operational matters and management of the Southern Centre. Elizabeth Maw has been appointed as treasurer in August 2016. All trustees have been re-elected and re-appointed in August 2018.

Risk management

The trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises:

- Periodic reviews of the risks the charity.
- The establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate the identified risks.

This work has identified that financial sustainability is the major financial risk. Attention has also been focused on non-financial risks arising from child protection issues, fire, health and safety of employees, associated members and members of the public. A key element of the management of financial risk is the retention of adequate working capital.

The trustees are satisfied that systems and procedures are in use to adequately manage the risks to which the charity is exposed.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis. The financial statement are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective January 2016) and with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are accounted for when the charity has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount is measurable. Where income is received in advance it is deferred until the charity is entitled to that income.

Donations

Donations are recognised on receipt.

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation unless the donor or the terms of the appeal have specified otherwise.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities
 and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such
 activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

Basic financial instruments

The charity accounts for basic financial instruments on initial recognition at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs. Subsequent measurement is as per paragraphs 11.17 to 11.189 FRS 102 SORP.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost. Depreciation is provided on cost in equal annual instalments over the estimated lives of the assets. The rates of depreciation are as follows:-

Unrestricted funds are available to use to further any of the purposes of the charity.

Operating lease commitments are provided for in the balance sheet at the time the rental payments fall due. Such rental costs are charged to the profit and loss account as incurred.

An amount of £4,440 (2017 - £5,850) was paid to a business operated by S Kekoa (Shearman) (a trustee) for time spent in management, training and facilitation. In addition and amount of £24,452 (2017 - £3,803) was paid to that business under a shared services agreement to cover of property and other costs, such as phone, utilities insurance and horse care jointly incurred by the charity and the business. An amount of £13,395 (2017 - £2,685) was paid to a business operated by J Richardson for facilities and facilitation.
