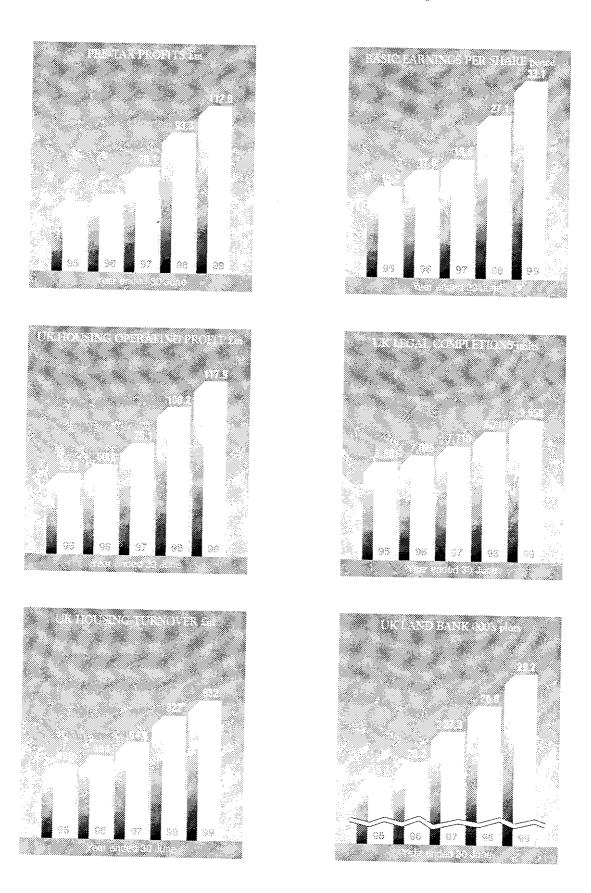

Financial Highlights

Consistent growth has been achieved across all key financial performance indicators.



Chairman's Statement



Frank Eaton, Group Chairman, at Virginia Quay, London E14, a fast-selling £70 million project with 100 homes sold in just over 12 months. The development will provide 632 homes at prices starting from £95,000 up to £400,000.

This has been a landmark year in the Barratt Group's history. Our pre-tax profits rose to a record £112 million, Group turnover exceeded £1 billion and we significantly increased market share. These excellent results extend our track record of consistent growth over the past seven years, a performance which is unrivalled in the industry.

Our results are all the more creditable given the difficult housing market which existed in the first half of the year, when we again demonstrated our resilience by further increasing sales year on year. Throughout the UK all of our divisions again traded very successfully and we ended the financial year with record forward sales of £343m. Since I July we have continued to out-perform the market and increase market share, which gives us confidence for the year ahead.

Group results for the year ended 30 June 1999 demonstrate improvements across all key performance indicators:

- Pre-tax profit amounted to £112m against £93.3m the previous year, an increase of 20%.
- Basic earnings per share amounted to 33.1p against 27.1p the previous year, an increase of 22%.
- Final dividend of 7.24p per share will be recommended against 6.7p the previous year, giving a total dividend for the year of 10.8p, an increase of 8%, 3.1 times covered.

- Turnover rose to £1,009m against £891m the previous year, an increase of 13%. In the UK we achieved 9,556 completions, an increase of 10%, at an average selling price of £99,500, an increase of 4%.
- Shareholders' funds at the year end amounted to £454m, an increase of 14%.
- Land stocks increased from 26,045 plots to 29,200 plots, equating to three years' volume.
- Net cash in hand at the year end amounted to £32m, which highlights the emphasis placed on cash management. This continues the strong position existing at 30 June 1998 and was achieved notwithstanding a £53m increased investment in our land stocks.
- Return on capital employed was 26.2%, maintaining our position amongst the highest in the industry.

Of particular note was our strong performance in the face of a slowing market in the first half year, when we continued to significantly increase sales reservations (up 8% year on year), the only national housebuilder to do so. As the housing market improved in the second half year, we benefited fully from our increased presence in the stronger Southern market, where 10 of our 22 UK divisions are located. The South produced a greater proportion of our total sales and this contributed significantly to our higher average selling price and our increased turnover.

Our planned expansion into the South has been extremely successful, in fact some 50% of our increased volume was produced by our 9 more recently established divisions, 6 of which are located in the stronger South-East region. During the year we continued our investment programme in the South with an expenditure of £132m, amounting to 45% of our total land spend. This will ensure that we continue to secure a significant share of this important market. We now have 62 sites within and around the M25 out of 92 in Southern England.

Our longer-established divisions throughout the remainder of the UK continued to perform successfully, increasing both volume and profits. Our prices range from £40,000 to £2.5 million and our ability to respond to changing market conditions again stood us in good stead with varying levels of purchaser assistance tailored to differing markets. We continued to provide a part-

exchange service, however the overall demand for this reduced considerably, particularly in the second half year. Over the year, some 33% of our buyers took advantage of this fast and efficient service and we completed 3,338 resale transactions.

We have previously commented on the deplorable land availability and planning situation which exists throughout the UK. Sadly the situation shows no sign of improvement and there appears to be no government will to effect much-needed changes. The result is undue pressure on land costs which is pricing properties out of the reach of many first-time buyers.

In addition, unreasonable planning gain demands – which can add thousands of pounds to the price of a home – and lengthy delays in obtaining approvals continue to be serious concerns. Whether for brownfield or greenfield sites, the planning process is equally inefficient and is extremely wasteful of company resources.

It is our experience and skills that enable us to overcome these difficulties. The Barratt Group has a long and successful track record of developing brownfield sites and in fact over 60% of our land has had a former use. Our land buying teams have been very successful, increasing land stocks in all our regions and particularly our new divisions. Our investment in land acquisition during the year amounted to £293m, increasing our stocks to 29,200 plots, equal to three years' volume. Our ongoing success in land acquisition and securing development approvals produced a further increase in selling outlets of 8% to 303 at the year end.

This ongoing expansion has been extremely successful and we have selectively secured sites within the main population bases, in desirable locations of proven demand. All land buying is stringently controlled to ensure best management of the Group's financial resources and a full return on our investment. Our success is reflected in the ongoing improvement in our margin and our return on capital employed of 26.2%. The year end funding position of £32m cash in hand, notwithstanding our increased investment in land stocks, up £53m, clearly demonstrates this effective control and cash management.

In our USA operation we have continued to benefit from an improved market and we are making good progress trading through our older developments. The business returned to profit in the year achieving £1.6m, against a

£0.8m loss for the previous year. Legal completions of 206 against 365 for the previous year reflect planned reinvestment into the better and more desirable areas of Southern California, which is evident in the average selling price, up £135,000 to £271,000, increasing total turnover from £49.7m to £55.9m. This market continues to be favourable and our emphasis on continuing to reinvest in the more sought-after locations gives us confidence for the year ahead.

In the UK we continue each year to strengthen our forward sales position and we commenced the new financial year in a very strong position, with forward sales reservations up £102m to a record £343m. Sales reservations in our new financial year continue to show an increase year on year in line with our projections and our selling costs compare favourably with the year just ended.

Market conditions continue to be good throughout the country, with the Southern market remaining the strongest. House price to earnings ratios and mortgage rates continue to be attractive and the desire for home ownership remains strong.

Throughout the Group we have been extremely successful in maintaining a low cost base, which we see as critical to our competitive edge. This emphasis on low overheads and effective cost controls has benefited us greatly and will continue to do so in the future.

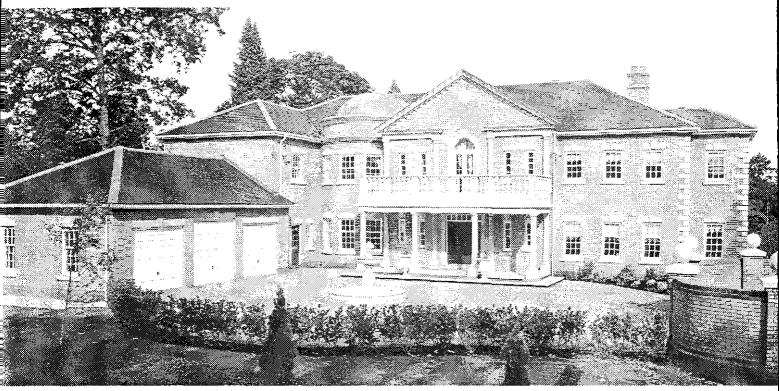
Our management team has once again demonstrated its ability to succeed and I would like to express my thanks to all my colleagues throughout the Group, both office and site based, whose efforts have brought about the progress we have achieved in the year.

Looking ahead we are extremely well placed to continue this progress. Our land bank has been further enhanced by quality acquisitions in first class locations which will enable us to generate consistent sales. We shall also continue to benefit from our management strengths, our outstanding product range and the unrivalled service we provide to our buyers. We face the future with great confidence.

UK HOUSEBUILDING

The Group has produced yet another highlysuccessful year, achieving considerable progress and delivering record profit and turnover. We outperformed the market and significantly increased market share, which was boosted by our strategic emphasis on the stronger Southern market.

We sold 9,556 new homes, a 10% increase on the previous year, producing turnover of £932m, up 13%, which combined with further improved margins enabled us to produce record Group pre-tax profits of £112m.

Operating profits in our core activity, UK housebuilding, rose to £117.9m, an 18% increase and we again improved the operating margin, from 12.2% to 12.6%. This improvement was mainly attributable to four factors: a high rate of sale, stringent controls on overhead and building costs, skilful land buying, and revenue improvements.

Our average selling price for private sales was £99,500, against £95,900 last year. This rise was mainly attributable to the significant increase in

sales from our Southern region and the impact of completions from a number of our large prestige inner London developments.

In our pursuit of maintaining a low cost base, all overheads are stringently controlled and administration overheads were maintained at very low levels of 3.1% of revenue. Construction cost increases are also being effectively contained. Last year they amounted to 3% and they are not expected to exceed 3% this year.



David Pretty, Group Managing Director, in London Docklands where Barratt has an unrivalled track record and has successfully completed more than 40 projects. Barratt is the only major housebuilder to have been consistently active in Docklands since 1981.

The Group has a network of housebuilding divisions strategically located in all the main population bases. Our geographical spread and organisational structure combines the benefits of local companies serving local needs with the financial and management resources of a national developer.

At 30 June we operated on 303 developments nationwide, up from 280 at the previous year end, all in areas of proven demand and serving all market sectors at prices ranging from £40,000 to £2.5m.

All 22 housebuilding divisions throughout the country traded very successfully and we entered the new financial year with record forward sales of £343m. Forward sales have progressively increased in recent years and have risen from £86m to £343m over the past three years.

THE MARKET

Following several increases in interest rates the Southern housing market started to slow from July 1998 onwards but nevertheless continued to be the UK's strongest market place. We achieved a good sales performance throughout our first half year, increasing sales by 8% year on year – indeed we were the only national housebuilder to do so. From December 1998, following the series of interest rate reductions, the Southern market improved and we

further benefited from our strategic emphasis in this region.

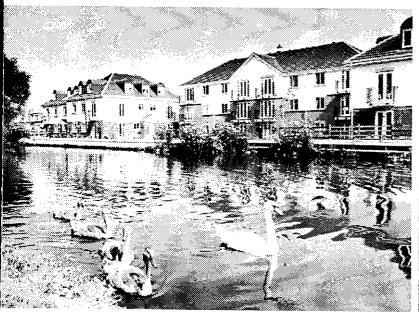
Elsewhere in the country, the slowing of the Southern market in the first half year was not repeated. In some parts of the North – Scotland in particular – it continued to improve throughout the year as consumer confidence strengthened.

Overall, our total sales reservations for the financial year to 30 June increased by 11%. We out-performed the market and significantly increased our market share. Throughout the country all our regions continued to trade very successfully and all increased profits year on year. We have undoubtedly benefited from the expansion of

the Group's divisional network – our 9 more recently established divisions, including those in the North and Midlands, contributed 50% of our increased volume. Since July 1st the total UK market has continued to be good and demand for our homes has remained strong.

LAND

Land availability and planning delays continue to be a serious concern and are restricting the housebuilding industry's ability to satisfy housing needs. Consequently, the industry has repeatedly called for Government action on identifying land to be made available, enforcing proper planning procedures and speeding up the planning process. Against this difficult background, however, our unrivalled skills in land buying have again stood us in good stead and we have achieved considerable success.

We have acquired quality sites in superior locations, increasing selling outlets from 280 to 303 at the year end. We acquired 12,711 plots, 33% more than we used, which increased our land stocks by 12% to 29,200 plots, consistent with our growth plan objectives.

The average plot cost of our total holding is now £22,200, representing 22.8% of total average selling price. Since 45% of our total land spend was in the South, this clearly demonstrates our control over land expenditure.

Land is purchased according to strict criteria to ensure that all sites produce full margins. This ensures the best management of the Group's financial resources which is clearly evident in our financial results. Cash expenditure on land amounted to £293m and we again succeeded in securing a good element on deferred terms, thereby increasing land creditors by £47m to £165m.

We operate a strategy of maximising volume on all our sites in order to maximise the return on investment and in the year just ended 144 sites were completed and replaced by 167 new developments.

Our strategic emphasis on the South means that we now have 92 sites in Southern England with 62 within and around the M25.

PARTNERSHIPS

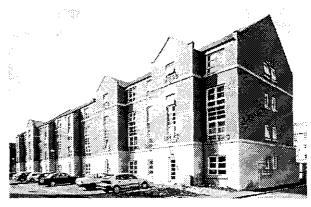
We serve all sectors of the market and have a long commitment to partnership housing. Throughout the year we have again completed a wide range of schemes in partnership with central government, local authorities, housing associations and other agencies. Our track record gives confidence to

partners and last year we completed £40m worth of social housing on over 30 schemes, which provided over 600 homes for rent, shared ownership and low-cost sale. Projects ranged from a 4-unit scheme in Colton Village, close to Leeds, for North British Housing Association providing shared ownership housing for local people, to 97 homes for shared ownership and rent in London NW1 which are being developed in partnership with Acton Housing Association.

URBAN RENEWAL

The Group's diversity of product and commitment to urban renewal is clearly demonstrated by the variety of regeneration projects we have successfully completed during the year. These have included the conversion of disused offices and industrial premises, the redevelopment of clearance sites and the recycling of derelict land to provide high quality

homes, an improved environment and employment for the local community.

In the London area we have continued to exploit office-to-residential opportunities, which have proved extremely successful. In Chiswick, for example, we are transforming a redundant 1960s office building close to Kew Bridge into a development of 62 apartments. Work started earlier this year and the project is already two-thirds sold, even before the first homes are ready to move into. This is our 12th office conversion project and we have three further schemes in the pipeline.

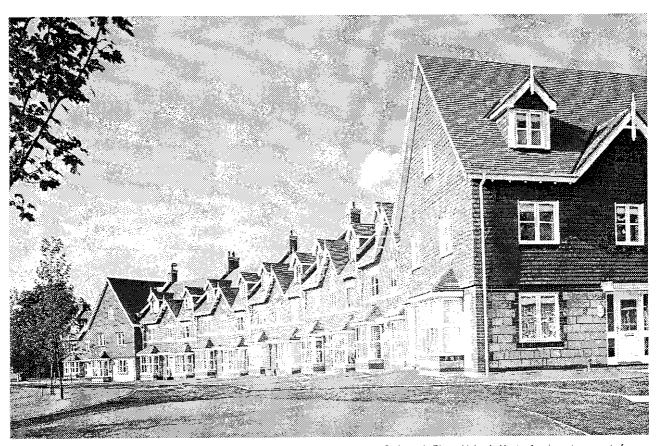
We are actively involved in many large-scale regeneration projects around the UK. At Gosport, for example, we are the lead developers on an 80-acre former Ministry of Defence site which will provide 700 homes. In central London we have started work on a £100m development of 385 apartments on



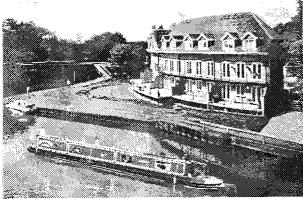

former railway land opposite Regents Park and at Bilston, close to Wolverhampton, two major land reclamation schemes are creating 250 homes for sale and rent.

Our specialist skills and extensive experience of urban development make us less reliant than others on greenfield sites and provide us with a valuable competitive advantage. In fact well over 60% of our land has had a former use and we have successfully recycled a diverse range of brownfield sites including redundant convents, barracks, hospitals and schools.

HELPING HOMEBUYERS

Our innovative approach to helping homebuyers sets us apart from others in the industry and during the year we continued to provide a range of purchase plans appropriate to prevailing regional market conditions. Additionally, long-established schemes such as our renowned Home Exchange Service and "£99 Down And Move In" scheme were

instrumental in assisting homebuyers to achieve a fast and efficient move.

We pioneered part exchange back in 1971 and have operated it in all market conditions ever since, with more than 50,000 homebuyers taking advantage of this service. During the last year, however, demand for the facility reduced but some 33% of our buyers still took advantage of the service, with 3,338 resale transactions being completed. Our long experience of part exchange enables us to react quickly to any increased demand, thereby securing our new home sales.

Our marketing skills and practice of using high profile media also set us apart from others in the industry. National advertising campaigns supported by local advertising combine to provide a cost-effective means of communication, creating a high level of awareness of the product and service we offer.

QUALITY BUILDING

A pleasing highlight of the past year has been the number of awards we have received for the quality of the product and service we provide to our buyers. We won a total of 32 NHBC Pride In The Job Awards, significantly more than our market share, together with national awards for customer service, design and care for the environment, including three prestigious Green Leaf Housing Awards.

Environmental issues are fully considered when planning and building our developments. Each year we reclaim around 800 acres of land which has had a former use and in doing so we make a major contribution to the improvement of the environment.

We also fully recognise the importance of offering our purchasers greater choice and we have continued to develop a wider range of homes, focusing on providing quality and value for money. We have, for example, added an extensive range of new 3-storey designs to our house range to meet market demands for additional living space which lends itself to a variety of uses such as home working, leisure or self-contained accommodation.

Operational Review

TRAINING

We have a longstanding commitment to training and during the year we launched a series of initiatives with over 300 site-based staff attending in-depth courses on construction best practice, health and safety, and customer service.

Our construction staff regularly win awards for their skills and during the year Kevin Lawrence from our South Wales division became one of the first two site managers in Britain to achieve the new NHBC Site Manager Accreditation – the first formal

programme to establish recognised professional status for house building site managers.

We are industry leaders in apprentice training and with over 300 apprentices receiving training we are helping to provide the next generation of construction skills.

USA HOUSING

We experienced good market conditions in Southern California and a welcome return to full year profits of £1.6m against a £0.8m loss for the previous year.

Sales totalled 206, down on the previous year's 365, reflecting our move from low priced homes in secondary areas on our older sites to more expensive homes on our new sites in the better areas of San Diego County and Orange County. This move to more expensive better located property is also reflected in the average selling price, up to £271,000, increasing turnover from £49.7m to £55.9m.

The improvement in the market appears sustainable and we anticipate our results will continue to improve. Our strategy continues to be one of limiting the scale of our activity whilst trading through older developments and replacing these with new, more profitable sites.

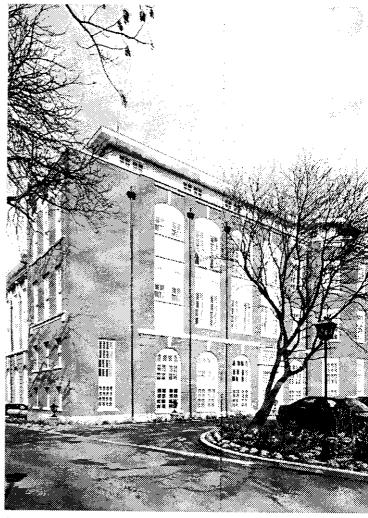
CONCLUSION

The Group is well-positioned to continue the sound progress made in recent years. Sales reservations in the year just ended were up 11% on the previous year and our forward sales increased by £102m to £343m. Sales since July continue to show a significant increase, year on year, in line with our expectations.

We have improved the quantity and quality of our land stocks and our acquisition programme is ongoing. Selling outlets are continuing to increase. We currently have 309 developments throughout the UK with 316 anticipated by December 1999.

The Group has a total geographic spread with operations in all the main population bases, making Barratt one of the very few housebuilders with a genuine national presence. Our sales rates per site and stock turn remain among the highest in the industry which will ensure we continue to produce a full return on shareholders' funds.

We have clearly demonstrated our ability to consistently increase market share in both difficult and improving markets and we are well-positioned to do so again. Demand for home ownership remains strong and we commenced the new financial year with record forward sales. The outlook for the Group is extremely positive.

ACTIVITIES OF THE GROUP

RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS

The profit on ordinary activities after taxation for the year ended 30th June 1999 was £77.3m (1998 £63.1m). An interim dividend of 3.56p per share (1998 3.3p) was paid on 21st May 1999 and it is proposed to pay a final dividend of 7.24p per share (1998 6.7p) on 19th November 1999 to shareholders on the register at the close of business on 8th October 1999.

The dividends paid and proposed amount to £25.2m (1998 £23.4m).

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The notice of the annual general meeting on page 13 contains one resolution to be submitted as special business. The resolution (number 9) requests shareholder approval to renew for one year the directors' authority to allot unissued shares in the capital of the company and to authorise the directors to allot shares for cash up to a limit equal to 5% of the issued share capital without initially offering such shares to existing shareholders.

Directors' Report

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The company recognises the importance of effective corporate governance and following the publication of the Combined Code has reviewed its existing procedures. The principles of the Combined Code have been fully considered by the board. The ways in which the company applies them are as follows.

a) Directors

The board of directors comprises six executive and three non-executive directors, one-third of whom retire by rotation each year. Mr F Eaton is Group Chairman and Chief Executive. The requirement to ensure a balance of power and authority at the head of the company was, however, recognised by the appointment of the senior independent director, Mr B Bean as Group Vice-Chairman in November 1997, and of Mr D A Pretty as Group Managing Director in March 1998. This, coupled with the experience of the three non-executive directors, justifies the combination of roles.

The board meets eleven times each year in accordance with an agreed timetable. Board papers and agendas are supplied to the board in advance of each meeting. All directors have access to the advice and services of the company secretary and, if necessary, independent professional advisers at the company's expense. Training is available for both new and existing directors as, and when, required.

There is a formal schedule of matters specifically reserved to the board for decision. The board has, however, established three standing committees, with defined terms of reference, to deal with specific matters.

The Audit Committee consists of the three non-executive directors and is chaired by Mr B Bean. It meets regularly and monitors the adequacy of the group's internal controls, accounting policies and financial reporting. It also provides a forum through which the group's external audit, finance and internal audit functions may report to the non-executive directors. Meetings of the Audit Committee with the external auditors are held in private.

The Remuneration Committee determines the terms of employment and remuneration of the executive directors. It is chaired by Mr A E Kilburn and its members are the non-executive directors.

The Nomination Committee, chaired by Mr P H Ashworth, comprises the non-executive directors and the Group Chairman. The Committee was established to make recommendations to the board with regard to all new appointments and promotions to main board positions.

b) Directors' Remuneration

The policy and details of directors' remuneration are contained in the Remuneration Report on pages 18 and 19.

c) Shareholder Relations

The company maintains dialogue with institutional shareholders through meetings and visits to the company's operations involving the directors and divisional management. Shareholders are also appraised of the company's activities and prospects through the Annual and Interim Reports. The Annual General Meeting is used to enable private investors to discuss the company's operations and progress directly with the board.

d) Accountability and Audit

The directors are required by UK company law to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and the group for that period.

The directors confirm that suitable accounting policies have been used and applied consistently and reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates have been made in the preparation of the financial statements for the year ended 30th June 1999. The directors also confirm that applicable accounting standards have been followed and that the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, for safeguarding the assets of the company and of the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The board of directors is required to consider whether the company and the group is a going concern. Accordingly the board has made appropriate enquiries and is satisfied that the company and group have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. They therefore continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

As permitted by the London Stock Exchange, the company reports on the review of internal financial controls only, pending the issue of the Turnbull Committee recommendations on internal control. The directors are responsible for the group's system of internal financial controls which is designed to provide reasonable but not absolute assurance against misstatement or loss. The key procedures in the established framework are:

Directors' Report

- 1. Each operating division has a board of directors who meet formally each month chaired by a main board director.
- 2. There is a comprehensive budgeting, reporting and forecasting system which requires monthly reporting of results and forecasts of all operating divisions with comparisons to budget.
- 3. Operational procedures are embodied in the Group Policy Instructions issued to all divisions. Financial controls and procedures including information systems are detailed in Accounting and Systems manuals.
- All systems are monitored by the internal audit functions including financial, marketing and construction related matters.
- 5. The risks facing the business are assessed on an ongoing basis and all key areas, including finance, land buying and the market are reported to the board each month.

The directors have reviewed the operation and effectiveness of the group's system of internal financial controls for the year ended 30th June 1999.

The company has complied with the principles of the Combined Code throughout the year, with the exception of Code Provision C.2.1. in that the company has not previously announced proxy voting, but following the introduction of the Code will do so at the next and future Annual General Meetings.

EMPLOYEES

The directors recognise the importance of good communication, consultation and relations with employees. The group is structured on a decentralised basis and the management of each subsidiary implements group policies in relation thereto as determined by the main board.

It is group policy to give equal opportunities to all, regardless of race, creed, colour, religion, gender or disability, both in access to employment and opportunities within employment. We are also committed to ensuring, within the framework of the law, that our workplaces are free from unlawful discrimination.

The board believes that it has an obligation to contribute to the industry's future skills base. To this end, the group is actively engaged in a programme aimed at recruiting, and training, over 300 apprentices from communities local to our operations.

Each group company is responsible for agreeing the detail of terms and conditions relating to transactions with its suppliers. It is group policy to abide by the agreed terms of payment with suppliers where the goods and services have been supplied in accordance with the relevant terms and conditions of contract. Implementation of this policy resulted in a supplier payment period for the company of 33 days for its trade creditors at 30th June 1999.

YEAR 2000

The directors recognise the importance of the Year 2000 issue and have reviewed the programme to ensure that all systems are compliant and all key risk areas are identified and to check the level of compliance of relevant third parties. It is currently envisaged that there will not be a material cost to the group. However, due to the complexity and uncertainty of the issue there is no absolute guarantee that problems will not be encountered. As a consequence, the directors continue to keep this issue under review.

Directors' Report

ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY

The group recognises its responsibilities to assess and minimise the impact of its business on the environment and, wherever possible, to restore and enhance the environment.

Environmental concerns are fully considered when planning and building our developments. It is our policy and practice to specifically address environmental issues in all land feasibility reports to ensure any concerns are highlighted at the earliest opportunity so that appropriate measures can be built into the development programme, in line with best practice, to avoid or minimise any adverse environmental impact.

Site preparation and construction operations are closely monitored in conjunction with Local Authorities, the NHBC and the Environment Agency. The materials used in construction operations are risk assessed to avoid harmful substances and we have careful regard for materials or products which are not considered to be environmentally friendly.

Although these policies apply to all developments, they are even more positively pursued in relation to developments which have had a former use. Barratt has been and continues to be the industry leader in the recovery and revitalisation of this land, with the consequent benefits to both the environment and to local communities.

The group builds over 60% of its homes on sites with a former use and in doing so we reclaim around 800 acres of derelict land each year. The majority of this work is in the inner cities and the regeneration reduces the need for new infrastructure, helps re-form communities nearer their workplaces and improves the quality of life and the environment.

Each year the group makes a major contribution to the environment with extensive landscaping works, including the planting of over 15,000 trees, and the retention of valuable features such as existing trees, hedgerows, ponds and streams thereby preserving habitat for wildlife. In recognition of our efforts we regularly receive Green Leaf Housing Awards for care of the environment and this year we have also won the special Wildfowl and Wetland Trust Award.

AUDITORS

A resolution to reappoint PricewaterhouseCoopers as auditors to the company will be proposed at the annual general meeting.

Remuneration Report

The members of the Remuneration Committee, who are all non-executive directors, are Mr A E Kilburn (Chairman), Mr P H Ashworth and Mr B Bean.

The Committee has the responsibility to consider and make recommendations to the board with regard to the executive directors' remuneration packages. In doing so, the Committee has given full consideration to Section B of the Combined Code annexed to the Stock Exchange Listing Rules.

The policy is to ensure that remuneration packages are sufficient to attract, motivate and retain executive directors of a high calibre. Consideration is given to the group's performance compared with other companies in the construction sector and of total remuneration packages in those companies to ensure that total remuneration packages are comparable.

The basic salary for each executive director is reviewed annually taking into account the results achieved by the group. Annual performance related payments are made, which vary according to the extent to which group pre-tax profit levels exceed £20.0m. The executive directors also participate in a deferred bonus scheme based upon the achievement of a challenging performance target, set by the Remuneration Committee, over a 5 year period.

The executive directors receive taxable benefits in kind covering the provision of a motor vehicle, private medical insurance and some telephone costs.

All executive directors have one year rolling contracts. There are no specific provisions for compensation on early termination.

The executive directors proposed for re-election at the forthcoming annual general meeting are Mr D A Pretty, Mr M Norton and Mr H Walker, all of whom have service contracts requiring 12 months notice.

The non-executive directors' remuneration and terms of appointment are established by a committee consisting of the executive directors.

All executive directors are members of the group's contributory pension scheme which entitles them, with the exception of Mr D A Pretty, to a pension on retirement of two thirds of final pensionable salary after 40 years membership. They are also eligible for dependants' pension and insured lump sums on death in service. The final pension is calculated from the highest yearly average pensionable salary over three consecutive years during the last ten years of service. Performance related pay has always been and continues to be an integral part of pensionable salary to provide a competitive and appropriate remuneration package for directors. Benefits in kind are not pensionable.

Mr Ď A Pretty's pension entitlement is restricted by the earnings cap imposed under the Finance Act 1989. The company has agreed to review the level of early retirement benefits that would be available to him and is augmenting such benefits within the existing approved arrangements and subject to Inland Revenue limits. The additional cost to the company of undertaking such augmentation is not anticipated to exceed £44,000 per annum over a three year period, which commenced in December 1998.

The group's original Executive Share Option Scheme expired on its 10th anniversary in December 1996. In November 1997 the company adopted an Executive Share Option Plan (the Plan). The Remuneration Committee approves the grant of share options to executive directors under the Plan, taking into account individual performance and the overall performance of the group. Options are normally exercisable between 3 and 10 years from the date of grant. The exercise of the options granted under the Plan are subject to the achievement of an objective performance condition set by the Committee, namely that the growth in the earnings per share of the company over a period of three consecutive financial years should exceed the growth in the Retail Price Index by at least 6 per cent. The non-executive directors do not participate in the Plan.

Accounting Policies

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom. The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, are:

(a) Basis of accounting

The group prepares its accounts on an historical cost basis.

(b) Consolidation

The group accounts include the results of the holding company and all its subsidiary undertakings made up to 30th June 1999. They also include the group's share of the results of joint ventures. Prior to the introduction of Financial Reporting Standard 10, "Goodwill and intangibles", goodwill arising on consolidation as a result of the acquisition of subsidiary undertakings was written off against reserves in the year of acquisition. This goodwill has not been reinstated in the balance sheet. Any goodwill written off reserves will be charged to the profit and loss account in the event of disposal of the related business.

(c) Turnover

Turnover comprises the total proceeds of building and development on legal completion and the value of work executed on long-term contracts during the year excluding inter-company transactions and value added tax. The sale proceeds of part exchange houses are not included in turnover.

(d) Properties held for sale

Properties held for sale, comprising properties previously held for investment, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(e) Stocks

Stocks and work in progress, excluding long term contracting work in progress, are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Profit on contracting is taken on short term contracts when completed, and for long term contracts attributable profit is taken when the final outcome can be foreseen with reasonable certainty; provision is made for any anticipated losses. Amounts by which turnover in respect of long term contracts exceed payments on account are held in debtors as amounts recoverable on contracts. Amounts received in respect of long term contracts, in excess of amounts reflected in turnover, are held in creditors as payments on account.

(f) Depreciation

Freehold properties are not depreciated as it is policy to maintain them to such a standard that the estimated residual value, based on prices prevailing at the time of acquisition or subsequent directors' valuation, is not less than book value. Any permanent diminution in the value of such properties is charged to the profit and loss account. Plant is depreciated on a straight line basis over its expected useful life which ranges from one to seven years.

(g) Leased assets

Operating lease rentals are charged to the profit and loss account in equal instalments over the life of the lease.

(h) Exchange translations

The assets and liabilities of overseas subsidiaries are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the year end and the results are translated at an average rate for the year. (i) Deferred taxation

Provision is made under the liability method for those liabilities that are expected to arise in the foreseeable future.

(j) Pensions

The cost of providing retirement pensions and related benefits is charged to the profit and loss account over the periods benefiting from the employees' services. The effects of variations from regular cost arising from actuarial valuations of the pension scheme are spread over the expected average remaining service lives of the members of the scheme. The difference between the charge to the profit and loss account and the contributions paid to the scheme is shown as an asset or liability in the balance sheet.

The pension cost has been assessed in accordance with the advice of a qualified actuary using the projected unit method in a review of the scheme as at 1st December 1996. The latest actuarial valuation of the scheme has been adjusted to allow for the abolition of UK equity dividend tax credits for pension schemes announced in the 2nd July 1997 Budget. Sterling cash deposits of £58.8m comprise deposits placed on money markets at call.
