REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

We are working in interesting times. Suddenly people are beginning to wake up to the needs of deaf people, even if it's taken the implementation of the Disability Discrimination Act and Human Rights legislation to act as the catalyst. These developments offer a great chance for deaf people to move closer towards taking their rightful place in society and enjoy the benefits of citizenship that the majority of the population takes for granted.

We firmly believe that it is up to organisations like BID to help make these opportunities become realities and consequently have made significant strides forward to meet this aim. Perhaps the most exciting of these has been a project in partnership with local solicitors Cartwright and Lewis, whereby discrimination of deaf people is fought on a "no win no fee" basis. In addition to this the corporate sector is increasingly seeking support to understand their obligations under the act and BID has been proactive in providing training and development to ensure they are complying with the legislation. This has in turn stimulated interest amongst the staff of these organisations to learn sign language with BID.

Whilst the past year has been very busy with many new developments, it is worth highlighting BID's achievement in being awarded the Investor in People standard. It is a tribute to all the staff and volunteers that this was reached in such short timescale and our thanks go out to them for their hard work and support. The recognition by IiP will be very important in the future as competition for contracts becomes keener and the ever-decreasing pot of government money reduces further.

Future plans include creation of a marketing post with a view to raising the local and national profile of BID and the deaf community, an ethnic minority development worker to address issues relating to that section of the community as well as appointing additional interpreters to meet growing demand for their services. Recognising that our accommodation is now inadequate for the size of the organisation and the needs of the deaf people we support, investigations have commenced to assess the most effective ways in which these problems can be met.

BID provides a full range of supported living options for deaf people with additional needs. However there have been some exciting developments over the past year. One home in West Birmingham has been developed, in conjunction with Midland Area Housing Association, to meet the changing needs of the client group. Formally there were two houses both designated as rehabilitation units, but people were not moving on. The reason for this was that some residents' needs appeared to require a home for life whilst others needed more supported independence.

With this in mind BID decided to rethink the residential services it provided and after full consultation with residents and stakeholders embarked on implementing a forward thinking development plan. Essentially one of the homes was returned to Midland Area whilst the other was reduced to four beds and redesignated as a "home for life". Over £20,000 was spent on completely refurbishing the house and the residents were fully involved in choosing the furniture and fittings, as well as getting involved in the painting and decorating.

Whilst these changes were taking place negotiations were underway with Trident Housing Association to provide a range of more independent living options as part of their new developments in the north of city. Four deaf people with additional needs have been accommodated within a new housing complex; one living with support from BID's home care service, two living in a staffed flat and a fourth resident living close by supported by our residential staff. The residents have now settled in and think their new homes are "just brilliant".

Following the success of the Centenary Appeal, BID continues to work towards securing its financial position. In common with many charities, BID must constantly review its position in the light of change in legislation and best practice, including the revised Statement of Recommended Practice to be adopted next year. You will see from the statement of financial activities that income has increased from £1,558,632 to £2,829,142. This is due to an increase in service grants and the receipt of a substantial legacy. Expenditure has increased from £1,496,560 to £1,566,204 due in the main to additional charitable expenditure.

As a result BID achieved a surplus of £1,262,938 compared to £62,072 in the previous year. In addition a designated reserve of £140,000 has been created to fund investigation, planning and implementation of further developments in services to be provided by BID. Unrestricted funds of £1,262,939 provide an adequate capital base for the organisation and will enable the Trustees to plan with vision and confidence. It will also ensure that adequate funds are available to cover future capital and revenue expenditure which may not be covered by future incoming resources. In view of the substantial legacy, which has not yet been received, the directors will undertake a thorough review of the opportunities this provides BID in the forthcoming year. This is a highly creditable performance in the challenging conditions in which BID operates.

Much has been achieved during the past year, including a comprehensive review of the financial policies and procedures of BID. There have also been a number of changes. My thanks go to Stuart Collins, who, having recently passed his final exams, has moved on to further his career. I would also like to place on record my thanks to BDO Stoy Hayward, our former Auditors, for their support and advice. I would also like to welcome Michael Price the new Finance and Systems Manager, who I am sure will continue the good work started by Stuart, along with our new Auditor PKF. I look forward to working with them. In conclusion, I would like to thank the staff, the Finance Sub-Committee and the Board for their support and tireless work.

Finally we wish to place on record our thanks to the deaf community for their continued support and stress that we, the board, are committed to working even closer with you to improve the quality of life for all deaf people. Only together can we make it happen.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards and comply with the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting by Charities".

b) Grants, donations and legacies

Grants, donations and legacies are credited to the statement of financial activities when the company is legally entitled to the proceeds, with amounts relating to subsequent years deferred.

c) Expenditure

Direct charitable expenditure represents the direct costs of projects undertaken during the period.

Management and administration costs represent establishment costs, finance costs and staff costs.

Fund raising and publicity costs relate to costs of operating the company's fund raising and marketing department.

d) Restricted funds

Where income is received for purposes specified by the donor or by the terms of appeal under which it was raised, that income is shown as restricted in the statement of financial activities. Expenditure for the specified purposes is shown as restricted expenditure. Any unexpected balance is carried forward as restricted income funds.

e) Deferred income

Deferred income comprises amounts granted in advance on projects, where it is clear from the terms under which the funds are received that they cannot be used until future periods.

f) Interpreting services and residential income

Interpreting services and residential income are accounted for in the period in which services are provided.

g) Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The Institute donates the majority of items held as stock and these are written off as they are purchased.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

h) Investment

The unlisted investment is stated at market value.

i) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful economic lives as follows:

Freehold land and buildings : over 50 years
Leasehold buildings : over term of lease
Computer equipment : over 3 years

Motor vehicles : 25% reducing balance basis Fixtures and equipment : 10% reducing balance basis

j) Pensions

The company pays contributions to personal and other defined contribution pension schemes. The charge in the accounts represents amounts payable in respect of these contributions.

k) Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the life of the asset.

l) Gifts in kind

Gifts in kind are valued at their open market value as reported by external valuers and recorded in these financial statements at this value.
