We were grateful for the support we received from undergraduate trainee stage managers from the Birmingham Conservatoire to help with the staging of both performances.

At the beginning of 2020 we staged two site-specific performances; -



Afternoon Tea with Jane Austen at Wolverhampton Central Library. Staged to a sold-out audience, the show was organised in conjunction with the City Council as part of the Wolverhampton Literature Festival and was a miscellary of scenes from some of the most iconic Jane Austen novels.

Then, at the beginning of March, we staged *The Many Faces of Queen Victoria* - which should have been the first of two separate shows to celebrate the life of Queen Victoria at the Wolverhampton Art Gallery.



The performance was staged to complement a touring exhibition – Victoria and Albert Our Life in Watercolours

which the Gallery had mounted in conjunction with the Royal Collections Trust.

Sadly, from this point onwards with the onset of a global pandemic and a national lockdown everything changed. The shows we had in rehearsal were all put on hold. These included:

Queen Victoria: A Very Modern Family - (April performance dates)

Jungle Book (An Acting Up performance - April performance dates)

The British Are Leaving (May performance dates in Wolves and at the Sapperlot International Theatre Festival in Northern Italy) This Beautiful Fantastic –(A junior performance - dates in June)

Journey to the River Sea (A junior performance - dates in June)

Double Standards (performance dates in July)

All of our live performance work had to be postponed indefinitely and as we write this report the future of live theatre remains uncertain. However, as CYT has done so in the past, we will continually look for alternative ways of making innovative theatre work with young people, a skill which will be much needed as we all face an uncertain future in the 'new normal'

#### International Projects

We participated in the final year of a 3-year exchange with two international youth theatre groups from Italy and the Czech Republic. In May 2019 we took 12 members aged 9-13 to the Hollawind Theatre Festival in Brixen, Italy, with a brand new production called *Running Between the Lines*. The performance was also staged at the Newhampton Arts Centre in Wolverhampton.



Another very contrasting Erasmus international project was *HumARTs* – a partnership with two international creative organisations - Swinging Europe from Denmark and BakYard from Turkey. The focus of the project was to explore Human Arts creatively through theatre, music and arts with small groups of young people from CYT, Denmark, and Turkey working with 15 refugees from countries such as Syria, Iraq and Jordan. The first phase was a 2-day planning meeting in Herning, Denmark, attended by CYT's Co-Director Holly Parry and ForeFront member Alexis Probin.

## TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

Forefront is CYT's emerging artist group for young people aged 18-25. Four members were selected from this group to participate in the project. They each carried out fundraising activities to cover the additional travel costs not covered by the European grant, as well as taking part in regular training/planning workshops.

Sadly, due to a nasty accident close to the departure date, Jane was unable to travel to Turkey, and we were grateful to former CYT member/staff member Rosie Baggott for stepping in to take Jane's place as a project leader.



During the two-week programme of work in Antalya, Turkey, we took part in and also delivered, a series of drama workshops exploring human rights - leading to a final performance integrating drama, music and the traditional Turkish art form Ebru. The project was documented by a professional documentary film maker from Denmark, with a film due to be released at the end of 2020.

### **FUNDRAISING**

During 2019 we held a number of successful fundraising activities that helped us to raise much needed funds towards our core costs including;

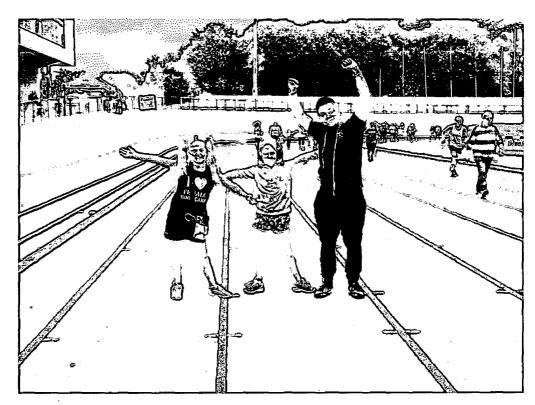
#### **Hilarity Charity Gala**

The Trustees present their annual report, together with the financial statements, of Central Youth Theatre for the year 1 April 2019 to 31 March 2020. The annual report serves the purpose of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm the annual report and the financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provision of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 (effective January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic report required of a medium and large copmanies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulation 2013 has been omitted.

#### Structure, Governance and Management

Central Youth Theatre (CYT) was registered as a company limited by guarantee on 31 May 2007. It has no share capital and is a registered charity. The guarantee of each member is limited to £1. The governing documents are the Memorandum of Association and Articles of Association of the company, and members of the board of Trustees are Directors of the company.

CYT is governed by a board of Trustees who are appointed at the Annual General Meeting.

Nominations to the board are limited to the residents of Wolverhampton and the surrounding area and who have an active interest in the work of the company. CYT currently has a board of 12 members and comprises directors from a broad section of the community bringing their own skills and experience in the performing arts, education, public/voluntary sector and commerce. The Board appoint a freelance Artistic Director to develop and direct all CYT artistic activities, contributing to the strategic development of the company.

#### **Public Benefit**

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to the general guidance published by the Charity Commission relating to public benefit, including the guidance 'Public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

CYT is the only youth theatre group in the city successfully integrating people with disabilities and additional needs into our artistic projects. This has an enormous positive impact on these members but also creates awareness of the importance and value of this work for othe members.

#### Objects of the company

To advance the education of young people under the age of 26 living within Wolverhampton, and the surrounding area in all aspects of the art of drama and theatre production and the development of public appreciation of such art.

### **Our Vision**

Connecting young people in Wolverhampton, nurturing their abilities and inspiring them to shape the cultural life of the city in innovative, dynamic and diverse artistic ways.

#### Aims

To offer young people of every background and ability the opportunity to be involved in all aspects of the creative arts in an open and safe environment within the City of Wolverhampton.

To build confidence and skills, enabling young people to learn through creative, fun, aspirational projects, workshops and performances, as well as unique opportunities to undertake international work.

To encourage young people to drive the work forward in innovative ways providing benefits for the local community as well as wider audiences.

To celebrate the continuing achievements of our alumni, involving these former members in the nurturing of future creative talents, to provide insight, advice and guidance to careers in the performing arts and media.

To provide a varied programme of performing arts, skill development, education and entertainment that our members and public are willing to support.

To work collaboratively with partners in the Third Sector, Schools/Colleges and Private Sector to support The City of Wolverhampton delivering the key themes set out in the City Strategy 2011-2026.

To make a significant contribution to invigorate Wolverhampton City Centre and the weekend/local evening time economy.

To advocate the intrinsic value of artistic and cultural activities to the social and economic well-being of individuals and in the communities we work in.

Generate an effective, sustainable financial plan that will minimise the reliance on grant funding.

#### **Financial Review**

This year was a reasonable year for CYT. Our income was £80,982 and expenditure £84,977. General unrestricted funds are £35,609 so remain at a fully acceptable level.

Reserves policy

The company aims to hold general (unrestricted) reserves of between three and six months running costs. The present reserves represent twelve months essential costs.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### 1. General information

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association in May 2007.

The principal object of the company is to advance the education of young people under the age of 26, living within Wolverhampton and the surrounding area in all aspects of the art of drama and theatre production and the development of public appreciation of such art

### 2. Accounting policies

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Central Youth Theatre meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

#### 2.2 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

#### 2.3 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the company's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### 2.4 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the institution with whom the funds are deposited.

#### 2.5 Taxation

The company is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the company is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

#### 2.6 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

#### 2.7 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

### 2.8 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the Statement of financial activities as a finance cost.

#### 2.9 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### 2.10 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.
