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CHAIRMAN'S AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2009

We had another successful year, with 86 school groups, each composed of 34-39 urban children, spending a whole seven days on our three working farms, learning about farming, food production and country life. Fundraising continued to go very well indeed.

Jane Feaver re-joined the Board at the AGM in December and we gained Rachel Short as another new member, taking the numbers back up to ten. Rachel is a lawyer who for many years worked in the City and who brings an invaluable legal perspective to the Board. We recruited Phoebe Laing-Taylor as our new deputy chief executive. Phoebe was born and grew up close to Nethercott, our farm in Devon, and comes with a great deal of experience working in personnel and human resources. Gladys Weeks retired just prior to her eightieth birthday, after more than 30 years of cooking for the children at Nethercott. House. Gladys worked at Nethercott even before Clare and Michael Morpurgo founded the charity there in 1976 and she lives in the neighbouring village of Iddesleigh.

We celebrated Christmas in great style with a fundraising event at St Paul's Cathedral Michael Morpurgo, Joanna Lumley and James Naughtie performed *On Angel Wings*, Michael's retelling of the nativity. The performance was set to songs from acapella singers Coope, Boyes and Simpson. It was a magical evening and the vast Cathedral was completely full.

Jonathan Crump, who had farmed at Wick Court in Gloucestershire for all of the charity's ten years there, left for a larger farm, where he continues with his Gloucester cheese making business. We gradually restructured at Wick Court, preserving the emphasis on local rare breeds, but without a working dairy right outside the children's accommodation. Luke Essex was promoted to Farm Manager and was instrumental in producing a farm business plan for the charity. We retain a small herd of Gloucester cows, keeping the bloodline going, along with sheep, pigs, poultry, geese and, of course, a busy working stable of show horses and ponies. We will be steadily introducing more livestock to ensure that the children have as full an experience as possible, working with a range of farm animals. Each day the children continue to visit Oldbury, the next door, larger-scale dairy farm. This is thanks to a long standing and fruitful working relationship with the Merrett family. Meanwhile, we have extended the kitchen garden at Wick Court over onto the other side of the moat, as part of a move towards greater self-sufficiency. The children now help to grow, pick and cook even more produce for the meals served at Wick Court and we are soon to re-issue a cook book full of their favourite recipes.

On a beautifully sunny day in May, the children and teachers of Harewood Junior School from Gloucester hosted a visit to Wick Court by our Patron, Her Royal Highness, The Princess Royal The Princess chatted with the children as they went about their jobs, which included weeding in the vegetable garden, grooming the horses and baking bread to eat with their supper. We are hugely grateful to The Princess Royal for her knowledgeable engagement with our work over many years.

During the year we undertook a job evaluation, looking at different levels of responsibility within the organisation and how they are reflected in levels of pay. We introduced a company pay policy and pay scales based on an independent, external survey of comparable roles, to be reviewed every three years. We also, for the first time, allocated a training budget and during the year many staff members undertook training in a whole range of areas. All our farm managers have undertaken the individual CEVAS (Countryside Educational Visits Accreditation Scheme) Stage 1 training. On an entirely different note, managers from Nethercott and Wick Court took part in a three-day natural dyeing and weaving course, funded by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation.

On a high summer's evening in July the rain held off until the very end of Miracle Theatre's performance of Molière's *Tartuffe* to a packed audience on the lawn at Nethercott House, raising funds for the charity in the process. The play was supplemented by delicious 'Summer Garden Suppers' cooked by Catherine Knight, who co-manages Nethercott, using fresh produce from the garden and the farm

Local artists and makers continued to run an exciting range of creative projects involving the children on all three farms. This was made possible thanks to generous three-year funding from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation. At Nethercott in Devon, the project focused on rural skills, with local experts coming in to work with the children making hurdles, baskets and felt slippers from raw fleece. Meanwhile the farm staff ran a variety of complementary activities such as campfire cooking and charcoal-making, constructing bird-boxes and bee hotels made from bamboo. The children and teachers, without exception, enjoyed all of these activities, frequently commenting on how much they enjoyed the connection with the environment and with ideas relating to sustainability. A lasting legacy remains, in the form of a splendid cob goose house and an impressive cob and thatch round house, for use in all weather. At Treginnis the children made willow sheep, willow sculptures and musical instruments. At Wick Court Karen Hilliard, a ceramic artist, worked with the children to turn a huge pile of unfired bricks into a sculpture of a Gloucester Old Spot sow and her piglets, which was installed in the back garden as a seating area.

We are so grateful for wonderful support from all our funders - from businesses, trusts, foundations, individuals, children and schools. Companies who have generously supported our work this year include Reed Elsevier, Helpful Holidays, Heron Valley Organics and Gidleigh Park Hotel. The Friends of Treginnis continued with their astoundingly successful local fundraising on behalf of our Welsh farm and, last but not least, Michael Morpurgo raised over £23,000 towards our work through appearances and school speech days and prize-givings.

Here are the comments of a teacher from Tower Bridge School in London, who brought a group to Treginnis for the very first time in February,

"You have created an amazing place and we have so enjoyed staying here. The children that we will be taking back on the coach with us tomorrow are not the same children who arrived here last Friday (not literally of course...) They are more bonded as a group, brimming with confidence and they are full of excitement and happy stories to share with their families."

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2009

The trustees, who are also the directors of the parent charity, present their report and financial statements of the group for the year ended 31 July 2009. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with current statutory requirements, the charity's governing documents and the recommendations of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) and comply with applicable law

1 Status and Administration

The parent company is limited by guarantee, number 01177239, and is a charitable trust registered with the Charity Commission number 325120 The charity's governing document is a Memorandum of Association dated 31st December 1973. There are three different sites, Nethercott House, Lower Treginnis Farm and Wick Court. The trustees determine the general policy of the farms and delegate responsibility for the day to day operations to the management team, consisting of the Chief Executive and the farm school managers. The Board meets on a quarterly basis to review school evaluations, financial reports, reports from the management team and to decide other matters of policy, as advised by the Chief Executive. Board meetings rotate and one meeting per year is held at each of the farms. The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commissions general guidance on public benefit when reviewing Farms for City Children's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

2 Principal Activities

The activities of the charity consist of the provision of practical experience, within an educational environment, of agricultural and rural life for children from inner city and urban areas who might not otherwise attain the knowledge it involves. The Chairman and Chief Executive's report on pages 1 to 2 summarises how our activities provide a very real benefit to the children that visit our farms.

4. Review of Activities

The charity operated the three farms at Nethercott House, Lower Treginnis and Wick Court. Net incoming resources for the year, after including donations received for revenue purposes, were £43,228. The charity aims to welcome 87 school groups to its three farms each year and sets budgets accordingly. 86 school groups visited the farms during the year. The charity is vulnerable to cancellations by school groups, as replacement schools can rarely slot into gaps without at least 6-8 months notice. Farms for City Children is developing strategies aimed at minimizing the risk of late cancellations. The charity operates a qualitative evaluation procedure, seeking formal feedback from teachers and pupils. This is used to assess performance and to improve services and is reviewed quarterly at Board meetings. Performance in 2009 was deemed to be very good, with excellent feedback from schools and a high level of repeat bookings for future years.

The cost to visiting children is kept as low as possible and money is raised from other sources in order to make this possible. Fundraising activities include applications to trusts and foundations, fundraising events (fetes, performances, open days), letting the farm properties out of term time and newsletter mailings. The charity also raises funds through its small trading subsidiary, FFCC Enterprises Ltd, which sells books, greeting cards and other items.

5. Future Developments

Despite a small number of late cancellations, we are in the fortunate position of having more groups wishing to come than can be slotted into the programme. We are developing plans for a fourth farm in order to help accommodate them

6 Reserves Policy

The trustees' policy is to use the charity's reserves to improve the facilities and education offered at the farms. Following excellent fundraising efforts in previous years, a major part (£150,000) of the revenue surpluses generated have been allocated to the Development Fund which has been designated for authorised developments at Nethercott House, Lower Treginnis Farm and Wick Court in addition, all the capital grants and donations received have been reinvested in the fabric of these sites. The majority of this income was given for spending on specific farms or purposes.

We retain £635,966 received from the estate of F M Schofield in 2008 as the foundation for a capital fundraising campaign towards the acquisition of a fourth farm

The balance of the free reserves of £374,921 is held in the general fund. The trustees intend to build on this fund over the next few years to represent six months running expenses (£450,000). The trustees are conscious that farming in this country faces uncertain times. They wish to plan for adverse economic conditions and other potential threats, providing assurance to staff, supporters and users and ensuring the long-term future of the chanty.

The finance sub-committee considers the most appropriate policy for investing funds and advises the Board accordingly

8. Assets cover for funds

Note 20 to the financial statements sets out an analysis of the company's assets attributable to the various funds. These assets are sufficient to meet the company's obligations

9. Risk Management

The trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks, which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks

10 Appointment of trustees

Trustees are recruited for their expertise based on knowledge of their skills in other fields. They come as recommendations from Board Members or as a result of the knowledge of people who are familiar with our work. Prospective trustees are interviewed by the board, and their appointment is dependent on a unanimous election by the Board Members. New trustees are provided with an induction pack of reading material including the charity's business plan. Trustees are encouraged to visit all three of the farms, either before or during the course of the board meetings scheduled at the farms throughout the year.

11 Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (directors) are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, for the year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees (directors) are required to

- a select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- b make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- c state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- d prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the chantable company will continue in business

The trustees (directors) are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the chantable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements of the charitable company comply with the Companies Act 2006, The Charities Act 1993, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008, and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (UK GAAP). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF FARMS FOR CITY CHILDREN

We have audited the group and parent financial statements of Farms for City Children for the year ended 31 July 2009 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein

This report is made solely to the charity's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 495 of the Companies Act 2006. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

1 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

2 Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are shown below

2.1 Incoming resources

Voluntary income

Voluntary income consists of all incoming resources (whether in cash or assets in hand) other than incoming resources received for investment income, gains, grants or payments for goods or services. This is recognised in the statement of financial activities as soon as entitlement to the income is determined.

Voluntary income is recognised on receipt and includes associated tax claims on a receivable basis Legacies are recognised by reference to the date probate is granted, or if later, as soon as they are capable of being measured in financial terms. Grants of a general nature are recognised as voluntary income.

Activities for generating funds

Income from the chanty's subsidiary company, and from fundraising activities are included in incoming resources in the period to which it relates

Investment income

Investment income is included in incoming resources in the period to which it relates

Incoming resources from charitable activities

Accommodation charges are included in the financial statements in the period to which the letting relates. Grants received for the performance of a specific service are classified as incoming resources from charitable activities. Other income is included in the financial statements when due

2.2 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of resources.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those
 incurred in trading activities that raise funds
- Charitable activities include the costs involved in the provision of services that Farms for City Children provides
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets, and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements

Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered

2.3 Assets and liabilities

These are included in the balance sheet at the following amounts

Fixed assets at cost less an appropriate provision for depreciation Current assets at the lower of cost and net realisable value Liabilities at their settlement value

2 4 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value

2 5 Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows

Freehold buildings and improvements

Nethercott House 50 years

Leasehold improvements

Lower Treginnis Farm 60 years Wick Court 99 years

Plant, furniture and equipment 10 and 25 years

Motor vehicles 25% per annum on cost

Freehold land is not a depreciable asset

Assets with a value below £500 are not capitalised within the financial statements, but expended to the SOFA

2.6 Unrestricted Funds

The unrestricted fund consists of general funds that the chanty may use at its own discretion

2.7 Designated Funds

Development Fund

The trustees have designated a specific fund for authorised developments at Nethercott House, Lower Treginnis Farm and Wick Court

F M Schofield Fund

Farms for City Children were the sole beneficianes of the estate of F M Schofield. The trustees wish to use the monies received in order to acquire a fourth farm. Therefore the funds were designated for this purpose in the 2008 accounting period.

2.8 Restricted Funds

These are funds that can be only used for restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes

The restricted funds balances for Nethercott, Wick Court and Treginnis are funds received for capital developments and equate with the land and property values as shown in fixed assets

Any other restricted funds received whether revenue or capital are shown in the miscellaneous restricted fund

Further details of the restricted funds are detailed in note 18

29 Cash flow statement

The directors have taken advantage of the provision in the Financial Reporting Standard No 1 not to prepare a cash flow statement

2.10 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are expended as they fall due

2.11 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution scheme Contributions to the scheme are expended as they fall due A stakeholder scheme for all staff has been operated since September 2001

2.12 Consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary, FFCC Enterprises Ltd on a line to line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities and Income and Expenditure account, for the charity itself are not presented because the charity has taken advantage of the exemptions afforded by Companies Act and paragraph 397 of the SORP, although the individual financial performance of Farms for City Children is noted below.

3 Financial performance of the charity

The consolidated statement of financial activities includes the results of the charity's wholly owned subsidiary, FFCC Enterprises Limited which operates a gift shop with each farm. The summary financial performance of the charity alone is -

Major plant such as the boiler at Nethercott House are capitalised on acquisition and a transfer made from restricted to unrestricted funds as the restriction relates to the use of funds donated rather than the use of the plant itself

The trustees have designated a specific fund for authorised developments at Nethercott House, Lower Treginnis Farm and Wick Court At 31 July 2009, £150,000 had been designated for this purpose

The trustees received £635,966 from the estate of F M Schofield in the 2008 accounting period. The trustees would like to fund the acquisition of a fourth farm. Therefore these funds were designated by the trustees in the 2008 account period for this purpose. There was no change in the year ended 31 July 2009.

The balance of the free reserves of £374,921 is held in the general fund. The trustees intend to build on this fund over the next few years to represent six months running expenses (£450,000). The trustees are conscious that farming in this country faces uncertain times. They wish to plan for adverse economic conditions and other potential threats, providing assurance to staff, supporters and users and ensuring the long-term future of the charity.
