Five Year Plan

During the year expenditure has taken place for ongoing Clubhouse improvements and course drainage work to the 1st and 18th holes. Significant capital costs have also included the hand mowers which provision was made for in the five year plan. The addition of the bore hole, with a relatively short payback period, should provide reasonable cost savings for future years to come.

Looking ahead, council feels it vital to continue with the ongoing machinery replacement programme and both improvements to the course and clubhouse. Council will however, ensure that tight budgetary controls remain in place for both capital and revenue expenditure. During the current economic climate a prudent view must be taken and expenditure will only be approved where funds permit.

Cash at Bank and in Hand

At the year end there was a positive cash balance of £378,175 (2010 £350,444) This included advance subscriptions, advance competition entry fees and bar deposits of £285,244 (2010 £266,758) In addition trade and other creditors were £78,921 (2010 £75,780) This leaves a cash surplus for the year of £14 010 (2010 £7,906)

Liquidity

The balance sheet shows positive liquidity of £43,539 (2010 £44,766)

Course Report

As this is most probably the last course report of which I will be the author, I will try and make it as enlightening as possible

I think the best way to take a view of the year is chronologically, so we will start with January 2011

Winter 2010 / 2011

From about the 20th November 2010 until the 10th January 2011 we had a deep freeze. The green keepers couldn't see the turf, so had no idea what was happening under the snow and ice. Through good practice they had sprayed with fungicide in the middle of November 2010. Because of this, despite the very testing conditions of no light and no air movement on the surface of the turf, when the snow melted there were no scars from Fusarium Nivale disease.

Scars made by disease in the winter do not repair until good growth occurs in late April or early May, with the consequential disturbance to the putting surface

2 Spring

The Spring which followed the extremely cold spell, was one of the driest on record. The rainfall recorded between January and the beginning of June was very low. This made it necessary to use the irrigation system several times each week, supplemented by hand watering the high areas from where water is shed when the automatic system is used.

The areas round the greens do not receive irrigation, so it made the course very difficult to play because balls ran after they had landed Due to this, several comments were made about the difficulty of the course After the rain returned, scores came down and the comments went away

3 Summer

There had still been very small amounts of rain when the regional qualifying was played in late June. This caused the course to play shorter than we are used to, but certainly made it more difficult, which was reflected in the scores.

During July the rain returned and began to make up for the dry Spring weather. It is important to remember that after such a prolonged dry spell, the ground has lots of capacity to soak up water. In places the cracks which had appeared, allowed surface water to disappear deep into the profile. When rain has fallen for a period the ground reaches a state known as "Field Capacity". This means even small amounts of rainfall can no longer be absorbed by the ground and, as a consequence, sits on the surface. Fortunately we have thousands of trees on the course and these drink huge amounts of water when in leaf, so they are a great help in summer. The estimated demand depending on the maturity of the tree is 30-50 gallons a day, per tree.

Unfortunately they don't drink in winter, so we lose their help after September. The other benefit in the summer is obviously evaporation, which we lose once autumn arrives, unless the wind blows. These are very important factors affecting ground conditions. The management of the club have strived over the years to improve winter ground conditions and I am sure will continue to do so. Beware of magic answers offered by companies, which can appear very alluring

The maintenance programme was again carried out in August and a tremendous effort was made to return play to the greens on the Saturday. The fight against build up of organic matter is constant. As the grass grows and then dies back it creates an organic layer which is commonly known as thatch. If this is not controlled, the surface of the greens show footprints of players, which tend to be most concentrated round the hole. If anyone would like to understand about the biology related to this effect, some of the American universities, which specialize in turf culture, have very good websites.

4 Autumn

As the autumn progressed, the rain didn't stop and we had a difficult time. In some cases cutting grass was not possible, as to do so would have caused major damage to the turf. If the rough and semi-rough seemed long sometimes, it is probably because ground conditions prevented mowing from taking place.

A significant drainage operation was undertaken in the month of August. The intention was to lay a large diameter main drain on the 1st and 18th fairways, into which our staff could connect smaller drains when time allowed.

A new aerating machine is to be purchased in the near future. This will be less intrusive on the turf and much more manoeuvrable for areas round the greens. This is particularly important, as these are areas of very concentrated wear and need frequent aeration and top dressing. Hopefully this will contribute to better lies around the greens.

5 Winter 2011 / 2012

Winter work is in hand at this time and Andrew and his team are trying to improve areas where we all have to walk. Every year some attempt is made to improve the conditions under foot, but as work is carried out in one area, another becomes more difficult

Finally I would like to pay tribute to all the members of council who, over the decades have taken decisions which enable us to have the course we play today. In particular, the changes made in 1963 when the 9th, 10th, and 17th holes were made. Most people agree the 17th is the signature hole at Clitheroe. The other major decision was the commitment to rebuild the greens, for which we should all be grateful.

House Report

This year has been a year of consolidation after several years of spending with the refurbishment of the main lounge, legends room and changing rooms. We have continued our policy of controlling overheads and purchasing as competitively as we can. The bar has continued to trade well although slightly down on previous years. This is due to the state of the economy and bad weather, and we are closely monitoring price increases from the breweries. We have managed to make savings both in staffing levels and purchasing from our suppliers which has enabled us to make considerable savings on budget.

Purchases/ repairs

Once again this year we have managed to get away without any major expenses or replacements in the kitchen or bar area. But this winter during January we will be replacing the flooring in the kitchen areas. This has been budgeted for and will now have to be replaced with hopefully not too much disruption to the catering staff or members, although there may be a couple of days when a limited menu may only be available.

The Halfway House

Paul and his team have decided not to continue with the running of the Halfway house next season, and Mike and I have been interviewing prospective candidates during the last couple of weeks. We have found a couple who are keen to take on the facility and a contract is being drawn up as we speak. I am sure they will offer a very high level of service and have some great ideas, your support of course is needed to help them to develop this facility.

New developments

Other than wear and tear replacements we have nothing major planned for the clubhouse other than cosmetic work as and where required. We as a committee are always looking for ways to improve your facilities and are very conscious of the rising cost of our utilities, therefore we are looking for ways to save on our water and heating costs in a similar way to the reductions and savings we have been able to make with the lighting. If we feel that savings can be made we will investigate them and recommend to council where savings can be made.

Once again I would like to thank my fellow committee members for their help and support and thanks to Bernard, Peter and the bar staff for the smooth running of the bar and to Margaret and her team for the excellent catering. There are many clubs in this area that are struggling to find good consistent caterers and they are certainly envious of the standard of catering offered here at Clitheroe Golf Club. Well done keep up the good work.

Let's hope for another good year next year

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost accounting rules

Fixed assets and depreciation

Taxation

The company enjoys the status of an incorporated club, and as such the liability to corporation taxation only extends to investment income and chargeable gains

Leases

Where the company enters into a lease which entails taking substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset, the lease is treated as a 'finance lease'. The asset is recorded in the balance sheet as a tangible fixed asset and is depreciated over its estimated useful life or the term of the lease, which ever is shorter. Future instalments under such leases, net of finance charges, are included within creditors. Rentals payable are apportioned between the finance element, which is charged to the income and expenditure account, and the capital element which reduces the outstanding obligation for future instalments.

All other leases are accounted for as 'operating leases' and the rental charges are charged to the income and expenditure account when paid

Cash flow statement
