STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Board of Trustees is ethically and financially responsible for the charity. The position of Trustee is voluntary, and one for which none of the Trustees or those closely related to them may receive financial remuneration. Trustees are recruited and appointed on the basis of necessary skills sets at board level and their under-representation. Candidates are sought through pertinent networks decided up on the Trustees. Appointments are made by proposal to the board which are considered and voted upon by all board members.

The one third of the trustees are required to retire each year and maybe re-elected by the board.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Dance Art Foundation is an independent national charity inspiring recognition of the cultural significance of dance, and advancing public and individual engagement, understanding and appreciation of dance as a contemporary art form.

The objectives of Dance Art Foundation are:

a. to advance education for the public benefit by the promotion of the arts, in particular, but not exclusively the art of dance.

b. to relieve individuals who are suffering from physical or psychological illness or disability by the provision of facilities for them to participate in dance and the arts for therapeutic purposes.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Trustees of Dance Art Foundation are delighted to report that the charity achieved a strong, well balanced mixed financial economy across commissions and earned income (33%), public subsidy (36%), charitable grants and awards (19%) and individual and corporate donations (12%). The Trustees, Artistic Director and whole team express their sincere thanks to Dance Art Foundation's partners, funders, artists, participants and audiences who together made its work possible this year.

Dance Art Foundation incubates new ideas in dance that it takes out into the world in fresh and imaginative ways. Its performance work is bold and progressive, often transgressing art form boundaries and in dialogue with other disciplines. Its Critical Dialogues projects drives dance forward, fostering fertile debate that challenges artists and widens public access to new thinking in dance. In social engagement, Dance Art Foundation is an international leader in dance-in-health. Dance Art Foundation is directed by choreographer Joe Moran, who curates and produces its programmes, supported freelance project staff and in collaboration with an exceptional group of Associate Artists.

Production

This year, Dance Art Foundation embarked upon Why Everyone Wants What We've Got, a dynamic two-year research project funded by Arts Council England with leading international artists and dance and visual art partners. It comprised an extensive collection of performance, events, talks, workshops and residencies speaking up for dance's critical acumen amidst the resurgence of interest in dance from the visual arts, creative industries and beyond. The programme had three distinct strands: public events, artist research and residencies, delivered in partnership with Block Universe, Chisenhale Dance Space, Dance4, David Roberts Art Foundation, Delfina Foundation, Institute of Contemporary Art (ICA), Sadler's Wells, Trinity Laban and TripSpace Projects. It will culminate in an online publication in early 2017.

Extending our strong interest in the dialogue between dance and the visual arts, Artistic Director Joe Moran formalised his collaboration with celebrated visual artist Eva Rothschild. The artists presented A Setup (Jun 2015), a very well received week of performance, sculpture and film for the inaugural Block Universe Performance Art Festival in partnership with fig-2 at the ICA in London, supported by Arts Council England and Outset. Rothschild and Moran undertook a further period of research and development with Sadler's Wells (Dec 2015 - Mar 2016) towards a new large-scale collaborative performance work, Confusion is Why that will premiere in 2018.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Associate Artists

Dance Art Foundation was delighted to consolidate its Associate Artists programmes in both choreography and participation. Supporting and working with five exceptional artists - Louise Klarnett, Nando Messias, Florence Peake, Kirstie Richardson and Susannah Tate - we delivered performances and workshops in theatres, hospices and major cultural institutions across the UK:

- Nando Messias' The Sissy's Progress proved to be a hugely successful national tour produced by Dance Art Foundation and attracting extensive national press and critical attention (Nov 2015 Mar 2016)
- Louise Klarnett's Dancing Communities, a yearlong programme of movement workshops for early years children including those with special education needs at Kay Rowe Children's Centre and Nursery School in Newham, London
- Florence Peake's Christmas Crackers returned to the V&A for a week over Christmas and New Year with three daily performances, and supported by weekends of popular family workshops devised and led by Associate Louise Klarnett (Dec 2015 Jan 2016)
- Kirstie Richardson, Susannah Tate and Louise Klarnett deepen our ongoing relationships with six rural and urban children's hospices leading yearlong project in London and the South East, North and North East England (Apr 2015 Mar 2016)

Dance Art Foundation's celebrated Breathing Space dance-in-health programme continued this year with the generous support of BBC Children in Need, Awards for All, Investec Social Investment, Essex County Council and Evan Cornish Foundation. Our Associate Artists team offered participatory workshops in dance and creative movement for children and young people with life-limiting, life-threatening and life-changing illnesses and their siblings and families. Demand for our participatory projects, staff training and performances in health remained very high and attracted generous support. Artist Director Joe Moran continued to offer regular talks, workshops and masterclasses as a guest artist in higher education, conservatoires and professional contexts.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The charity is not in receipt of core funding from any agency; rather it receives restricted, project-based funding or unrestricted income from workshops and performances that is spent in accordance with its charitable objectives. The charity retains reserves required to complete committed projects.

Funds in deficit

The Trustees recognise that there is a deficit in the unrestricted funds and are doing their utmost to rectify the situation. The Trustees do not feel that this deficit will affect the company continuing as a going concern.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
