

# Report of the Auditor to the Members of the Derbyshire Wildlife Trust Limited

I have audited the annexed financial statements in accordance with approved Auditing Standards, having regard to the matters referred to in the following paragraphs.

This charity, in common with many others of similar size and organisation, derives a substantial proportion of its income from voluntary activities and donations which cannot be fully controlled until they are entered in the accounting records, and are not therefore susceptible to independent audit verification.

The Accounts of individual Branches of the Trust are not incorporated in the annexed statements, and have not been included in my audit.

Subject to the foregoing, in my opinion the financial statements, which have been prepared under the historical cost convention, give, when read in conjunction with the notes thereon, a true and fair view of the Company's affairs as at 31st March 1986, and of its surplus of income over expenditure for the year then ended, and comply with the Companies Act 1985.

## Notes forming part of the Accounts for the Year ended 31st March 1986

### (1) TANGIBLE ASSETS

The value of land held as Nature Reserves is shown at cost, no depreciation being provided in respect of this land.

### (2) EQUIPMENT

Total expenditure on equipment during the year amounted to £7,704, including £4,854 in respect of the computer installation. Grants of £3,495 were received against this expenditure, and included £2,845 from the R.S.N.C. and the Nature Conservancy Council towards the computer installation. The value of the equipment in these accounts is shown after the amount of the grants.

### (6) STATUS OF THE TRUST

The Trust is a Company limited by Guarantee, not having a capital divided into shares. It is registered as a charity under the provisions of the Charities Act 1960.

### (7) VALUE ADDED TAX

Income and Expenditure subject to Value Added Tax have been stated in the Accounts at the net amounts receivable or payable by the company.

### (8) SUBSCRIPTIONS

Although the amount received to 31st March 1986 includes the majority of members' payments covering the year to 31st December 1986, the Finance Committee do not consider it to be practical or necessary for a provision to be made in respect of the proportions of the subscriptions paid in advance.

The figure shown in the Accounts includes the sum of £2,878 in respect of income tax recoverable on subscriptions received under Deeds of Covenant.

### (9) GRANTS AND DONATIONS RECEIVED

This includes all other receipts and donations from individuals, local authorities and outside organisations, other than those grants received for other specified purposes (Notes 2 and 11).

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

(Continued from page 1)

with calls for advice on site reclamation and restoration. Comments have also been made on a number of local plans for areas as diverse as Matlock, the Erewash Valley and parts of Derby. Discussions with the Peak Park Planning Board centred on the proposed management plan for the Eastern Moors estate, including Big Moor. Agreement was finally reached, after several meetings, on the establishment of substantial sanctuary areas without open access which will be managed to enhance their wildlife value. Discussions have also been held on the future of Brampton East Moor, part of the Chatsworth Estate, for which open access has been proposed.

As well as this wide range of advisory work Pat Brissley has also represented the Trust on a wide range of committees, including the County Council Conservation Advisory Group of which she is Chairman. She also makes a considerable number of visits to farmers each year to advise on developing wildlife as part of the work of the Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group (FWAG) within the county.

Another area of conservation work which the Trust wishes to be involved with is concerned with urban wildlife. Urban sites can be valuable refuges for many common species and although some advisory work has been done at a few sites a proper programme has still not been possible. We are again considering the possibilities of M.S.C. funded personnel for this work although any scheme is not likely to materialise until 1987.

Successful conservation depends on reliable information both on species and sites. Following the original Trust survey team a second team sponsored by M.S.C. has been surveying shale and gritstone grasslands in the Peak Park, while the Trust has also been involved with the Upper Derwent Valley Survey. Following the previous year's successful prosecution for badger-digging a well organised Trust Badger Group now exists which is resurveying all badger setts as well as participating in the National Badger Survey. The new law against badger digging has now been successfully used in several prosecutions brought by the police who now have two wildlife liaison officers in the county.

The Bat Group of the Trust also had a successful year with an increase in the number of licence holders allowed to handle bats. This has meant a sharing of the work of removing and transporting bats from those who are disinclined to have these lodgers in their lofts. 1986 is National Bat Year and the Group is planning a programme of talks, exhibits and other events.

### Education and Publicity

As in previous years steady progress has been made during the year through Nick Brown's efforts. "Watch", the junior branch of the Trust, continues to flourish with ten local groups by the end of the year, including new ones at Hayfield and Clay Cross. An activities day at Elvaston was almost too successful with 266 children engaged in activities as diverse as pond dipping, nest-box inspections and environment games — many thanks to those who helped at this event. The programme of development of school nature reserve areas continues with welcome interest and help from the County Council. Another of Nick's many jobs is to prepare press releases and deal with enquiries from the press. Very few weeks go by now without some mention of the Trust in a newspaper somewhere in the county and, on events like the Plant Hunt, substantial items appear in newspapers through the county together with local radio coverage. Within the Trust the newsletter is a vital link of communication for members; Fran Hill as editor regularly creates a professional image out of a miscellany of items and has our grateful thanks for this energetic work.

A major project through the year, was writing and preparing the material for the *Nature of Derbyshire*, the manuscript of which was delivered to the publishers at Buckingham towards the end of March on a day of storm-force gales.

### Membership and Funds

Membership at the end of the year was 3,689, and increase of eighty-seven in the year, smaller than the previous year which, however, was marked by a high publicity profile in connection with the Trust's badger-digging case. It was unfortunately necessary in view of the Trust's increased cost and commitments to put up the subscription rates in January but it is pleasing to note that very few members have resigned as a result.

As always, the Trust is helped and sustained in many of its activities by a wide range of voluntary help from members. The honorary officers also put in many hours of work on behalf of the Trust and especial mention should be made here of John Varty who retired as Vice-Chairman at the A.G.M., but was immediately elevated to a Vice-President and who, with Joyce, continues to work as hard as ever on sales, protecting badgers and many other Trust activities. I would also like to thank Stuart Band, who is retiring this year as Honorary Secretary, for all his hard work over the years.

The local groups continue to flourish and their experiences are pooled at an annual meeting of all interested members run by the Chesterfield Group each March. Particularly encouraging is the widening of fund raising activities which this year have included a Barn Dance, organised by the West Derby Group, which raised £250, concerts in Great Longstone and Alfreton by a baroque ensemble and a concert in Mickleover by Mickleover Music School which raised £100. Individual members also opened their gardens to the public to raise money for the Trust. The organisation of local groups takes considerable time and effort and we thank all those who carry out this work and particularly Brian Jenkins and Sue Meinertzhagen who have retired this year from chairing the Wye and Upper Derwent and South Derbyshire Groups respectively for a number of years.

In the office help has come from a regular group including Alan Bolling, Don and Joyce Baker, Peter Baker, George Smith and Frank Challands who, together with others, carry out a wide range of work from helping with the collation and dispatch of the newsletter to assisting with sales goods. The organisation of sales has continued in the capable hands of Dick Appleby, to whom we are very grateful. Many other members held coffee mornings and sales in their homes, especially before Christmas, while at Dovedale a stalwart band continue to man the sales caravan in all weathers. The caravan itself was refurbished this year by Norman and Alan Burton who also made new tables for it.

Other funds have come from a variety of sources. A sponsored Plant Hunt round the county and related individual efforts raised over £700 while the 50/50 Club, organised by Dennis Bennett, donated nearly £650 at the end of its first year and continues to expand. We are also most grateful for a bequest of £2,000 from the estate of Cliff Carpton, while the families of Ken Pegg and Gordon Burd kindly requested that donations should be made to the Trust in lieu of flowers; we send our sympathies to these families and to the families of other members who died during the year.

### The Future

The past year is one in which the Trust, in addition to its public face, has put in a lot of work on its internal reorganisation and in planning for the Appeal which will commence in the spring of 1987. The first results of this work are now becoming apparent. Following the change in name of the Trust we have introduced a new

badger logo, reflecting the Trust's work for this animal, one of the best known wild animals in Britain. We also have in this issue a new look for the newsletter and a campaign, including a free competition, to promote our new name. These activities will lead on to the launch of the Appeal now being organised by Ian Carstairs, the Appeal Director and Dennis Bennett, the Appeal Chairman. The coming months will be an increasing challenge to the Trust and its members to successfully organise and run this major fund-raising event; it can only be done through many people giving some time to this work — we look forward to your help.
