TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2003.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Law applicable to charitable companies in England and Wales requires the Trustees, who are also directors of the company, to prepare financial statements for each year that give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year.

In preparing financial statements giving a true and fair view, the Trustees should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the relevant legislation. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

CONSTITUTION

The company was incorporated on 11 February 2000 and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The company is a registered charity and is affiliated to Emmaus UK.

OBJECTIVES

The principal objective of the company is to provide accommodation and employment for homeless people in accordance with the principles of the Emmaus movement.

REVIEW OF DEVELOPMENT, ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

The year under review began shortly after the official opening of the community at Carlton in May 2002. During this period a great deal of progress has been made. There is now a vibrant community of Companions and fully operational business working to support the community.

The growth in Companion numbers has been carefully managed to try and ensure that there is stability within the community. The site currently provides a home for twelve Companions and is poised for the next stage of development. A major building project is about to commence which will create accommodation for up to seventeen companions. This has been made possible thanks to the generous support of the **National Lottery Charities Board (Community Fund)** which has awarded us a grant of £298,000 after the year under review.

This will be an important step in allowing us to move towards our goal of housing up to 30 companions on site.

During the last financial year we have continued to invest in the renovation of parts of the site. We have been very fortunate in receiving significant support from grant-making bodies (the major grants are listed in the notes to the financial statements) and we would like to express our very sincere thanks to those involved in providing this financial support. We would also like to thank the many individuals whose generous donations have helped us in the period whilst we work towards becoming self-supporting.

A very significant success achieved during the year has been the strong growth of the business within the community. Both the sales of donated goods (including scrap) and the bistro sales have proved to be extremely successful in their first full year of operation. During the year sales amounted to £111,300 and since the year-end they have continued to grow. We are now very close to becoming fully self-supporting (in revenue terms). This has been thanks to a great deal of hard work and enthusiasm on the part of the Companions, the staff and volunteers. We would like to express our thanks to everyone whose efforts have achieved this tremendous success.

For a significant part of the year the Community operated without a paid Community Leader. Following the resignation of Cameron Thomson (the previous leader) for health reasons, there was a gap before the new joint Leaders, Maureen and Alan Barrett were able to join the community. We were very fortunate that the community and business were kept running smoothly through the services of highly dedicated volunteers: Anthony Woodhouse (Trustee) with help from George Hartigan (Trustee), John Creasey (consultant and volunteer) and others. Through their determination and hard work the project not only survived but flourished.

RISK ASSESSMENT

Risks

In accordance with the guidelines in the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) the directors have considered the major risks affecting the company and have taken steps to mitigate these as far as possible.

The major areas of risk are currently considered to be the financial stability of the company and the area of Health and Safety within the community and business.

Reserves

The directors have attempted to safeguard the financial status of the charity by maintaining sufficient general reserves to subsidise the budgeted financial deficit for a period of at least six months. It was felt that this approach was prudent and appropriate in the early stage of operations while various income streams are built up within the business. Various financial controls and regular financial reporting procedures have been put in place.

The directors have undertaken a risk assessment of health and safety procedures within the community and workplace. This will remain an ongoing procedure for the company.

Investment policy

The current policy is to invest funds in high interest bank accounts to ensure a low risk return. This investment policy is at the Directors' and Trustees' discretion.

AUDITORS

Mercer & Hole who were appointed auditors in the year in place of Edward Bellamy & Co , have expressed their willingness to continue to act as Auditors and will be reappointed at the Company's AGM.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF EMMAUS TURVEY LIMITED

We have audited the financial statements on pages 8 to 15 for the year ended 30 June 2003 which have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on page 11.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent by law, we do not accept responsibility to anyone other than the company's members as a body, for audit work, for this report, or for the opinions that we have formed.

Respective Responsibilities of Directors and Auditors

As described on page 3, the company's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

It is our responsibility to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the directors' report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding directors' remuneration and transactions with the company is not disclosed.

We read the Directors' Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

Basis of Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 30 June 2003

1. Accounting Policies

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2000), and applicable accounting standards. The accounts are prepared on an accruals basis.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds comprise accumulated surpluses and deficits on general funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees of Emmaus Turvey Limited in furtherance of the general charitable objectives. Designated funds are unrestricted funds that the Trustees have designated or allocated for identifiable future expenditure. Restricted funds are amounts for specific purposes as defined by the donor.

Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are recognised at the point of receipt of monies.

Resources Expended

Those costs which are attributable to different functions of the charity are allocated as such. Where costs relate to more than one function of the charity, the Trustees do not consider it appropriate to allocate individual costs at the point where the cost is incurred. Alternatively the Trustees apportion aggregated costs in proportions which they consider to be a fair estimate of their functional split.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives using the following rates:

-Equipment, Motor Vehicles - 50% straight line

Accounting for VAT

During the year agreement was reached with HM Customs and Excise regarding the treatment of Housing Benefit. It was agreed that this should be treated as Exempt income. The company's VAT year end is currently 31st May. Because it is necessary to perform an end year adjustment (related to the VAT partial exemption rules) it is not yet known what VAT will ultimately be reclaimable for the month of June 2003. Hence the directors have not deducted any VAT from costs incurred during this month. They have, however, accounted for VAT due to Customs on sales during the month.

4. Intangible Income (Loaned asset)

The charity has been given the use of a van by one of its Trustees, George Hartigan. The cash equivalent value of this loan was estimated to be in the region of £300 per annum during the year under review. This item is matched by an equivalent sum ("Transport Costs") in the Statements under Resources Expended. (Policy in accordance with Para. 99, Charity SORP 2000).

6.Repairs and Maintenance

A sum of £35462 is shown as expenditure on repairs and maintenance during the year. This has been spent on the renovation of parts of the site at Carlton which were acquired in a state of dilapidation. The directors have decided not to capitalise any of this expenditure on the basis that this work entailed improvements to existing structures rather than constructing new buildings. Under the terms of the lease Emmaus Turvey will have no share in any potential uplift in value to the property which may arise as a result of this work.

At the start of the period, the Company had four employees. Over the year the number of employees expanded to four full-time and one part-time employee. The roles filled at the year end were Joint Community Leaders (2 people), Retail Supervisor, Workshop Supervisor and Site Maintenance.

8. Management and Administrative Costs.

- -Employment represents 20% of the cost of employing community leaders plus 100% of the cost of recruitment and training of staff.
- -Professional fees include 80% of the fees paid to the consultant architect and project development manager, John Creasey (see note 11). Other fees expended include those related to VAT advice and Accountants fees for the annual Audit.
 - Included within the insurance cost under the heading "premises" is a sum of £1,066 relating to Trustee Indemnity Insurance.

9. Remuneration to Trustees for Services

No Trustee of Emmaus Turvey Limited received remuneration or reimbursed expenses from the company for their services during the period.

One former Trustee, John Creasey, was employed on a consultancy basis as architect and project development manager. He has also played an important role in fundraising for the project. His remuneration amounted to £18,296 during the year and this has been apportioned between "management and administration" (80%) and "cost of generating funds" (20%).

10. Prior year VAT received

Included in Resources Expended is a sum of £9751 relating to VAT reclaimed from H.M Customs on prior year costs. This was not accounted for in the previous year due to negotiations with H.M Customs which meant that the amount could not previously be quantified. In effect the current year's expenditure was actually £9751 higher than stated. The VAT received has been apportioned across the relevant expenditure categories.

11. Debtors.

This amount reflects VAT due to the company from HM Customs and Excise following agreement reached after protracted negotiations. It excludes any VAT reclaim on expenditure for the month of June 2003 as this has not yet been agreed with Customs.

The Company has a 50 year lease on the site at Carlton with a rental of £1 per annum. On the basis that the terms of the lease do not transfer ownership of the site to Emmaus Turvey Limited it was decided not to capitalise this property.

- The **Building and Development Funds** represent grants to fund the renovation and development of the site at Carlton. During the year Emmaus Turvey received a second grant of £25000 from the Sylvia Adams Trust . In the previous year grants were received from Emmaus UK, Help the Homeless and Sylvia Adams.
- The **Vehicle Fund** was a donation from Miracles in order to help purchase a van. The expenditure recorded above represents the final year of depreciation on the vehicle.
- **-IT Fund and Garden Development Fund** were grants from one anonymous Trust to facilitate the development of the IT training facilities at Carlton and the development of the gardens on site.

15. Designated Funds

During the year the Company received a grant of £30,000 from an anonymous Trust. This has been included within the unrestricted funds as a designated fund, set aside for the purchase of a van and for specific building works.
