

THE DEVELOPMENT WORKERS' REPORT

Kennet Rural Development Agency - an Investor in People



We are extremely pleased that we achieved the I I P Award early in the year. We would like to share with you three paragraphs from the Assessor's Report: -

"The Kennet Rural Development Agency has some excellent policies and procedures for developing their staff which reflect the profession that they are in and show to the world at large they practice what they preach. The enthusiasm and involvement of the management committee provides external support and encouragement to staff and could be considered a model for other organisations with charity status to emulate.

Finally, all the staff interviewed showed a commitment to their job and to providing a quality service to the community which, combined with the encouragement from the top, allowed them to develop and enhance their professionalisms.

The Assessor has no hesitation in recommending that the Kennet Rural Development Agency be recognised by Wiltshire TEC Recognition Panel as an Investor in People.'

WORK IN THE COMMUNITY

♦ We continue to have to work flexibly and manage change as can be seen within our **Locality Planning** work. We have begun to develop a process to support local voluntary groups to be fully involved in the planning of services within Kennet. Kennet Rural Development Agency acts as a disseminator of relevant information and co-ordinates regular meetings of voluntary groups to discuss key issues.

- ♦ Similarly, we were pleased to be invited to work with Kennet District Council in their new initiative of consultation around Kennet's Local Plan. We would hope this will become an involving and positive experience that will benefit all sections within the Kennet community.
- ♦ We have already started to become involved in the initial development of **Primary Care**Groups and their relationship with their local communities. We need to keep in the forefront of this development the role the voluntary sector groups will play in delivering services.
- ♦ We actively promote our **Directory of Voluntary Organisations** to build awareness and understanding of the sector.

NEW DEVELOPMENTS

- ♦ We are extremely happy to welcome Janice James and Georgina Morgan as new team members at Kennet Rural Development Agency in the capacity of joint Volunteer Outreach Bureau workers. We are sure they are becoming a recognisable duo in the villages of Kennet.
- ★ Kennet Rural Development Agency has been involved in supporting the development of a Wiggly Bus. This is an innovative answer to rural transport problems that are ever with us. The Wiggly Bus will be seen around the lanes of Pewsey Vale, hopefully from the Autumn, as a three year piloted scheme.
- ♦ Kennet Rural Development Agency is currently working with the Rural Activities Network (R A N) and Parent Carers to conduct a feasibility study, paid for through the National Lottery small grants scheme. The study will look into Leisure (respite) Facilities for Children with Special Needs. We would hope to progress the study's findings into additional services during the coming year.
- ★ Kennet Rural Development Agency have become partners in a County-wide Consortium Bid to the Lottery to enhance the training provided to the Voluntary Sector, resulting in the creation of Learning Curve. This will provide substantial range and tailor made training opportunities for Voluntary Organisations in better management, volunteering and accredited courses. Kennet Rural Development Agency is the local delivery point for Learning Curve.
- ♦ Kennet Rural Development Agency continues to provide **training and support** to local Voluntary Organisations based on their identified needs. We continue to receive encouraging feedback: -

TIDWORTH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

There has been a community development project in Tidworth for 5 years now, although the current funding from Single Regeneration Budget is in its second year. Whilst there have been many changes in faces over that time, the underlying problems of the community have remained the same - a constantly changing service population of young families, very few amenities, and always the promise of developments to come. It now seems that finally the "developments" are going to happen - a leisure and community centre, improvements to the Station Road area, a new supermarket, more refurbishment of service accommodation, refurbishment of other sports facilities, and in the longer term a new primary care centre - Tidworth may seem like one large building site! - Interesting times!

At grass roots level, the work Hilary and Brian (the CDW's) have been doing to encourage local groups to respond to needs has been substantial. With the available budget, 17 projects were started in the first year, ranging from setting up a gym club, supporting counselling at Castledown School & the Ashdown Family Centre, supporting local voluntary groups such as CAB and the uniformed organisations, funding youth theatre projects, and youth development projects via the Youth Service. There are four broad areas of activity - youth development, crime prevention, community safety and support to local groups.


In addition the Project has a role to provide information - 'Where in Tidworth' leaflets, Holiday Activities information etc., to organise the Tidworth Community Challenge (an annual event where groups undertake an activity for the benefit of local community - there are trophies for the best adult challenge, under 16's challenge, best military unit and the best overall) and to work with the Garrison providing copy for the monthly newsletter "Drumbeat".

The Project also organises a quarterly Tidworth Exchange - an opportunity for those working in any agency locally to meet and network and the Residents Forum - to encourage the flow of information about the project's work and developments in Tidworth and consult with residents.

Kennet Volunteer Outreach Bureau First Annual Report

In the beginning there were Janice and Georgina (Volunteer Outreach Workers) venturing out into the wilds of Kennet. Funded by the National Lottery after requests by Voluntary Organisations for support in their work with volunteers. After an initial few months of exploring and getting to know the area, a Work Plan was devised, based on two main aims:



- To promote and develop volunteering opportunities in the rural district of Kennet.
- To support and train voluntary organisations in providing Good
 Practice in volunteering recruitment, support and development.

And so several initiatives began...



Journal's for Volunteering Opportunities suddenly appeared in a Library near you. A simple A4 Folder supplied for organisations to "advertise" their volunteering opportunities free of charge. The loose leaf Journal means that organisations can add and update entries at any time. Kennet Libraries were very supportive of this scheme and a Journal is now in Devizes, Marlborough L.I.P., the Mobile Library, Pewsey, Ludgershall and the Tempo Office in Tidworth.

Volunteering - The Way Forward 1st June 1998 - A Conference for Voluntary Organisations and Volunteers went ahead during Volunteers Week. Hosted in Devizes Corn Exchange a full day of fun, information and sharing of experiences pulled together organisations from all corners of Kennet. There was an encouraging attendance level, and evaluation showed that the conference was valuable.



"Bite Size" Lunches - Following feedback from the Conference, regular 'get-together" lunches were planned. The beginning of September heralded the first of these lunches in both Devizes and Marlborough. We are now in the process of putting together a programme of short, sharp training in Good Practice around the needs of local organisations.

Volunteers Week - Jubilee Teas As part of Volunteers Week, we supported various organisations in the Marlborough area for a Saturday afternoon in the Jubilee Centre. Organisations put up displays and gave free teas and cake to anyone showing an interest in volunteering. We were posted outside giving away balloons and enticing people to enter the world of volunteering.



Consultancy - Ongoing work is in progress with individual organisations around developing a volunteer policy, guide to good practice, working and dealing with volunteers. At present work has begun with 3 individual groups.

We are also in the process of developing several schemes that will raise the profile of volunteering throughout Kennet; this in turn should result in more people wanting to take up volunteering opportunities.

Village Information Volunteers - We are attempting to recruit a volunteer from each village who will be part of a network of people publicising responsible for volunteering opportunities within their village, by pinning up posters etc. This will enable organisations to advertise their need for volunteers in specific areas, or ensure that information about their opportunities is carried to the four corners of Kennet.

So in the few short months since February when we started, we have not been idle and are enjoying the challenge of developing volunteering opportunities in the rural district of Kennet.






Young Carers are children or young people (aged 5-25) who take responsibility for the care of another person. This is usually a parent, grandparent or sibling who has a disability, suffers from a serious illness, a mental health problem or misuses drugs/alcohol. Wiltshire Young Carers Project was set up in August 1996 as a three year development project, managed by Kennet Rural Development Agency. The project's aims are to:

- ◆ raise awareness: Young Carers have worked together locally to design a postcard and poster to publicise the project. The target group is their peers, families and/or friends. The postcards and posters are being widely distributed to schools, health centres and other community venues and organisations. A curriculum pack, developed nationally is also being made available to schools introducing young carers issues into the Personal, Social and Health Education syllabus (PSHE). The projects' display boards are available for loan and the development worker regularly attends staff meetings and training events.
- ◆ influence Planning and Policy: Young Carers are formally recognised in Wiltshire and Swindon's Children's Services and Community Care Plans. This demonstrates the commitment of the Social Services and Education Departments and Wiltshire Health Authority to Young Carers. During the final phase of the project Young Carers will be leading on the development of a Young Carers Policy and Strategy to ensure that they receive ongoing, sustainable recognition and support.
- identify Young Carers and develop support networks: The project is now in contact with well over 100 young carers, all of whom receive regular national and local newsletters, written by and for young carers. Other information written for children and young people about illnesses, local services etc.. is also available. Young Carers often express a desire to meet up with other children and young people who are in similar situations; particularly as they may feel very lonely and isolated. Partnerships have been developed with the Youth and Community Service both in Swindon and Wiltshire to offer young carers the chance to meet up at regular groups. The added commitment of the project's volunteers and corporate support from Allied Dunbar has ensured that young carers have also met up during 1997/8 at; barbecues, picnics, nature trails, a weekend in Dartmoor, a magical mystery tour, activities such as ice skating, bowling, raft building, archery, kite making etc.. all of which have offered much needed time out and more importantly FUN!

The Directors/Trustees submit their report and the accounts for the year ended 31st March 1998.

Responsibilities of the Directors/Trustees

Company law requires the directors/trustees to prepare accounts that give a true and fair view of the state of the charity and of its income and expenditure for the financial year. In doing so the directors/trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The directors/trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Principal Activities

The Charity exists to provide support for local people and organisations in developing and maintaining services in response to need. A review of the activities is given in the appended reports.

Results

The deficit for the year amounted to £1,769 (1997: surplus £9,407) as per the Statement of Financial Activities. The surplus carried forward of £7,638 represents approximately one month's expenditure and we therefore do not regard this as excessive.

Independent Examiners

A resolution will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting to re-appoint David Owen and Co as Independent Examiners to the charity for the ensuing year.

EXAMINER'S REPORT

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Kennet Rural Development Agency

We report on the accounts of Kennet Rural Development Agency for the year ended 31st March 1998 which are set out on pages 3-9.

As the Charity's Trustees, you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts: you consider that the audit requirement of Section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993 does not apply.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and follow the recommendations in Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) Accounting for Charities.

Revenue grants are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are received. When the grant has to be matched to a different period the deferred element is deducted from income and carried forward in liabilities.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific projects as laid down by the doner. Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.

Staff costs and overhead expenses are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities.

Depreciation is provided using the following rates and bases to reduce by annual instalments the costs, less estimated residual value, of the tangible assets over their estimated useful lives:-

Computer Equipment

25% straight line

Fixtures and Fittings

25% straight line

Management and administrative costs are the costs of complying with statutory requirements, such as Examiner's fees.

2. DIRECT CHARITABLE EXPENDITURE

The Tidworth Project was set up in 1993 to help develop the concept of primary care within the Tidworth practice by encouraging a link between the practice, the community, service providers and users. The project came to an end in March 1997 however final costs were not processed until April 1998.

The Tidworth Regeneration Bid was set up in 1997 in partnership with Wiltshire Council and Kennet District Council to help set up and fund projects to improve community life in Tidworth.

The Young Carers Project was set up in July 1996 to raise awareness about Young Carers, to identify Young Carers and link them with support networks and influence planning and policy to take account of their needs and wishes.

The Training Forum was originally established in response to the 1990 Community Care Act to facilitate consultation and the dissemination of information for voluntary organisations in Kennet.

The Volunteer Outreach Bureau was set up in February 1998 to promote volunteer opportunities and encourage Good Practice in volunteering within voluntary organisations.

The Wiltshire Carer Network aims to promote and raise awareness of carer issues within the field of community care. It acts as a body for policy and planning accountable to and led by local carers
