Report of the Brigade Council for the year ended 31st August 2002

The Council presents its report of the affairs of the Company together with the financial statements and honorary auditors' report for the year ended 31 August 2002.

Principal activity review

During the year under review there were approximately 4,500 young people between 8 and 19 years of age in membership or associated with the organisation. The Brigade works with young people in London, Birmingham, Cardiff, Delamere Forest, Glasgow, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Nottingham and Southend, together with its Outreach-Kiruv Project operated through schools, clubs and other bodies throughout the country. The Hand-in-Hand project continued with the grant from the Community Fund (formerly the National Lottery Charities Board) to encourage young people to engage in voluntary service to the community. Activities included summer, winter and spring camps, Israel Tour, weekend camps, leadership training and outdoor pursuits, sports, music, first aid and life saving and community work. Other activities included the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, (in which the JLGB is the only Jewish Operating Authority), and the Challenge Award For Jewish Youth. The Brigade works closely with many agencies including Makor/AJY, Norwood-Ravenswood, Jewish Care. It is a member of the National Council of Voluntary Organisations, the National Youth Agency, the National Council for Voluntary Youth Services and the Central Council for Physical Recreation.

Results

The statement of financial activities showed net outgoing resources of £43,145, of which £18,459 is covered by the unspent Centenary Fund Grant brought forward from the previous year.

Fixed assets

The changes in fixed assets during the year are summarised in the notes to the accounts.

Directors

Members of the Brigade Council are as shown on page 1.

Directors' responsibilities for preparation of the financial statements

Directors are required by the Companies Act 1985 to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the company as at the end of the financial year and of the deficit of the company for that year. The directors are also required to maintain adequate accounting records.

In addition, the directors are responsible for taking reasonable steps to safeguard the company's assets and to prevent or detect fraud or other irregularities.

Suitable accounting policies have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements and have been supported by prudent estimates and judgements. Applicable accounting standards have been followed.

Risk Factors

The Directors are forming a committee to undertake a full risk assessment of the company's and the charity's operations and the risks to which the charity is exposed. This committee will make recommendations where necessary to enhance systems and procedures to mitigate those risks and the recommendations will be implemented.

Stated Reserves Policy

The trustees have reviewed the charity's need for reserves in line with the guidance issued by the Charity Commission and have set aside or designated £100,000 to meet commitments on co-financed projects and £35,000 to safeguard the charity's service commitment in the event of delays in receipt of grants. The balance of the funds amounting to £90,000 approximates to three months running costs. The Council believe that reserves should be at this level to ensure the charity can run efficiently and meet its needs.

Honorary Auditors

Gerald Edelman have expressed their willingness to continue in office and a resolution to re-appoint them will be proposed at the annual general meeting.

Report of the Honorary Auditors to the Brigade Council

Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board.
