Basis of the preparation of the accounts

JAMAICA 2000 Trustees Report 2012 - 2013:

We started the year with high hopes at our new base in Birmingham at Hagley House, with a programme of activities, linked with Starlight Enterprises, with joint accreditation around the development of work around the specialist and consultancy services to support schools in UK with BME families and young people to develop personal capacity in relation to social mobility through training in employment skills, personal development, cultural diversity awareness and emotional intelligence

In addition our main activities have been around continuing to pilot and develop "Widening Horizons" school partnerships between Jamaica and UK, working with DfID and British Council and Jamaican Ministry of Education Regions, supported by Learning Links International We made this our Jamaica 50th Anniversary project, as well as supporting and attending a range of celebration activities.

Progress was made with Wolverhampton / Hanover (Region 4) links with a very successful visit to Jamaica in February 2012 with the Head Teacher of Uplands Junior School, Mrs Leslie Ward, to their partner school in Cacoon, Hanover. A return visit was made by Principal, Mrs Carole Grant, to Wolverhampton when she visited a number of schools and met representatives of Jamaica 2000 at our AGM during her visit. This visit was followed on by a joint project led by Yasus Afari, with both schools to create a jointly written poetry book called "Building a Bridge of Friendship" which was endorsed by the Jamaican High Commissioner. Staff from two of the Wolverhampton / Kingston (Region 1) links, also received teachers from their link schools in Kingston, and then teachers from Wolverhampton visited their link schools in Kingston

In March 2012 a delegation from Birmingham, including Liz Millman, were hosted by the Region 5 Team in Mandeville and generated a lot of interest in links to be developed as part of our Jamaica 50th Anniversary focus, and in establishing a legacy for Birmingham in recognition of hosting the Olympic Athletes at their pre-Olympics Training Camp

However at the height of the jubilations about the Jamaican athlete's outstanding Olympic achievements and the wonderful celebrations of the Jamaica 50th Anniversary, we were devastated to hear that Jamaican schools links with UK schools were no longer to be eligible for British Council funding. This really pulled the rug out from under our feet, and we devised "Plan A" which was to continue to link schools, but seek sponsorship or funding elsewhere. We did not manage to get anyone to provide sponsorship or funds, so as "Plan B" St Thomas Primary School in Birmingham funded their exchange with McIntosh Memorial Primary School in Mandeville, but no other schools were able to find funding in a similar way. The lack of support by the British Council for Jamaican School links with the UK was seen as a real blow by the Jamaican Ministry of Education, who took over the sensitive discussions required, which eventually resulted in the re-instatement of funding support

Towards the end of the year, we lost the opportunity to use the premises at Hagley House and at the same time it was agreed that Jamaica 2000 would pass over to Learning Links international the work to develop the "Rastafari Heritage" project. This decision proved to

be appropriate and Learning Links International has been able to support "Rastafari Heritage" to become the organisation to lead the introduction of Rastafari in the portfolio of support for faiths through the Prison chaplaincies in England and Wales During the year Rastafari Heritage team also developed links with Fairfield House where Haile Selassie stayed during his time in UK, and the team are now represented on the working group looking to develop the facilities there. Jamaica 2000 still maintains an active interest in these developments.

Jamaican professionals and creative artistes, including Yasus Afari, continued to support Jamaica 2000 with a range of developments including the promotion of school workshops on Jamaica with poetry, language and culture Jamaica 2000 was able to raise the profile of our activities again through supporting Yasus Afari's "Pomedy Show" tour for a second year

Unfortunately our plans to appoint a Treasurer during the year did not work out and our fundraising activities were not very focussed. However we have continued to work successfully acknowledging the close links we have established with other organizations, especially schools. This has enabled us to cover any overheads involved and supported our activities, resulting in us achieving far more than could be anticipated. We are also grateful for the expenses that individuals bear when carrying out activities which link with our aims.

We were successful in gaining funding that covered the costs of the Local Authority exchange of delegations between Birmingham and Mandeville

Thanks go to our Executive Secretary, Liz Millman, who stepped in again to keep the books, as well as continuing to be the driving force in maintaining our focus on education links, Jamaican language and heritage research, and also for providing admin and management support from her Community Interest Company "Learning Links International".
