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### TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

#### **Objectives and activities**

The Charity's purpose is to provide families with young children, wide ranging practical and emotional support, to enable those children to have the best possible start in life.

Full details of the activities undertaken by the Charity in the year are presented in the following pages.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

#### Structure, governance and management

Home Start Surrey Heath ("the Charity") is a registered charity and private company which is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales.

The Charity is part of the UK federation of local Home-Start charities. As such It is obliged to follow the Home-Start Handbook (a guide to responsibilities, standards and practice), alongside the Home-Start Agreement and Home-Start Quality Standards.

The Charity's Trustees are elected by its members or may be co-opted by other Trustees, such appointments being subject to re-election at the next Annual General Meeting..

None of the trustees have any beneficial interest in the company.

The Trustees as charity trustees have control of the Charity and its property and funds.

Each Trustee is a Director of the Company and is also required to be a Member of the Charity, and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

Membership is open to any person who is interested in furthering the objects of the Charity and is approved by the Trustees.

Trustee Board meetings are held every two months with the Charity's Manager in attendance.

The charity has four part-time employees including the Manager.

The Manager has responsibility for the day-to-day running of the Charity.

#### **About Us**

**Founded in 1989, Home-Start Surrey Heath** is an independent charity that provides support to families in our community. We are affiliated to Home-Start UK, the country's leading family support charity and are one of eight local Home-Starts under the umbrella of Home-Start Surrey.



Being a parent has never been easy, it can be lonely, heartbreaking and overwhelming. Our unique core work is recruiting and training volunteers to visit families at home. Families, who have at least one child under 5, are offered compassionate, friendly and confidential, practical and emotional support. Our volunteers work alongside parents, in their own homes, to help them cope with the stresses and strains of family life and make sure they have the skills, confidence and strength they need to nurture their children.

We also provide two groups - a Pram Walk & Talk on a Thursday at Frimley Lodge Park and a Best Start in Life Group every Tuesday at High Cross Church, to support play, parenting, early learning and well-being.

We support families through their toughest times. Parents may be struggling with the demands of parenting for any number of reasons including mental and/or physical health problems, social isolation, domestic violence, financial woes, children with special educational needs and disabilities – a whole range of reasons that parents are facing.

To help give children the best possible start in life, Home-Start supports parents as they grow in confidence, strengthen their relationships with their children and widen their links with the local community.

#### Why it matters 00000000000

There is considerable evidence to support early years intervention. The years between birth and school are vital for a child's development. Being a parent for the first time is a daunting experience, exacerbated when other factors and multiple disadvantages are present e.g. English is not the first language, a bereavement, terminal illness, relationship breakdown, new baby, a refugee or awaiting asylum. Covid 19 and the cost of living crisis has brought additional fears and challenges to job security and family finances. Facing these issues alone can lead to long term problems and affect the life chances children have.

Early help aims to support families to avoid longer term difficulties. Home-Start staff and volunteers work alongside parents to build their trust and confidence. They encourage families to access services that help them to cope with the stresses and strains of life. Parents, staff and volunteers often develop a deep and trusting relationship which can lead to powerful changes.

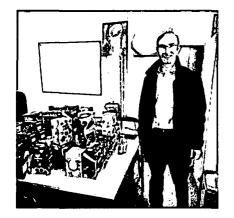

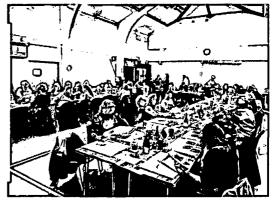

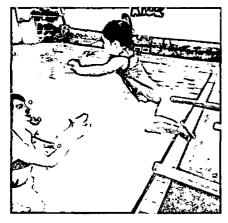

#### Feedback from a Mum:

"Home Start and particularly the BSIL group helped menavigate the outside world with my daughter after the crazy events of the COVID lockdown. I was totally overwhelmed by the thought of going out and finding places for my daughter and I to so dallse. We had tried a few groups but they didn't suit us. The outside world was quite new to my little one and so she found busy, not sy places challenging.

We tried the BSIL group and felt comfortable and welcome from the moment we walked through the door. We were welcomed, given a cup of tea and offered a space to seek help should we need it. Sometimes it really is that simple. My daughter left my side for the first time and played. It makes meemotional to think back because although I didn't know what we needed, it turns out it was kindness and someone to take an interest and that's what BSIL gave us."

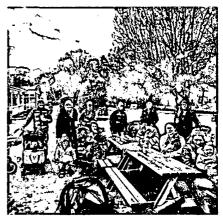

#### PRAM WALK & TALK

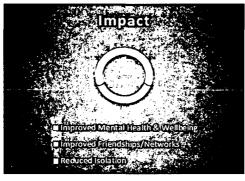

I am very pleased to be reporting to you on another successful year for Home-Start Surrey Heath, my first in the role of Chair of the Board. My thanks must go to Ros McGibbon, who stood down as Chair at our AGM in November 2022, and who has

stayed on the Board as a trustee, giving us continuity.

We have had a number of other changes to our Board, and our thanks to Shantha Thiruchelvam, Olive Proudfoot, Rachel Scarborough and Yvonne-Buluma Samba, who have left during the year. Welcomes, therefore, to Allan Crockhart, Barry Clutton, Andrew Mint and Omair Nazimi, who have joined the Board, and whose contributions will add to our sturdy governance, and to the support to our staff and volunteers for the future. Let me reiterate my predecessor's thanks to those employees: Stephnie, Mel, Dorothy and Sam, plus our many volunteers. I understand the constraints on potential volunteers' time, your other caring and working responsibilities, and would still ask for more people to consider volunteering: without you, we would not be able to deliver our support for families.

I say it's been a successful year, and our services for families in Surrey Heath has continued uninterrupted by pandemic or cost-of-living crises. But, once again, it has been a difficult time, where we have struggled for funding, as noted in Barry Clutton, our Treasurer's, report: despite our income being higher than budgeted, we spent much more, including supporting our employees at this time of increased inflation and

costs. My special thanks have to go to Anne Reynolds and the fundraising Committee, whose efforts add to the great successes in funding achieved by our Manager, Stephnie.

Our income has been boosted by donations and contributions from many companies, organisations and individuals who clearly understand the value of our work; we are most grateful to all those who have financially aided us in large or small ways, to better aid those families and children who have made use of our services.

Home-Start Surrey Heath is part of the Surrey-wide consortium of eight local Home-Starts, as well an independent part of Home-Start UK: this gives us consistency in the quality of the support we offer, at the same time as ensuring what we do is relevant for local families. Of course, this also means we must raise our funds locally, and govern our organisation with local trustees – we're always looking for more of both.

I conclude with looking forward: personally, I've learned much about how our help impacts throughout the early years for young families, the great importance of that support, and about the constant search for stable 'core' funding for our charity that continues to stretch us, but I'm assured that for the foreseeable future, we should continue to thrive.

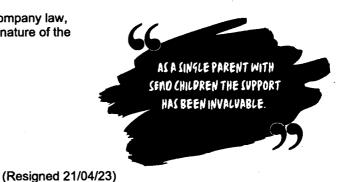

#### **MANAGER'S REPORT**

Home-Start is celebrating its 50<sup>th</sup> birthday this year since our founder Margaret Harrison set up the very first Home-Start in Leicester. Home-Start Surrey Heath is 34 this year – the oldest in Surrey. Unfortunately, 50 years down the line parents and children need our support more than ever. As we emerge from the pandemic and dive straight into the cost of living crisis, the world feels so difficult for families right now.

However, the external environment continues to be challenging for us as a charity too. Volunteer recruitment and retention continues to be difficult with more people caring for elderly parents, looking after their own grandchildren and both parents having to return to or work longer and not having the "luxury" of being able to afford time to volunteer. Like all charities, we find ourselves facing another tough year ahead.

Despite all of these difficulties, we have had another busy, successful year continuing to support families with our fantastic team of volunteers; ensuring sufficient funding to carry out our work; working in partnership with other local agencies and organisations to provide support to families; our amazing fundraising team holding fundraising activities to not just raise

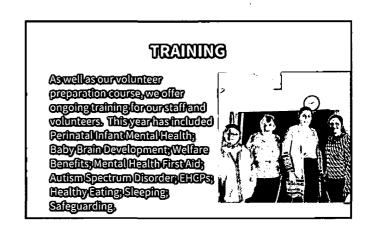
funds, but awareness and our profile too. We have also provided staff and volunteers with numerous training opportunities and recruited more trustees and volunteers.

#### Treasurer's Report Year Ending 31st March 2023

The year ending 31st March 2023 was one of mixed fortunes financially for HSSH. Successes in fundraising in the previous year meant that some awards intended to cover 22/23 costs were actually received before the 31st March 2022. In recognition of this, and so as to not hold excessive reserves through the following year end, the trustees set a lower target for income for the year ending 31st March 2023. Accordingly, the 22/23 budget was set to make a loss of £23,724. The actual outcome was a loss of £28,747.

Income for the year at £54,987 was £5,223 better than budget. However, expenditure, at £83,734, was also higher than budget, by £10,246.

Grant income continued to provide most of the income with the significant award from Surrey County Council, and other very welcome awards from The Community Foundation for Surrey, Home Start Surrey (St Faiths), Magdalen Hospital Trust and the Sir Jules Thorn Charitable Trust.

Significant donations were received from Mychett Ministries, The Camberley 41 Club and Pine Ridge Golf Club Ladies. Fund raising and community activities continued to be an important source of income with a number of events organised during the year including Paint & Sip, Bingo, Music with Mummy etc.

Very high, and continuing, levels of inflation have had a significant effect on expenditure during the year. These high levels were not foreseeable when the budget for the year was set.

Salaries and earnings-related expenses account for more than 70% of costs. Salaries were increased in July 2023 and backdated to the 1st April 2023, in accordance with agreed increases in NJC scale rates.

Reserves as at the 31st March 2023 were £69,536 compared with £98,283 at the start of the year.

The reserves at the year-end comprise of Unrestricted Reserves £44,713, Restricted Funds of £6,823 and the Staff Responsibility Fund of £18,000.

The higher level of reserves at the beginning of the year proved to be problematic when making applications for funding for 23/24 even though the reserves were already much lower. Hopefully the problem will have resolved with the publication of the results for 22/23.

For 23/24 HSSH plans to continue with its mission to provide care and support to families and to help to give children the best possible start in life.

Budgeted expenditure for 23/24 is £86,310.

The trustees are confident that the reserves as at the 31st March 23 are both reasonable and adequate to enable HSSH's operations to continue unchanged into 23/24. The budget has been set therefore to break even for the year. This means that funding of some £86,000 will need to be generated in the year.

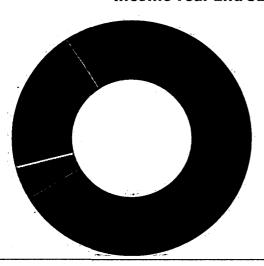
A very good start has been made in the first quarter of the new year, and the Trustees are confident that the budget for the year can be achieved.

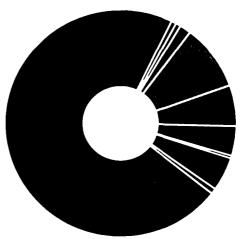

#### INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

#### TO THE TRUSTEES OF HOME-START SURREY HEATH

I report to the trustees on my examination of the financial statements of Home-Start Surrey Heath (the charity) for the year ended 31 March 2023.

#### Responsibilities and basis of report

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### **Charity information**

Home-Start Surrey Heath is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Unit 1, Stuart House, Plantation Row, Camberley, Surrey.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)". The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

#### 1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

#### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

#### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

#### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Computers

20% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

#### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

#### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

#### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

#### 1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

#### 1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

#### 1.12 Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after any discounts due.

#### 1.13 Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation arising from a past event that is likely to result in a transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are recognised after taking account of any discounts due.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

#### 2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

#### 19 Contingent Liability

The charity did participate in a multi-employer scheme which was a defined benefit scheme in the UK. It is not possible for the company to obtain sufficient information to enable it to account for the scheme as a defined benefit scheme.
