STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

LEGAL STATUS

Brouhaha International is a company limited by guarantee with chantable status — It does not have a share capital

ORGANISATION OF THE CHARITY

The chanty has a Board of Trustees who oversee the general management and control of the company. The board meets every eight weeks to discuss and oversee the chanty's financial, artistic and administrative activities. There are presently sub-committees for finance, personnel and equal opportunities which meet when necessary and report back to the other trustees.

The day to day operations management is carried out by the executive director assisted by a general manager, a marketing officer, a cultural development officer and a freelance finance manager. Additionally a carnival artistic director and a carnival development co-ordinator are employed for six months of each year.

The charity employs freelance workers as and when required for delivery of the activities which include Artists, Workshop leaders, full time and part time Production Staff, Technical Staff and Stewards.

Regular line management meetings (personal review and development) ensure effective communication throughout the organisation. Weekly team meetings give all relevant staff updated information and a chance to feedback from their personal perspective. Weekly management (keeping in touch) meetings ensure staff work plans are reviewed and assessed, it also enables the management team to develop a consistent approach and style to the chanty's work.

TRUSTEES

The names of the present trustees and of all who held office during the period, are shown on Page 1

In accordance with the Articles of Association, at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting, Paul Bennetts retires by rotation and being eligible offers himself for re-election. No remuneration was paid to any trustee for their services as a trustee, nor did any trustee have a material interest in any of the charity's contracts.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the chanty and of the net income or expenditure of the chanty for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Amounts are presented within items in the statement of financial activities and balance sheet, the trustees have had regard to the substance of the reported transaction or arrangement, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles or practice

In the case of each of the persons who are trustees at the time when the trustees' report is approved

• so far as the trustee is aware, there is no relevant audit information (information needed by the charity's auditors in connection with preparing their report) of which the charity's auditors are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that he or she ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make himself or herself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information

RISK ASSESSMENT

The chanty confirms that management and Board regularly review the major risks faced by the Chanty to ensure that procedures and controls established by the organisation are designed to mitigate those risks. The process includes management training in formal risk assessment. The risk of shortfalls of revenue funding and other income has been given serious consideration. Projects will only be undertaken if viable and the charity's major revenue funder, Arts Council of England North West, have confirmed funding to 31 March 2008.

INDUCTION AND TRAINING OF TRUSTEES

Trustees are selected based upon their professional skills to complement those of the existing trustees or replace those of retining trustees. Current trustees bring their skills and experience from a wide range of professions and employers including media, commercial business, the legal profession, higher education and youth work and local authorities. All are committed to and experienced in the arts and cultural sector. Induction involves attending trustees' meetings prior to appointment, meeting management and the trustees and receiving copies of policies, business plans and accounts. Training needs are continually assessed and implemented by facilitators as required.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

OBJECTIVES

In accordance with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the principal objects are

To promote, maintain, improve and advance public education, appreciation and understanding of the interregional and international cultural and artistic perspective particularly by the formulation, preparation, establishment and production of festivals, educational plays and productions

The principal activity of the charity is to promote cultural diversity through the arts in order to support the development of greater international understanding. Emphases remain access, new work and collaborations with other European countries, although worldwide collaborations continue to grow as an integral aspect of the charity's work.

POLITICAL AND CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS

Dunng the year there were no political or charitable contributions made by the charity

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

The charity aims to apply equal opportunities at all levels. The charity has developed a "Race Equality Action Plan". Brouhaha estimates that 50% of the charity's programme is minority ethnic led.

CONTRIBUTION OF VOLUNTEERS

The charty is supported by highly experienced and dedicated volunteer Board members Additionally Brouhaha International host European volunteers on an annual basis to gain skills and knowledge to run community celebrations and events.

REVIEW OF THE ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE OF THE CHARITY FOR THE YEAR

In 2005 Brouhaha International worked extensively within local, regional, national and international contexts.

At a local level the company developed and delivered arts events and participatory projects alongside black & minority ethnic groups, low income communities, play-schemes, youth groups, arts organisations, environmental groups, special needs organisations, older people's groups, regeneration agencies, the voluntary sector and educational establishments

The company also enabled many local artists and performance groups to access employment and international opportunities through arts exchanges and collaborative projects

At a regional and national level the company created personal and professional development opportunities for individuals and groups who participated within our arts projects and national touring programmes

Internationally Brouhaha has built a reputation for attracting companies from the Canbbean, Africa, Latin America, the Middle East, the Far East and Europe to our festival enabling local communities and a range of project user's access to international work

Brouhaha is respected locally, nationally and internationally as a company that promotes inclusion, develops capacity and above all produces quality work

The 2005 Brouhaha International Street Festival

Festival Calendar:-

Schools Latin Festival (17th - 20th July) International dance and music groups from Cuba, Panama, Costa Rica, Brazil and Uruguay performed and run workshops at secondary schools

Festival Opening Ceremony (22nd July) Philharmonic Concert Hall once again hosted our festival opening ceremony. This City Centre event brought together performers of all ages from across the world to produce a grand 'Opening Ceremony'.

Liverpool Camival (23rd July) This event saw 50 cultural, community and educational organisations develop camival masquerading groups. These costume sections developed

processional performance work with the support and assistance of international and local arts practitioners through our annual carnival arts outreach programme

The World in Princes Park (23rd July) Our camival parade led to Princes Park in Toxteth/Liverpool and saw a day long festival, which brought together a mix of local, national, and international performance work

International Outreach (25th - 30th July) In collaboration with Unity Theatre, Sefton Park Palm House and Valley Community Theatre the festival presented performance work by international companies

Community Tour 1 (25th – 29th July) Each day of the community tour saw companies travel to their hosts across Merseyside and present a programme of activities throughout the day. These will include workshops in the morning and performances in the afternoon/evening within a variety of community contexts.

Southport International Festival (30th – 31st July) Brouhaha International travelled to Southport where it presented two days of performances and events in partnership with the Southport Arts Centre and Sefton Council The two days included Street Arts work and international performances

Multicultural Children's Festival (2nd August) A day-long multicultural children's festival in St Georges Hall and at the Liverpool Museums and Gallenes, involving groups from across Merseyside Professional companies presented work for children and a range of workshops and presentations in street arts, circus skills, acrobatics and design. Children and young people also performed new work created through our outreach arts programme.

Liverpool Mela (5th August) This new one-day event to Liverpool saw a number of performances by South Asian companies and community groups from across the North West

'Closing Ceremony' (6th August) A team of artists from around the world worked with 250 international young performers to produce a performance at the Liverpool Philharmonic Concert Hall that closed the 2005 festival

This large-scale performance entitled 'Sea People' explored many global stones, histories and legacies. By creating a performance that reflected the past 500 years of Liverpool's (and its international partners) relationships to the sea, the project celebrated many diverse experiences from around the world.

In 2005 we brought companies to the festival from Africa, Europe, Latin America, Central America, the Far East, the Caribbean and the Middle East including

Outreach & Education Programme.

China

The outreach aspect of the festival saw International artists and local community groups work together on skills based workshops and subsequent public performances. This work included:

Zhejiang young Performers - Acrobats

Local Level: Carnival dance work A number of dancers worked within our larger carnival arts programme with all participating costume sections. These dancers developed choreography within each costume section

Carnival music workshops 'Beatlife was a percussive music project taking place in primary schools. Workshops involved over 200 children and young people. They formed a largescale percussion orchestra that played during the parade and in a number of city centre locations

'Camival Arts Young People's Mentoring Scheme Young performers shadowed and were mentored by professional dancers, musicians, costume makers and artists over a six-month period. This led to the development opportunities for young people in arts and cultural production

Carnival arts workshops. A number carnival making sessions were delivered in community contexts across Merseyside This enabled the development of existing and new costume sections. Professional local community artists prior to the main production of costume work. carned out this work

National level: Development of camival national touring programme that enabled Liverpool based artists, performers and community participants to present carnival work across the UK This work also enabled group from across the UK to be involved in out 2005 Liverpool event

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The financial year 2005/6 saw incoming resources of £525.895 (2005 £542,756) of which £92,675 has been carned forward as restricted revenue funds for future projects. This is the second year funds have been maintained at around £500k as opposed to £300k in previous vears This increase is due to

- A multi-agency approach to funding
- Switching to new resource suppliers
- Careful financial monitoring
- Trying to directly influence the resource providers (e.g. policy lobbying)
- Working with, rather than competing against, other organisations seeking similar resources

From total Incoming resources of £525,895, the outgoing resources were £463,023 (2005 £493,925) giving rise to excess income of £62,872 (£68,675 surplus on the restricted fund

and £5,803 excess expenditure on the unrestricted fund. The net incoming resources have been added to funds bought forward to give total funds at 31 March 2006 of £160,366 on the Balance Sheet (£92,675 Restricted Funds, £67,691 Unrestricted Funds). The chanty's sources of funds were 90% Funding by way of Service Agreements with Local Authorities, the Public Sector and Trusts and Foundations to deliver Festival Activity and large scale. Cultural events and 10% self generated earned income for goods and services related to Carnival Festival and Cultural events. The total outgoing resources from these sources of funds were £ 463,023 with 70% spent on direct Festival Arts and Cultural Costs, 21% spent on staff support costs being the permanent core staff , 8% spent on other core support costs and 1% spent on governance being the audit fee. The increase in funds will enable the chanty to further develop and deliver future strategy whilst creating a level of financial sustainability.

RESERVES POLICY

The level of free reserves at 31 March 2006 is £67,691 (2005 £73,494) The trustees have agreed a policy whereby the unrestricted general funds held by the charity should be a minimum of 3 to 6 months of core expenditure which equates to approximately £35,000 to £70,000 based upon the accounts to 31 March 2006. The trustees feel that this level of unrestricted funds will enable the charity to continue its current activities for a period of up to 6 months in the event of a significant drop in core funding during which time alternative funding can be pursued or activities curtailed. The charity's principal core revenue funder is the Arts Council of England North West and they have confirmed the charity's funding for the year to 31 March 2008.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Organisational Strategy

In the next four years Brouhaha international has the potential to develop through

- Re-examining its main purpose and vision
- Prioritising and focusing its direction
- Capacity building of its human resources through training and development
- Developing new and additional financial resources

With a four year time frame in mind the organisation will be consolidating its core activities which include its

- Camival Programme
- International Street Festival
- Arts Outreach Programmes
- International work

Capacity Building

Brouhaha International is involved with the 'Skills Work' programme. This European Social Fund programme allows cultural SME's to obtain 80% of the funding for any training activity it feels will be of benefit to its employees. As part of the key deliverables of the project the following tangible outputs are expected from the project – information technology, strategic planning, language skills training, camival arts training, management training, SAGE training and monitoring and evaluation skills.

Artistic

Brouhaha International will continue to use quality local, national and international culturally diverse performance companies, arts practitioners and performers who have track records in developing outstanding new work within their chosen fields

One of Brouhaha's main artistic aims over the next four years will be to continue to develop culturally diverse work in partnership with national and international companies and local community participants

AUDITORS

The Auditors, Harvey Guinan have indicated their willingness to remain in office and a resolution will be proposed for their re-appointment at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting in accordance with section 384 of the Companies Act 1985

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared where appropriate according to the principles contained in the statement of recommended practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued by the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales in 2005 and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

The charity has prepared accounts in accordance with the special provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 applicable to small companies and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities

TOTAL INCOMING RESOURCES

Total Incoming Resources as shown in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 9 represents the amounts earned and generated by the chanty during the year for services rendered excluding VAT as appropriate, including revenue and project grants received and receivable, sponsorship and donations, bank interest and other sundry income

DONATIONS AND GRANTS

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when receivable except as follows

- When donors specify that donations and grants given to the chanty must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods
- When donors impose conditions which must be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met

When donors specify that donations and grants are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to pre-conditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable

INTEREST RECEIVABLE

Interest is included when receivable by the chanty

TOTAL RESOURCES EXPENDED

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered. All amounts expended are considered to be in the furtherance of the chantable objectives of the chanty and are therefore considered to be direct chantable expenditure with the exception of audit costs shown as governance costs.

FIXED ASSETS
