#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 22nd March 2004 and registered as a charity on 27th May 2004. The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and the powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding.

The simplified criteria for being a member of MCP is a member has to be over the over the age of 18 years old and either live or work in the Mildmay ward of the London Borough of Islington, in the financial year 2006 - 2007 there were 347 registered members

#### Appointment of Trustees and Directors

The Directors of the Company are also Charity Trustees for the purpose of charity law, and under the company's articles are known as Members of the Management Group Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the Management Group shall comprise of not less than three and not more than fourteen members elected by and from the members at the Annual General Meeting, provided that if the company is receiving fifty percent or more of its core funding from the Local Authority the proportion Of Local Authority associated persons on the Management Group shall not exceed nineteen percent of the total number of the Management Group members. The Management Group can co-opt members of the company to fill casual vacancies on the management group provided the appointment comes to an end at the Annual general Meeting following cooption and provided that the total number of co-opted Management Group members does not exceed one-third of the Management Group

#### Risk Management

The Management Group have formulated a risk management strategy which is summarised as

To have sufficient reserves to all the company to manage its affairs for three months in the event that its core or revenue funding is withdrawn

To establish a sink fund to the costs of maintaining the Mayville Community Centre

Financial Control the management Group has recognised that as the company grows it needs to reduce the voluntary Treasurer's day to day management of the company's finances

#### Operation of the Company

The management group is responsible with the Chief Executive for the strategic vision of the organisation. The Management Group delegates the day to day management of the organisation to the Chief Executive.

#### Review of Activities

2006 - 2007 has been a busy year and the first full year of managing the Mayville Community Centre We are fortunate in Mildmay in that we have a lot of thriving local organisations and so many public-spirited people running them, even just listing them would fill up pages but I will mention a few. The Newington Green Action Group continues with Nicky Southin as Chair, very active. The Mildmay Pensioners Association with Chris Lucas as Chair remains popular with its regular meeting at the hospitable Mildmay Library and outings. The Factory Community Project is in the process of being refurbished and will re-open as a Children's Centre in the coming year. Sadly 2006-2007 was the last full year for Sure Start, a great resource for under fives and their parents, some of their activities will continue but we lose some wonderful people. We have several tenants' and Residents' Associations for most of the dozen or so estates, Hawthorne Close with Jessie White as Chair has raised funds for a new playground. Groundwork has done some very good work on estates for gardening. The Friends of King Henry's Walk Gardens have also been very successful in fundraising.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

#### Introduction

In the last year things have moved on well and we are extremely pleased to announce that the Mildmay Community Partnership have now taken ownership and all running responsibility of the Mayville Community Centre

Our founding Chief Executive, Trevor Mbatha, started work with us in February 2007 His immediate role will be to formulate the plans for the redevelopment of the Mayville Community Centre

This year has again seen Newington Green utilised for some fantastic events such as our St Patrick's Day fair, a celebration of St George's Day and the annual Summer Fair which had the regular brilliant variety of stalls, music and entertainers

It still gives me great pleasure (although still time consuming) to serve the Mildmay Community and I hope the board will continue to persevere with all the good work needed for us to continue in our success in the coming year

#### Mıldmay Crime Panel

This panel consists of up to 12 people representing a number of local organisations in Mildmay, mostly Tenants' Associations and the services like the Newington Green Action Group. It meets about every six weeks under the authority of Sergeant Graham Cushway and Police Constable Mel West who run the local neighbourhood Community Safety Team with a number of Community Support Officers.

A regular exchange of information takes place and it has been reported that there has been some success in reducing crime with some drug dens raided and arrests made. Graham and Mel have given three years to Mildmay and 2007 will see their transfer and retirement.

#### Access to Sports

During 2006 - 2007 the Mildmay Community Partnership commissioned the Access to Sport Project to deliver the Football4Estates project working on the 4 following estates inside the Mildmay ward Kerridge & Burder court, Mayville, Highbury & Hathersage court estates. During the year there have been 7 regular weekly Football sessions delivered as part of the project and this has engaged on a regular basis over 160 young people. In addition to football, activities included cricket, basketball, athletics and multi sport competitions. The key outcomes of the SAFE project are to utilise sport as a vehicle to combat anti-social behaviour and improve the quality of life for residents. In addition to projects above, Mildmay Community partnership supported the Access to Sports Project to develop a community led table tennis programme based at the Mayville Community Centre. The opportunity has been given to young people and adults to take part in table tennis with a view to establishing a community led club Mildmay Community Table Tennis club. The Mayville youth club have supported the development of a football team from the Mayville estate. Individuals from the project have been football level. I trained

#### Mayville Community Centre

The Factory groups were fully integrated within the Centre, we were able to identify our availability to get new groups - Karate, Pilates, Gentle Exercise and Table Tennis, in this sense, we have to mention Jenny Littlewood, who worked hard to get the Gentle Exercise and Table Tennis up and running Musically, we worked close with the Youth Club, running some successful workshops taking advantage of our previously underused music studio

Lithe Centre had to make an effort to adapt its old routines to come under MCP polices and procedures, and MCP had to get to know the Centre to accommodate it within its organization's structure. This is a slow but important task, as consolidating the grounds will allow us to grow. I and the centre staff acknowledge the support we have received and would like to thank in particular Jessie White and David Vandivier as Chair and Vice-Chair, (devoting their time and effort in a voluntary basis), Islington Council (especially Giles Rankin and Jugit Samara). Mayville Leaning Centre, The Factory, Islington Youth People's Services, Groundwork, Access to Sports, The Canonbury Youth Project, Sure Start, National Childbirth Trust and Kier Islington among others. In closing I extend my thanks to my staff Cathy Craig and Sam Singh, for their work, their support and loyalty

#### Golden Oldies

The Golden Oldies Senior Citizen and Disabled Person Support Group is a self run group that provides hot lunches and activities for older and disabled persons living in the area. All are invited to attend and will be warmly welcomed. We have regular outings, to the coast and places of historical interest. This year we went to a few places around England including Broadstairs.

#### Mayville Gardening Club

The Mayville Community Gardening Club has been busy during the past year. There were many workshops and fun days. There is usually a members meeting on the last Tuesday of the each month from 5-6 pm in the Community Centre. Workshops providing people with information on how to grow simple plants and to care for them. There were plenty of refreshments provided and the end product was free to take home. On fun days out we had picnics in the garden with face painting for younger children. These sessions are open to everyone, young or old, on the estate, it promotes a friendly atmosphere and a safe environment to make new friends and enjoy a day out. Many thanks to our sponsors and helpers.

SureStart and Festival

With Newington Green as Mildmay's principal open-air centre for activities, this committee with representatives from Mildmay Community Partnership, Newington Green Action Group and the Factory Community Project Supported by MCP and generously by Sure Start Mildmay and Canonbury East some splendid events have given much enjoyment to those attending Between three and four thousand at the Summer International Festival and many others at our St George's Day, St Patrick's Day and other faith events

The Factory at the Mayville

The Factory Community Project has been delivering a range of activities from the Mayville Community including, International Elderly Luncheon and Social Club, The Factory Adult Education Project, Mental Health Drop-in Group and Family Support

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

This was the first full year of MCP having responsibility of the Mayville Community Centre. The council has continued to grant-aid the centre, this year with a grand total of £130,000, however the future is not certain and Hall hire income may need to be increased. The centre has been home to the temporary 'homeless organisation' from the Factory. The centre looked after these diverse groups as well as continuing supporting the 'resident' groups such as the Golden Oldies and the over 50's There have been several successful applications for grants and these are ongoing, such as football, table tennis and there is money in the bank for these. The newsletter, distributed quarterly was financed by a Community Chest Grant. The modest grants to many of the groups in Mildmay for summer outings and for Christmas-tide events were much appreciated.

Fortunately, most of the many groups in Mildmay are self-running and largely self-financing but MCP is an active partner in the numerous diverse activities in Mildmay. The short-term is future is bright, the longer-term is more uncertain, but we can look back on this year with pride

Plans and Aspirations for 2007 - 2008

We have a simple objective for 2007 -2008 - the redevelopment of the Mayville Community Centre so that it is fit for purpose

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 1985

#### Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small

#### Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Management Committee for particular purposes
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

#### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is included when receivable
- Incoming resources from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. floor areas, per capita or estimated usage as set out in the notes to the accounts.

#### Fixed assets

Fixed assets (excluding investments) are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The costs of minor additions or those costing below £1,000 are not capitalised.

# 6. COSTS OF CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES BY FUND TYPE
