Since Itst April 2021 the organisation has been operating with only two Trustees, which is not in accordance with section 20.3 of the organisations constitution, which states "the number of directors shall not be less than 3".

The organization plans to rectify this with the appointment of a new Trustee at their next meeting.

I confirm that no other maters have come to my attention in connection with the examination giving me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect:

- 1. accounting records were not kept in respect of Packanoor Community Hall Association as required by section 386 of the 2006 Act; or
- 2. The accounts do not accord with those records; or
- 3. The accounts do not comply with the accounting requirements of section 396 of the 2006 Act other than any requirement that the accounts give a "true and has view" which is not a matter considered as part of an independent examination; we
- 4. The accounts have not been prepared in accordance with the methods and principles of the Statement of Recommended Practice for accounting and reporting by charities [applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of hisland (FRS 102)].

1 Charity status

The chanty is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 towards the assets of the charty in the event of liquidation.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of preparation

Packnioor Community Hall Association meets the definition of a public benefit emity under FR'S 102. Assets and limbilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective I Irimary 2019) (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material nuccertainties related to events or conditions that may east significant doubt on the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and gravis that provide cone funding or are of a general nature is recognized when the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Voluntary income including domnituus, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognized when the Charity has cutillement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be received with sufficient reliability:

Grants receivable

Grants are recognized when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and one yet to be met the income is recognized as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cunnot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central stuff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the particular fit is used. Other support costs are allocated based on the special of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's eximpliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including suidit, strategic management and trastees meetings and reinbursed expenses.

Government-grants

Government grants are recognised based on the accircal model and are measured at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are classified as relating either to revenue or to assets. Grants relating to revenue are recognised in income over the period in which the related costs are recognised. Grants relating to assets are recognised over the expected useful life of the asset. Where part of a grant relating to an asset is deferred, it is recognised as deferred income.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2017 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for LR corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxition in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Fax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chapteable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation. less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell after due regard for obsolete and slow moving stocks. Cost is determined using the first-in first-out (life) method.

Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade-debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at innomised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impainment. A provision for the impainment of trade-debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the charity will not be abje to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Cash and eash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of each and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
