PART 1 - GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE COMPANY'S ACTIVITIES AND IMPACT

This year at the centre has been our busiest year and a post covid period where we have seen huge increases in referrals for mental health support. The centre has added additional counsellors to meet this need and new projects for wellbeing. We started an art and singing group in conjunction with the Health Board which attracted high numbers. We have seen record calls on the centre phoneline requesting support and also an increase in safeguarding. We have trained all volunteers in safeguarding and mental health first aid during this period. We were able to increase our mental health support largely in part due to a WCVA support grant which made a huge difference in the community. We added a woman only trauma specific session to the programme and continue to expand our free to access Community inclusion Programme. We are maximising our connections with Community partners and in January held a celebration for the Chinese New Year with CIWA, which was a great success. We continue to move forwards increasing partnerships with other support providers and now have the City cluster social prescriber based at the centre on Mondays.

The Swansea Wellbeing Centre operates with a clear vision for offering a well rounded programme of wellbeing classes, sessions and services which meet the needs of people from the local community including and prioritising vulnerable people.

Central to the vision is the notion of quality; that all people have access to excellent services, much needed services, at an affordable and accessible dates.

The Centre has been used this year by a range of people from a variety of demographics. There is no restriction on who the centre can be used by and people come from Swansea, the surrounding area and even travel from other areas in the UK to work with specific teachers or facilitators, due to their excellent reputation.

The centre is in partnership with organisations and groups who offer low cost and often free services and clinics to asylum seekers, vulnerable people and refugees. We offer workshops, courses and 1:1 support for people dealing with mental health challenges. We support participants from a range of backgrounds; people whose lives have been touched by homelessness, addiction, abuse and harm. We are providing vital support for people who have suffered from the effects of lockdown.

We are offering low cost and accessible counselling and support groups which are run by experienced and highly qualified practitioners. We have a free/by donation Men's Group and also a free evening drop in for mental health support. We have free and low cost/ by donation meditation groups, Mindfulness and inspirational talks.

Therapeutic yoga for children with additional needs is offered each week, and we also are hosting a positive and empowering mental health skill building programme for young people who may be experiencing detrimental impacts of mental health conditions and illness.

We have a range of classes led by excellent teachers in a variety of yoga disciplines, Feldenkrais method, Zumba, Pilates and Tai Chi.

There are anxiety management courses and a regular course in supporting people who are at the impact of losing a loved one to suicide.

We have massage therapy, acupuncture, homeopathic treatments and nutrition chiropractic work and holistic healing as well as psychotherapists and counsellors. We have hypnobirthing courses and pre natal support, as well as a baby group which offers a range of activities for parents and babies.

The centre is an accessible venue, and we have wheelchair access to the front of the

building. We also have temporary ramps for wheelchair access to the foyer. We have a beautiful and accessible wheelchair access WC.
