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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The charity's objects as set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association are:

To meet the needs and promote the welfare of disabled persons in the Glasgow City Council area through the promotion of access to all public buildings, areas and facilities in the area, in association with statutory, voluntary and other agencies. In furtherance thereof, but not otherwise, the Company shall seek:-

- (1) To provide education for members of the public, and private organisations and agencies, on the issues impeding access for disabled people to services, facilities and employment.
- (2) To advance education and provide support for disabled people so far as to achieve a reduction of the barriers which they face in accessing services, facilities and employment, and to increase their confidence and understanding in overcoming the issues which impede access.

Significant activities

Addressing Isolation during the Pandemic

A key aim of our organisation is to address the isolation that can come as a consequence of disability. Over the past year, we have faced new challenges in this regard. Due to lockdown restrictions, we have been unable to hold in-person events, and have instead had to move much of our support and social gatherings online.

Though not a situation anyone would have chosen, this has been a great success. Our online meetups have provided a productive and well-attended social outlet, where issues affecting disabled people have been discussed and addressed. Through these sessions we have had the opportunity to discuss Covid and its effect on disabled people, new developments in Glasgow such as changes to Queen St and George Square and the potential impact on accessibility, and even to offer direct feedback on current developments still in the planning stages, such as the Carmyle-Westburn Viaduct project.

After an initial adjustment period, we found many of our participants gaining skills and confidence in using technology which will help them to stay connected with others in future. We are thankful to our members for their participation, helping to connect disabled people with planners and service providers directly to ensure their views are heard and accessibility is treated as a priority.

Access Auditing Work

Along with facilitating consultations online, we were able to carry out a small number of access audits in person during the year - lockdown restrictions permitting - including a second audit of Partick Thistle Football Club. We were glad in this instance to find that many of our recommendations from our 2015 visit had been implemented, giving us great encouragement that our efforts are making lasting changes in the city which will benefit disabled people for years to come. We look forward to continuing this work in the coming year, generating income to sustain our other projects whilst improving access across the city.

Funding & Sustainability

The loss this year of the Glasgow City Council as a core funder was a significant one for our Panel. The succession of the Integrated Grant Fund (IGF) by the new Communities Fund left us with a significant shortfall to address. A 6-month extension to the IGF, along with bridge funding from Disability Equality Scotland, were instrumental in keeping our service running as we worked to secure new grants at the beginning of the year.

We are grateful to now be in a financially secure position: looking to grow our service and our membership, and not simply to save it. This is due not only to the aforementioned funders, but also to the support of the Robertson Trust, the National Lottery Communities Fund, the National Emergencies Trust, the Weir Charitable Trust, Cruden Foundation, Corra Foundation, the James Weir Foundation, and the Gordon Fraser Charitable Trust. We would like to thank each of these funders for their support of our work, and for appreciating the value of Disabled People's Organisations to the wider community.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Partnership Working

Though at a distance, we have maintained our working relationships over the course of the year with organisations such as Disability Equality Scotland, the Glasgow Centre for Inclusive Living, the Glasgow Disability Alliance and others all working toward the same goal of a fairer, more inclusive society. We hope in the months ahead that closer collaborations will again be a possibility for all of us.

Working for Inclusion & Our Work Going Forward

The need to support disabled people in accessing new technologies which help to maintain social contact has been extremely important during the Covid-19 pandemic, but also has further reaching implications as a means of addressing isolation more broadly.

Many disabled and older people find themselves unable to leave their own homes, sometimes for extended periods of time. The arrival of applications such as Zoom which allow events to continue remotely has been a positive development; however, we have also found that many people due to physical and sensory impairments can find these applications very difficult to use.

We believe that supporting disabled and older people with these technological and practical concerns in accessing online social outlets is critical. We look forward to being able to hold meetings, social events and training days in person again, as before the pandemic, but only when we are sure that this can be achieved safely and responsibly.

We are currently planning new projects which will involve local people in person where possible, but also allow for remote participation where necessary. We hope that our members will continue to work with us as we seek to improve access for disabled people in Glasgow in the year ahead, and find new ways to ensure inclusion and a strong disabled community in Glasgow.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources in the year were a £10,000 grant from the Glasgow City Council Integrated Grant Fund, a grant of £10,000 from the National Lottery Community Fund, grants of £6,600 from Disability Action, grants of £5,244 from the DWP, £6967.54 from Disability Equality Scotland, and £10,000 from Robertson Trust.

Reserves policy

The trustees have examined the charity's requirements for reserves in the light of the main risks to the organisation. In doing so, the reason why the company needs restricted and unrestricted funds. The level of these reserves required and the steps to be taken in order to establish and maintain reserves at the required level.

The target set by the trustees is to build up reserves equivalent to three months' running costs.

We now hire staff, as the trainee program that we supported was no longer running. Staff costs are therefore added our main outgoings of accommodation costs and related expenses.

From the business plan we developed one of the objectives is to secure funding to employ staff to support and develop the work of GAP. We are pursuing funding for these posts. All board members were involved in this development and training and support for the board has been provided to develop a set of employment policies.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Members wishing to become trustees must be recommended by the board or proposed by a fellow member of the charity, in advance of the general meeting. The member then stands for election at a general meeting. The board may co-opt no more than five additional trustees who must stand for election at the next Annual General Meeting if wishing to continue as a trustee.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

The board of trustees meets approximately ten times a year and has responsibility for all strategic decisions of the charity. Operational decisions are delegated to senior staff, with the trustees having overall responsibility for day-to-day management of the charity.

Induction and training of new trustees

All new Board members are inducted by the trustees of the charity. The chairperson of the board of trustees meets with new trustees to outline the code of governance. If it is necessary, the trustees of the charity will receive training on Governance and Finance.

The company is a stand-alone charity.
