#### Structure, governance and management

#### Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 3 June 1998 and registered as a charity on 8 August 1998. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

#### Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees are also directors of the company for the purposes of company law and under the company's Articles. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association one third of the trustees shall retire at the Annual General Meeting. No person other than a trustee retiring by rotation shall be appointed or reappointed a trustee at any general meeting unless:

- (1) he is recommended by the trustees; or
- (2) not less than fourteen nor more than thirty-five clear days before the date appointed for the meeting, notice executed by a member qualified to vote at the meeting has been given to the Charity of the intention to propose that person for appointment or reappointment stating the particulars which would, if he was so appointed or reappointed, be required to be included in the Charity's register of trustees together with a notice executed by that person of his willingness to be appointed or reappointed.

Decisions on all matters have been made by the seven trustees. They have been advised on policy and fundraising by the Chief Executive, the Regional Development Manager and the Ambassadors of Sports Aid who are invited individuals with an interest in the aims and objectives of Sports Aid Yorkshire & Humberside. The Chief Executive is a highly experienced sports administrator and animator, one of the two founders of the organisation who acts in an unpaid capacity. He announced his decision not to stand for reelection as a trustee at the AGM 24 October 2013 having given over 35 years of tireless service. Mr D S Oxley also announced his decision to resign at year end having also given over 35 years of service. Mr S Calligan resigned as a Trustee on 31 March 2014 thus reducing the number of Trustees to five.

In light of a number of changes to the structure over the last couple of years and challenges with fundraising the trustees have taken a more active role in directing the activities of the charity with delivery through staff and volunteers. The Trustees deem it the responsibility of all volunteers to contribute to the fundraising.

#### Staff

For the period there was one full time paid members of staff in the region, a Regional Development Manager, .Mr Robert Clarke who resigned in March 2014. He was replaced in April 2014 by Joanne Addie, an experienced fundraiser who has provided a fresh approach and already contributed greatly to improved fundraising in the region..

The resignation of two trustees during the year makes the question of additional trustees and the process of recruitment and induction urgent. All prospective trustees would be interviewed by the chair and other trustees at their discretion and if invited to join the Board of Trustees would be provided with the Memorandum and Articles, past annual reports, previous years' financial accounts and a briefing by the Regional Development Manager.

#### Risk management

The charity trustees have considered the major risks to which the charity is exposed and have reviewed those risks, establishing systems and procedures to manage these. The risk management policy is reviewed at least once per annum and is attached as an appendix to the business plan.

#### Objects and activities

#### Our mission:

#### Proudly supporting the next generation.

The principal objective of SportsAid Yorkshire & Humberside is to raise funds to support talented emerging athletes from the Yorkshire area.

SportsAid works with the national governing bodies of 75 Olympic, Paralympic and non-Olympic sports to identify and support the right athletes at the right time in their development.

The organisation aims to have a professional and efficient structure with simple, transparent governance and administrative processes which allow volunteers, supporters, partners and recipients to play their part in SportsAid's mission.

#### Award making policy

The charity works with the National Governing Bodies of Sport to stimulate nominations for talented athletes in line with each sport's talent development pathway. Nominations cannot be accepted directly from the individual as they must be endorsed by a relevant signatory from the sports Governing Body.

Nominations for individual sports are invited on an annual basis. The charity supports both able bodied and disabled athletes in approximately 50 different sports.

Each National Governing Body sets the criteria for its nominations for individuals which are then screened to ensure they meet Sports Aid's own awards criteria. These nominations are then considered by the staff in conjunction with two senior advisors who subsequently make recommendations for the trustees' final decision.

Factors taken into consideration when looking at applications include financial need, the standard at which the athlete is competing, potential, social and economic circumstances.

The charity also applies funds to other projects which use physical education and recreation to develop the bodies and minds of young people, as and if requested to do so by donors or sponsors.

#### Public benefit and eligibility criteria

Sports Aid has always sought to justify its charitable work by showing in detail the public benefit of its awards for the talented athletes receiving support. The awards ensure that financial constraints of the family need not inhibit their participation and success in sport. By improving the chances of the athletes' continued participation in sport Sports Aid seeks to promote the benefits of living a healthy and competitive lifestyle. Support for individuals is available in accordance with our diversity and equality policies.

At the year-end July 2014, 69 talented athletes had benefited from £45,300 as a result of the Charity's work at both national and regional level in Yorkshire.

#### Achievements and performance

#### **Fundraising**

The charity has continued to operate in its historic role as fundraiser and grant-maker at a regional level, and is extremely grateful for the support given by its many sponsors and donors. It has been a challenging year for fundraising and the target set by the trustees was not met.

Sports Aid Foundation (Y&H), the charity's subsidiary, also ran a high quality events programme to raise unrestricted funds for the organisation. Most notable events were the SportsAid Swimming Gala, held at the Aquatics Centre, John Charles Centre for Sport, Leeds, sponsored by Unison Yorkshire & Humberside and the annual Cricket Lunch, sponsored by Headingley Experience and Yorkshire County Cricket Club. Other fundraising events were organised throughout the year, notably in Doncaster and Lunch Club events in Wetherby.

The total funding for athletes from Yorkshire & Humberside comes from three sources, only one of which is fully reported in these accounts. In addition to 69 athletes supported with £40,500 by SportsAid Yorkshire & Humberside, a further 10 athletes benefitted from £5,000 worth of funding from the Scarborough '95 Trust and 23 athletes were funded with £22,250 directly from the national SportsAid Trust.

#### Financial review

#### Reserves policy

Levels of fundraising from year to year are difficult to predict. As Sports Aid relies entirely on fundraising to meet its charitable grant making aspirations, a level of reserves must be maintained at least equal to maintaining the staff in post for two years with sufficient administrative resources to enable them to undertake their fundraising and grant giving functions.

A further sum should be held in reserve to meet annual fluctuations whether in fundraising or in grant making. The inability to hold just two of the major fundraising efforts in any year would lead to the requirement of funds being available to adequately fulfil our grant aiding in that year. Equally, even in years when fundraising has been successful, a shortage of funds could arise from an unanticipated increase in the number of suitable applicants for assistance, or a desire to raise the level of individual awards in line with inflation.

Taking into account the above the trustees assess the correct level of reserves to be no less than £70,000 to meet these contingencies, but will subject this level to annual review. The trustees will not artificially or deliberately reduce reserves to this level and are prepared to see levels rise if sufficient appropriate applications for assistance are not received in any one year, however they will be mindful of how this may affect the ability to seek future funding. The trustees agreed to reduce reserves in 2013/14 to fully meet the awards as reported above.

#### Acknowledgements

The trustees wish to express their thanks to all those Ambassadors, business sponsors and helpers who have contributed to make this another very successful period. Special thanks go as always to all our volunteers, too many to mention individually, for their hard work and expertise and who have contributed in a multitude of ways in making this another most successful year for the organisation in Yorkshire. The trustees also wish to thank the staff for their hard work, commitment and enthusiasm throughout the year.

#### Plans for the future

As the only major organisation to provide funding to talented sports youngsters at an important time in their sporting careers and personal development, the charity intends to continue and develop its work.

The Trustees have set a target of £54,000 for the period 2014/15.

A fundraising strategy has been produced for the period 2014-15, which the organisation will work towards. The new strategy will focus heavily on income generation from the commercial sector for Named Awards, underpinned by high quality events. To complement this, there will be several other Ambassador led projects, which will also bring in important income.

It should be noted that Mr Anthony Rogers has assumed the role of staff management from the outgoing Hon. Chief Executive.

It is expected that the organisation will make awards of approximately £50,000 in 2014/15. The number of nominations is expected to decrease slightly with sports Governing Bodies having adjusted to changes within the sporting landscape involving a change in the way they work with Sport England and UK Sport and the improvement of the processes in place to identify talent. The intention is to increase the average award size to increase the impact of SportsAid's support on the athletes.

#### Trustees' responsibilities for preparing the financial statements

The trustees (who are also directors of Sports Aid Yorkshire and Humberside for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Under company law, the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

We, the trustees of the company who held office at the date of approval of these financial statements, as set out above, each confirm so far as we are aware that:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware; and
- the trustees of the charitable company have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make ourselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 31 JULY 2014

#### 1 Constitution

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and every member of the charity undertakes to contribute such amounts as may be required (not exceeding £10) to the charity's assets if it should be wound up while he or she is a member.

#### 2 Accounting policies

#### Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable UK accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements represent information about the company as an individual undertaking and not about its group. The group qualifies as a small group and group accounts are not required.

#### Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes.

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

#### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

#### 3 Investment in subsidiary company

The company owns 100% of the issued share capital of Sports Aid Foundation (Yorkshire and Humberside) Limited, a company registered in England and Wales. It was acquired for nil consideration.

Consolidated accounts have not been prepared because the results for the year and the net assets at 31 July 2014 are not material. The net assets of the subsidiary at 31 July 2014 were £2,129 (2013: £2).

The subsidiary's activities are to raise funds for Sports Aid Yorkshire and Humberside and when required, to apply those funds as grants to assist British sportsmen and women of proven ability.
